EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Town of Wellington Water Treatment Plant currently relies on a manually operated caustic injection system to adjust the pH of finished water. Proper pH control is critical to minimize the potential for lead and copper leaching from plumbing system piping. The existing manual system, originally permitted through a pilot program with the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE), is not integrated with the plant's Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system and requires manual adjustment in response to changes in plant flow.

To improve reliability, consistency, and regulatory compliance, the Town proposes automating the caustic injection system. This project is part of the Town's 2025 Capital Improvement Plan and is anticipated to utilize the infrastructure installed during construction of the new Water Treatment Plant. SCADA integration will provide operators with remote monitoring and control capabilities and reduce reliance on manual intervention, which currently generates frequent pH alerts.

Following a formal Request for Proposals process, Town staff recommends awarding the design and permitting contract to Advanced Engineering and Environmental Services, LLC (AE₂S).

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

Prior to the construction of the Town's new Water Treatment Plant, a manual caustic injection skid was used to adjust the pH of finished water to a target range of 7.8 to 8.0. This system was permitted through a pilot program by the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE). The primary objective of pH adjustment is to control the leaching of lead and copper into drinking water by promoting pipe scaling, which forms a protective layer inside the plumbing system pipes.

During the design of the new Treatment Plant, a target pH of 7.8 was established. This value was used as the basis of design for both the pre-filtration pH adjustment system and the Granular Activated Carbon (GAC) filters, which include a biological treatment component. Operating above a pH of 7.8 can degrade the biological performance of the GAC filters requiring any additional pH adjustment to occur post filtration.

During construction, community partners raised concerns about potential copper leaching. In response, the Town opted to raise the treated water pH target to 8.2 to enhance corrosion control. To accomplish this, the Town continued using the same manually operated post-filtration caustic injection skid after the new Treatment Plant was placed into service. This skid is not integrated with the plant's SCADA system. As a result, changes in plant flow require operators to manually adjust the dosing pump, increasing the risk of deviation from desired pH levels. Although pH is continuously monitored, frequent SCADA alerts for pH levels nearing control limits have become common, placing a burden on plant staff.

A 2025 Capital Improvement Project was developed to design, permit, and construct an automated caustic



injection system. This system is anticipated to utilize the chemical storage and feed infrastructure already in place and add SCADA integration for improved monitoring and control.

Consultant Selection:

On February 3, 2025, staff issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for design and permitting services, with a submission deadline of March 14, 2025. The RFP, included in the meeting packet, outlined the project objectives and evaluation criteria.

Two proposals to the RFP were received. A four-person internal selection committee reviewed and scored the proposals. Advanced Engineering and Environmental Services, LLC (AE2S) submitted the most complete and relevant proposal. Although their initial price exceeded the planned design and permitting budget, staff negotiated the scope and cost to focus solely on the caustic injection upgrade. This scope reduction primarily resulted in the removal of any updates to the existing fluoridation system from the project scope.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The total contract amount for this contract is \$61,313.00, which fits within the Town's approved budget for this effort of \$120,000. The remaining funds are planned to be used for the construction phase of the project. Project funding is provided through the Water Fund, G/L 211-80-4019.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends awarding the contract to Advanced Engineering and Environmental Services, LLC (AE₂S) for \$61,313.00, and authorizing the Town Administrator to execute the agreement.

REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS

TOWN OF WELLINGTON 2025 WATER TREATMENT PLANT DESIGN AND PERMITTING SERVICES FOR CAUSTIC AND FLUORIDE INJECTION SYSTEM

GL: 211-80-5069

1. Background and Overview

(a) Background

The Town of Wellington, population 11,047, is located approximately 12 miles north of the City of Fort Collins at the intersection of Interstate 25 and State Highway 1. The Town of Wellington completed an expansion project at its primary Water Treatment Plant in 2024 expanding capacity from 1.9 MGD to 4.2 MGD. The plant treats surface water pumped from North Poudre Irrigation Reservoir 3 and treats it with a conventional process of flocculation, settlement, and filtration with an Ozone System used primarily for taste and odor control. The expansion project focused on upgrading treatment processes and controls with new facilities, piping, and SCADA system. Additional chemical controls, primarily pH adjustment and fluoridation, injected post filtration were left unchanged.

(b) Overview

The Town is soliciting proposals from qualified Water Treatment design firms with a demonstrated knowledge and experience in process design, instrumentation and controls, the Colorado community water fluoridation program, and Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) permitting, to design and permit a new Caustic (sodium hypochlorite) and Fluoride dosing system for the Water Treatment Facility (WTF). The Town currently uses a post filtration caustic dosing system to control pH in the finished water. Similarly, the Town uses a post filtration Fluoride dosing system to add fluoride to the finished water. Both systems are currently "manual" with adjustments to dosing required to be made on site with no visibility or controls available through the plants new SCADA system.

2. Scope of Services

The following tasks provide an expected scope of work outline for the completion of the project. The successful firm will provide a proposal that has their vision of the associated



tasks along with assumptions, and recommendations or suggestions to improve the project framework as outlined in the following sections.

(a) Project Management and Coordination

The selected firm shall include Project Management as one of the tasks. The proposal should identify a single project manager from the team to work directly with the Project Manager of the Town. Included within the Project Management Task will be the following items:

- Project Kickoff meeting with appropriate Town staff to review and discuss the included work tasks, technical approaches, and work products/deliverables.
- Project progress meetings, as needed, with appropriate members of the project team in order to maximize cost efficiencies.

(b) Design

- (i) Caustic Dosing Design
- 1) The Town currently provides caustic (Sodium Hydroxide) as pH control prefilter at a range of 7.5 to 7.8. The new filtration system at the plant utilizes Granular Activated Carbon (GAC) and per the design should not exceed a pH of 7.8 through the filters in order to preserve the biology. Due to the need to control leaching from copper pipes the Town provides additional pH control post filter to bring the pH of the finished water to a range of 8.0 to 8.2. The current post filtration pH adjustment is permitted through a pilot program with CDPHE. The current system, however, has no ability to be controlled or monitored through SCADA. The only visibility operators have into the effectiveness of the caustic is through the continuous water quality monitoring of the Clearwell. This project will achieve the following goals:
 - Review the current Caustic dosing system and provide modifications as needed (pumps, piping, valves) in order to provide adjustment of the finished water pH from 7.9 to up to 8.2.
 - Design Instrumentation and Control system for the caustic, including inline monitoring, to provide visibility and control through the existing SCADA system.
- c) All designs must be per CDPHE Drinking water rules and regulations.
- (ii) Fluoride Injection System
- 1) The Town currently doses fluoride directly into the Clearwell. The system is a manual dosing system that requires operator input directly at the skid and doses at a maximum rate of 1.2 mg/l.
 - Review the current Fluoride injection system and provide modifications as needed (pumps, piping, valves) in order to provide a system that can be controlled and monitored through SCADA.



- Design Instrumentation and Control system for the fluoride, including inline monitoring, to provide visibility and control through the existing SCADA system.
- c) All designs must be per CDPHE Drinking water rules and regulations, including CDPHE Oral Health Unit recommendations.

(c) Permitting

(i) The selected design firm will be responsible for all correspondence, coordination, and permitting with CDPHE on behalf of the Town.

(d) Bidding (Alternate Task)

(i) Provide support to the Town through construction bidding. Effort to include preparation of the request for bids that the Town will post to Bidnet. Attendance of the Pre-Bid meeting and site walk. Review of bids. Preparation of construction scope contract.

(e) Construction

- (i) Provide support through construction by providing the following tasks. Review of contractor submittals. Attendance at the Pre-Construction meeting. Four site visits during construction. Sign off on substantial completion and final completion.
- (ii) Town staff will provide review of the construction pay applications and on-site construction observation.

3. Proposal Requirements and Format

The proposal can be a simple letter proposal that provides the requested information in a brief and succinct format. There is no page limit for the proposal, but all the information requested in the following items should be included.

(a) Consultant Qualifications

- (i) The proposing consultant shall demonstrate their teams' qualifications for this type of design. The experience, background, and unique qualifications of key staff members shall be identified.
- Sub Consultants provide details on any identified sub vendors needed to successfully complete the project.

(b) Project Understanding and Approach

(i) Provide an understanding of the scope of services and the consultants proposed overall approach to the scope of services. This section should indicate skills, experience, and approach to the scope of services which distinguish the firm, and state why your firm believes it is best qualified to perform these services.

(c) Project Experience/References



(i) The Consultant shall provide three (3) projects of a similar nature that the consultant has previously completed within the last four (4) years or is currently completing. Each project experience write up shall include a brief project summary, initial and final cost (if not yet complete please note that), location, and an owner contact (Name, email).

(d) Project Timeline

- (i) Provide a schedule for the project showing key dates and milestones that will determine the overall project timeline.
- (e) Provide a price proposal by task that includes estimated hours and hourly rate for the staff to complete each task. Provide a separate summary of any non-labor expenses (travel, meals etc.) Provide a not to exceed total for the requested services.

4. Administrative

- (a) Consultant Inquiries
 - (i) There will be a mandatory Pre-Bid meeting and site walk at the Water Treatment Plant on Tuesday, February 18, 2025 at 10 am.
 - (ii) Consultants shall submit questions to this RFP via BidNet. Questions must be received by Close of Business (5pm) February 24, 2025. Responses to questions received ahead of the deadline will be available for all bidders on BidNet and will be posted no later than March 3, 2025.
- (iii) Any addenda issued to this RFP will be added to BidNet.

(b) Submittal

- (i) Responses must be submitted electronically to BidNet. The deadline for submittal is March 14, 2025 at 5PM.
- (c) Evaluation of Proposals

The following criteria will be used in screening and ranking of the firms:

- 1) Qualifications of the Project Team (30%): Preference shall be given to those firms with key staff experience with similar project scopes.
- 2) Project Understanding and Approach (30%): Preference shall be given to those consultants that demonstrate an effective understanding of the basic project requirements and standard approach.
- 3) Past Experience (30%): Preference shall be given to consultants with experience in similar project scope and demonstrated ability to complete the project within budget.
- 4) Price Proposal (10%): The selection team is not required to select based on low price, however the budgeted fee for the entire project design through construction is \$120,000 which is listed in the Towns 2025 Budget.



(d) Rejection of RFP

(i) The Town reserves the right to reject any or all RFPs, to waive irregularities in the RFP received, and accept any portion of any RFP if deemed in the best interest of the Town.

(e) Proposal Validity Time

(i) Proposals may not be withdrawn and shall remain valid for a period of not less than sixty (60) calendar days from closing date and time.

(f) Incurring costs

(i) The Town will not be liable for any cost which the Consultant may incur in the preparation of the RFP.

(g) Formation of Consultant Agreement

(i) After selecting the preferred proposal, the Town may conduct negotiations with the Consultant to arrive at the best final offer. Parties shall enter into a contract which will go before the Board of Trustees for approval. A Notice to Proceed will then be subsequently issued.

Parties: The parties to this Contract are the Town of Wellington, 8225 Third Street, Wellington, Colorado 80549 (Town) and Advanced Engineering and Environmental Services, LLC (AE2S), 9635 Maroon Circle, Suite 210, Englewood, CO 80112 (Consultant).

Purpose of Contract: The purpose of this Contract is for the Town of Wellington to retain the services of the Consultant to render certain technical or professional services hereinafter described.

Term of Contract and Required Approvals: This Contract is effective when all parties have executed it (Effective Date). The term of the Contract is from the Effective Date through End of Contract Date. All services shall be completed during this term.

If the Consultant has been delayed and as a result will be unable to complete performance fully and satisfactorily within this Contract period, the Consultant may be granted an extension of time upon submission of evidence of the causes of delay satisfactory to the Town.

Responsibilities of the Consultant:

Scope of Services: The Consultant shall perform the specific services required under this Contract in a satisfactory and proper manner as outlined in the proposal included as Attachment A. The standard of care for the Consultant under this Contract will be the care and skill ordinarily used by members of the Consultant's profession providing similar services for projects of similar size, location, scope, and complexity to this project at the time the services are performed.

The scope of services shall be as defined within the Consultant's proposal and any further stipulation of the terms specified in Attachment A.

Personnel: All services required hereunder will be performed by the Consultant or under its supervision, and all personnel engaged in the work shall be fully qualified and shall be authorized, licensed, or permitted under state law to perform such services if state law requires such authorization, license, or permit.

Records Administration: The Consultant shall maintain or supervise the maintenance of all records necessary to properly account for the payments made to the Consultant for costs authorized by this Contract. The Consultant shall be responsible and responsive to the Town in its requests and requirements related to the scope of this Contract. The Consultant shall select and analyze all data in a systematic and meaningful manner to contribute directly in meeting the objectives of the project and shall present this information

clearly and concisely in a professional and workmanlike manner.

Reports, Maps, Plans, Models and Documents: A minimum of one (1) copy of maps, plans, worksheets, logs, field notes or other documents prepared under this Contract as relevant to this project shall be submitted to the Town. The Consultant shall also submit any computer program or spreadsheet developed as a part of this project. Digital media shall be labeled to provide sufficient detail to access the information on the media. Any user manuals shall be submitted to the Town with complete documentation of computer programs developed under this Contract. The user manual shall also specify the source code language and the type of computer equipment necessary to operate the program(s).

Subcontracts:

- (i) Approval Required for Subcontracts: Any subcontractors required by the Consultant in connection with the services, work performed or rendered under this Contract will be limited to such individuals or firms as were specifically identified in the proposal and agreed to during negotiations or are specifically authorized by the Town during the performance of this Contract. During the performance of the Contract, substitutions in or additions to such subcontracts will be subject to the prior approval by the Town. The Consultant shall be responsible for the actions of the subcontractors.
- (ii) Billing for Subcontracts: Billings for subcontractor services shall include any mark up as set forth in Attachment A. Subcontract costs shall be documented by attaching subcontractor billings to the Consultant's billing submittals.

Responsibilities of the Town:

Data to be Furnished: All information, data, drawings, reports, maps, etc. as are available to the Town and necessary for the carrying out of the scope of services shall be furnished to the Consultant without charge, and the Town shall cooperate with the Consultant in the carrying out of the project. The Consultant may rely on the information, data, etc. provided by the Town without further investigation.

Report Reviews and Criteria: The Town shall examine all studies, reports, sketches, drawings, opinions of costs, and other documents presented by the Consultant and shall promptly render the Town's decisions pertaining thereto. The Town shall provide all criteria and full information regarding its requirements for the project.

General Provisions:

Amendments: Any changes, modifications, revisions, or amendments to this Contract which are mutually agreed upon by the parties to this Contract shall be incorporated by written instrument executed by all parties to this Contract.

Assignment Prohibited and Contract Shall Not Be Used as Collateral: Neither party shall assign or otherwise transfer any of the rights or delegate any of the duties set out in this Contract without the prior written consent of the other party. The Consultant shall not use this Contract, or any portion thereof, for collateral for any financial obligation.

Audit and Access to Records: The Town shall have access to the books, documents, papers, electronic data, and records of the Consultant which are pertinent to this Contract. The Consultant shall immediately, upon receiving written instruction from the Town, provide to any independent auditor or accountant all books, documents, papers, electronic data, and records of the Consultant which are pertinent to this Contract.

Authority: Provisions of this Contract are pursuant to the authority set forth in the Town of Wellington Municipal Code. Mandatory applicable state and federal regulations also apply.

Compliance with Laws: The Consultant shall keep informed of and comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations in the performance of this Contract.

Confidentiality: Each party shall retain as confidential all information and data furnished to it by the other party which are designated in writing by such other party as confidential at the time of transmission and are obtained or acquired by the receiving party in connection with this Contract, and said parties shall not reveal such information to any third party. However, nothing herein is meant to preclude either disclosing and/or otherwise using confidential information (i) when the confidential information is actually known to the receiving party before being obtained or derived from the transmitting party; or (ii) when confidential information is generally available to the public without the receiving party's fault at any time before or after it is acquired from the transmitting party; or (iii) where the confidential information is obtained or acquired in good faith at any time by the receiving party from a third party who has the same in good faith and who is not under any obligation to the transmitting party in respect thereof; or (iv) is required by law or court order to be disclosed.

Conflicts of Interest: The Consultant stipulates that none of its officers or employees are officers or employees of the Town of Wellington unless disclosure has been made in accordance with Town ordinances and policies. Furthermore, the Consultant certifies that it has not offered or given any gift or compensation prohibited by local, state, or federal law, to any officer or employee of the Town of Wellington to secure favorable treatment with respect to being awarded this Contract. The Consultant shall not engage in providing consultation or representation of clients, agencies or firms which may constitute a conflict of interest which results in a disadvantage to the Town or a disclosure which would adversely affect the interests of the Town. The Consultant shall notify the Town of any potential or actual conflicts of interest arising during this Contract. This Contract may be terminated in the event a conflict of interest arises. Termination of the Contract will be subject to a mutual settlement of accounts. In the event the Contract is terminated under this provision, the Consultant shall take steps to ensure that the file, evidence, evaluation and data are

provided to the Town or its designee. This does not prohibit or affect the Consultant's ability to engage in consultations, evaluations or representation under agreement with other agencies, firms, facilities, or attorneys so long as no conflict exists. A conflict of interest warranting termination of this Contract may include, but is not necessarily limited to, acting on behalf of a client in an adversarial proceeding against the Town or initiating suits in equity including injunctions, declaratory judgments, writs of prohibition, or quo warranto.

Contract Jurisdiction, Choice of Law, and Venue: The provisions of the Contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of Colorado. The parties will submit to the jurisdiction of the courts of the State of Colorado. Venue shall be Larimer County, Colorado.

Contract Renegotiation, Modifications and Award of Related Contracts: This Contract may be amended, modified, or supplemented only by written amendment to the Contract, executed by the parties hereto, and attached to the original signed copy of the Contract. The Town may undertake or award supplemental or successor contracts for work related to this Contract or may award contracts to other contractors for work related to this Contract. The Consultant shall cooperate fully with other contractors and the Town in all such cases. The Town, at its sole discretion and through duly authorized contract amendments, may request the Consultant to complete additional phases beyond the scope of services included in this Contract.

Disbarment: The Consultant certifies that neither it nor its principals are presently disbarred, suspended, proposed for disbarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction (Contract) by any governmental department or agency. If the Consultant cannot certify this statement, a written explanation for review by the Town shall be provided.

Entirety of Contract: This Contract, inclusive of Attachment A, represents the entire and integrated Contract between the parties and supersede all prior negotiations, representations, and agreements, whether written or oral. In the event of a conflict or inconsistency between the language of this Contract and the language of any attachment or document incorporated by reference, the language of this Contract shall control.

Equal Opportunity Clause: The Consultant agrees to abide by the provisions under Title VI and VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42USC 2000e) which prohibits discrimination against any employee or applicant for employment or any applicant or recipient of services, on a basis of race, religion, color, or national origin. This includes abiding to Executive Order 11246 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex, and 45 CFR which prohibits discrimination on the basis of age, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, or the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of a disability.

Force Majeure: Neither party shall be liable for failure to perform under this Contract if such failure to perform arises out of causes beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of the nonperforming party. Such causes may include, but are not limited to, acts of God or the public enemy, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, freight embargoes, and unusually severe weather. This provision shall become effective only if the party failing to perform immediately notifies the other party of the extent and nature of the problem, limits delay in performance to that required by the event and takes all reasonable steps to minimize delays.

Indemnification: The Consultant agrees to indemnify, save harmless, and defend

(the obligation to defend is limited to such amounts as are covered by Consultant's general liability or professional liability insurance, whichever is applicable)

the Town of Wellington and its officers, agents, volunteers, and employees from and against loss, damage, injury, liability, suits, and proceedings arising out of the performance of this Contract to the extent caused by the negligence of the Consultant's officers, agents, volunteers, or employees, but not for claims from the Town's negligence.

Independent Contractor: The Consultant shall function as an independent contractor for the purposes of this Contract and shall not be considered an employee of the Town for any purpose and as such, have no authorization, express or implied to by the Town of Wellington, to any agreements, settlements, liability or understanding whatsoever, and agrees not to perform any acts as an agent for the Town except as expressly set forth herein. The Consultant shall be responsible for the payment of all income tax and social security amounts due because of payments received from the Town. Persons employed by the Town and acting under the direction of the Town shall not be deemed to be employees or agents of the Consultant. Nothing in this Contract shall be interpreted as authorizing the Consultant or its agents or employees to act as an agent or representative or to incur any obligation of any kind for or on behalf of the Town. The Consultant agrees that no health or hospitalization benefits, workers' compensation, unemployment insurance, or similar benefits available to Town employees will inure to the benefit of the Consultant or the Consultant's agents or employees because of this Contract.

Insurance Coverage: The Consultant shall not commence work under this Contract until it has obtained all the insurance required by the Town. The Consultant shall obtain and maintain the following insurance in accordance with the Insurance Requirements set forth below and shall provide the Town with proofs of these insurance upon request:

- (i) Automobile Liability Insurance: The Consultant shall maintain automobile liability insurance covering any auto (including owned, hired, and non-owned) with minimum limits of \$1,000,000 each accident combined single limit.
- (ii) Commercial, General Liability Insurance: The Consultant shall maintain commercial general liability insurance (CGL) coverage, occurrence form, covering liability claims for bodily injury and property damage arising out of premises, operations, products and completed operations, and personal and advertising injury, with minimum limits as stated below. The CGL policy shall include coverage for Explosion, Collapse and Underground property damage. This coverage may not be excluded by endorsement.
- (a) \$1,000,000 each occurrence;
- (b) \$1,000,000 personal injury and advertising injury;
- (c) \$2,000,000 general aggregate; and
- (d) \$2,000,000 products and completed operations.
- (iii) Professional Liability or Errors and Omissions Liability Insurance: The Consultant shall maintain professional liability insurance or errors and omissions liability insurance protecting against any and all claims arising from the Consultant's alleged or real professional errors, omissions, or mistakes in the performance of professional duties under this Contract, with minimum limits as stated below.

- (a) \$1,000,000 each claim; and
- (b) \$2,000,000 general aggregate.
- **(iv) Unemployment Insurance:** The Consultant shall be duly registered with the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment and obtain such unemployment insurance coverage as required.
- (v) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability Insurance: Employees hired in Colorado to perform work under this Contract shall be covered by workers' compensation coverage per the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment's Workers' Compensation program as statutorily required. Employees brought into Colorado from Consultant's home state to perform work under this Contract shall be covered by workers' compensation coverage obtained through the same or other state or private workers' compensation insurance approved by the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment as statutorily required.

Insurance Requirements:

- (i) During the term of this Contract, the Consultant shall obtain and maintain, and ensure that each subcontractor obtains and maintains, each type of insurance coverage specified in Insurance Coverage above.
- (ii) All policies (except for Workers' Compensation and Professional Liability) shall be primary over any insurance or self-insurance program carried by the Consultant or the Town. All policies (except for Professional Liability) shall include clauses stating that each insurance carrier shall waive all rights of recovery under subrogation or otherwise against Consultant or the Town, its agencies, institutions, organizations, officers, agents, employees, and volunteers.
- (iii) The Consultant shall provide Certificates of Insurance to the Town, verifying each type of coverage required herein.
- (iv) All policies shall be endorsed to provide at least thirty (30) days advance written notice of cancellation to the Town. A copy of the policy endorsement shall be provided with the Certificate of Insurance.
- (v) In case of a breach of any provision relating to Insurance Requirements or Insurance Coverage, the Town may, at the Town's option, obtain and maintain, at the expense of the Consultant, such insurance in the name of the Consultant, or subcontractor, as the Town may deem proper and may deduct the cost of obtaining and maintaining such insurance from any sums which may be due or become due to the Consultant under this Contract.
- (vi) All policies required by this Contract shall be issued by an insurance company with an A.M. Best rating of A- VIII or better.
- (vii) The Town reserves the right to reject any policy issued by an insurance company that does not meet these requirements.

Limitation of Liability: Excluding the Consultant's liability for bodily injury or damage to the property of third parties, the total aggregate liability of the Consultant arising out of the performance or breach of this Contract shall not exceed the compensation paid to the Consultant under this Contract. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Contract, the Consultant shall have no liability to the Town for contingent, consequential, or other indirect damages including, without

limitation, damages for loss of use, revenue or profit; operating costs and facility downtime, however the same may be caused. The limitations and exclusions of liability set forth in this Article shall apply regardless of the fault, breach of contract, tort (including negligence), strict liability or otherwise of the Consultant, its employees, or subconsultants.

Notice of Sale or Transfer: The Consultant shall provide the Town with notice of any sale, transfer, merger, or consolidation of the assets of the Consultant. Such notice shall be provided in accordance with the notices provision of this Contract and, when possible and lawful, in advance of the transaction. If the Town determines that the sale, transfer, merger, or consolidation is not consistent with the continued satisfactory performance of the Consultant's obligations under this Contract, then the Town may, at its discretion, terminate or renegotiate the Contract.

Ownership of Documents and Information: The Town owns all deliverables by the Consultant in the performance of this Contract. Upon termination of services for any reason and payment to Consultant, the Consultant agrees to return all such original and derivative information and documents to the Town in a useable format. Any use or reuse other than for the purposes set forth herein shall be at the Town's sole risk and liability. Nothing contained herein shall be deemed a transfer, assignment or divestiture by the Consultant of its trade secrets, know-how or intellectual property.

Patent or Copyright Protection: The Consultant recognizes that certain proprietary matters or techniques may be subject to patent, trademark, copyright, license or other similar restrictions, and warrants that no work performed by the Consultant or its subcontractors will violate any such restriction. The Consultant shall defend and indemnify the Town for any infringement or alleged infringement of such patent, trademark, copyright, license, or other restrictions.

Severability: A declaration by any court or any other binding legal source that any provision of this contract is illegal and void shall not affect the legality and enforceability of any provision of this Contract unless the provisions are mutually dependent.

Taxes: The Consultant shall pay all taxes and other such amounts required by federal, state and local law, including, but not limited to, federal and social security taxes, workers' compensation, unemployment insurance, and sales taxes.

Termination of Contract: This Contract may be terminated with cause by either party in advance of the specified termination date upon written notice being provided by the other party. Unless the Town determines a default is not remediable, there have been prior violations with notice, or a default is determined to be detrimental to public safety, the party in violation will be given thirty (30) working days after notification to correct and cease the violations after which the Contract may be terminated for cause. This Contract may be terminated without cause in advance of a specified expiration date by either party upon thirty (30) days prior written notice being given by the other party.

Project Requirements:

Final Deliverables and Stamping: The Consultant shall use the Contract Scope of Services as the outline for draft and final reports or technical memoranda so that Consultant compliance with Contract provisions can be verified. If the final report or technical memoranda contain information of an engineering nature, the cover of the final report, memoranda, all plates, and any executive summary must be stamped and

signed by a Professional Engineer licensed in the State of Colorado.

In addition to the paper submittal, the Consultant shall provide the final documents and related materials in a digital format. This digital report shall be contained on CD(s), USB drive(s), or other media as approved by the Town and shall be in Adobe Acrobat (PDF) format.

Project Access: The Consultant shall be responsible for obtaining access as required for project tasks.

Stand-By Time: The Town will not reimburse the Consultant for stand-by time charges for the Consultant's supervisory personnel.

Third Party Beneficiaries: Nothing in this Agreement will be construed to create, impose, or give rise to any duty owned by Owner or Engineer to any Contractor, other third-party individual or entity, or to any surety for or employee of any of them. All duties and responsibilities undertaken pursuant to this Agreement will be for the sole and exclusive benefit of Owner and Engineer and not for the benefit of any other party.

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Payment and Billing:

Reimbursement of Expenses: Subject to annual appropriation by the Town Board, the Town agrees to pay the Consultant an amount based on the approved hourly rates and reimbursable expenses price schedules shown on page 24 of the Proposal included as Appendix A for the services described in Appendix A and incorporated by reference as part of this Contract. Payment shall be made directly to the Consultant. The Consultant shall maintain hourly records of time worked by its personnel. Total payment under this Contract shall not exceed \$61,313.00.

Project Budget: The anticipated project budget for the phases and task(s) included in Attachment A is as stated below. The amounts shown for each phase are not to be exceeded unless authorized by the Town. The Contract total amount is controlling.

Payment Procedures: The Town shall pay the Consultant upon receipt of billing reports as the services are performed for the task(s) outlined in Appendix A. The Town will initiate the payment process upon the receipt of a verified statement of services, and payment shall be made within thirty (30) days following receipt of billing.

Money Withheld: If the Town has reasonable grounds to believe that the Consultant will be unable to perform this Contract fully and satisfactorily within the time fixed for performance, then the Town may withhold payment of such portion of any amount otherwise due and payable to the Consultant reasonably deemed appropriate. These amounts may be withheld until the cause for the withholding is cured to the Town's satisfaction or this Contract is terminated per the General Provisions above. No interest shall be payable by the Town on any amounts withheld under this provision.

Withholding of Payment: If a work element has not been received by the Town by the dates established in Attachment A, the Town may withhold all payments beginning with the month following that date until such deficiency has been corrected.

Final Payment: The final payment shall be made upon acceptance of the final work product and receipt of the final billing.

The Town would like to complete upgrades to their caustic dosing system at their primary WTP. Currently, operators must manually control the dosing of the post-filtration caustic feed system by modifying speed at the dosing pumps as plant flow rates change.

The caustic feed system is in a pilot trial as part of optimum corrosion control treatment (OCCT) to raise the finished water pH up to 8.5 post-filtration. The Town desires to install a permanent dosing pump system which will utilize caustic stored in the bulk storage tanks in the chemical storage building recently constructed. Since this is part of the pH adjustment for OCCT, the Town will likely need a duty/standby setup per CDPHE Drinking Water Policy 005 requirements.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Board of Trustees acts as the Local Liquor Licensing Authority and reviews all new applications for new liquor licenses. Deppen Brewing LLC submitted an application on March 31, 2025 for a Brew Pub Liquor License, located at 3999 GW Bush Ave, Unit 101.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

When approving or denying an application, the Authority must consider if the reasonable requirements of the defined neighborhood are not presently being met by existing establishments, the desires of the adult inhabitants, and the number, type and availability of other similar liquor establishments located in or near the petitioned neighborhood as well as the moral character of the applicants.

The Town Clerk's Office received the concurrent application on March 31, 2025, and have not received any concerns from the State Department of Revenue at this time. The applicant has provided information regarding legal possession, use and orientation of the licensed premise and the background of the managing members. A diagram of the proposed premises has also been included for the Board's review. The Larimer County Sheriff's Office has conducted an inspection of the premises and the report of inspection is attached.

In accordance with the requirements of the Colorado Revised Statutes, notice of a public hearing on this application has been posted conspicuously on the premises and published in a newspaper of general circulation at least 10 days prior, on May 13, 2025.

The Applicant submitted a Neighborhood Needs and Desires petition on May 15, 2025 to the Town Clerk's Office. After review from the boundary that was set upon receipt of the application, Staff found the below findings:

- 214 signatures were collected from March 31, 2025 to May 13, 2025
- 108 were found to be out of the boundary set and disqualified
- 106 were found to be sufficient and counted

Should the Authority approve the license, Staff will continue working with the Department of Revenue and various Town Departments to ensure all approvals and permits are met prior to the applicant receiving the license.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

MFF Ltd. doing business as Soul Squared has submitted a Modification of Premise of their liquor-licensed premises. Soul Squared has a Tavern Liquor License, which expires on December 15, 2025. Soul Squared has acquired a lease for the building attached to the current premise and the modification would expand the current area to include the neighboring unit as noted in the diagram included in the packet. Also submitted is a Report of Changes regarding the LLC/partnership structure. This application notes the removal of the previous officer, Christopher Magana, and replacing him with Travis Morton.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

Staff received the modification of premise application on April 17, 2025 and notice has been posted according to State Statue. The internal review provided the below comments:

- Larimer County Sheriff's Office did not express any concerns with the modification.
- Wellington Fire Protection District and the Town's Building Department expressed concerns with the change in occupancy and seeks clarification on the total occupancy amount. At the time of the packet materials being submitted, architectural drawings were not available for WFPD or Building to review, however both agreed to the overall expansion, should all permits be obtained and approved.

Staff did hold a meeting with WFPD and Building along with the applicant to discuss expectations, requirements and permits needed should the modification be approved.

The application for Report of Changes was received on April 17, 2025. Staff has received and reviewed the required Individual History Report and Partnership agreement and have no concerns to be addressed.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The preliminary plat for Sage Farms Filing 1 is the first proposed phase of development within the Sage Farms Annexation. Sage Farms is a 293.5-acre site on the southwest side of Town that was annexed to the Town in January 2024. The Sage Farms Planned Unit Development (PUD) approved for the site establishes the future intent and zoning for the development and provides for an integrated mix of single-family residential, multifamily residential, and parks and open space uses.

The preliminary plat for Sage Farms Filing 1, is a proposed subdivision of 241 single-family lots, open space areas, five outlots for future development, and one lot for existing agricultural operations. In reviewing a preliminary plat, the Board of Trustees evaluates the proposal using the Findings for Approval [Municipal Code Section 15-2-170(d)]. The Findings are intended to consider the plat's functionality and consistency with the Land Use Code and Comprehensive Plan, conformance with the goals and policies of the Comprehensive Plan in promoting the Town's small town and rural character, diversifying the housing supply, benefiting the Town's economic base, incorporating parks and open space, protecting the Town's environmental quality, enhancing cultural, historical, educational and/or human service opportunities, that the utility design is adequate, that the transportation design meets the intent of the Comprehensive Plan, that negative impacts have been satisfactorily mitigated, and that there is a need or desirability within the community for the applicant's development.

The preliminary plat for the proposed Sage Farms Filing 1 was presented to the PROST Board for consideration of the parks, open space and trails proposed. The PROST Board supported the overall subdivision layout and requested additional consideration for some design details for playground surfaces and trail width and surface.

The Planning Commission held a public hearing to consider the preliminary plat and voted to forward a recommendation of approval to the Board of Trustees based on the Findings for Approval included in the Staff Report. The Planning Commission report and included Findings is attached.

The Board of Trustees conducts a public hearing when evaluating a preliminary plat request. Approval of a preliminary plat allows the applicant to proceed with preparation of the final plat. The final plat process includes completing the subdivision map, submitting final design and construction drawings for public improvements, and consideration of a Development Agreement. The final plat for Sage Farms Filing 1 will be presented to the Planning Commission and Board of Trustees for consideration.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

On January 23, 2024, the Wellington Board of Trustees passed Ordinance No. 02-2024 that approved the Sage Farms Annexation and Village at Sage Farms Annexation and established the zoning as a Planned Unit Development (PUD). The Sage Farms PUD allows a mix of single-family residential, multi-family residential, commercial, and parks and open space uses. A Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District is an



approved development plan with adopted zoning regulations that supplement the underlying base zoning district. It is a unified plan of development that does not correspond to typical regulations outlined in the Land Use Code and allows for flexibility and innovative design.

The Sage Farms PUD will be developed as a phased development. This first development phase, Sage Farms Filing 1, is for a major subdivision of the 293.5-acre site to create 241 single-family lots, open space areas, five outlots for future development, and one lot for existing agricultural operations. An "Outlot" is a parcel of land that is designated as unbuildable and is intended to be replatted and developed in the future in accordance with adopted procedures and development standards.

On April 9, 2025, the Parks, Recreation, Open Space, and Trails (PROST) Board reviewed the parks and open space areas proposed in the preliminary plat for Sage Farms Filing 1. The PROST Board was supportive of the overall parks and trails layout and connectivity, including the north-south trail alignment, the locations and layout of the pocket parks, and the enhanced trail crossings at Streets B and H. The PROST Board suggested the developer consider adding pedestrian lighting options, poured in-place rubber surfacing for the playground, and evaluate and make recommendations for trail width and surfacing design suitable for meeting the intent of the 2015 Parks and Trails Master Plan and the neighborhood context. The trail standards can be updated with the final plat submission.

The purpose of the major subdivision preliminary plat is to provide the Town with an overall master plan for the proposed development (Section 15-2-170). The preliminary plat should be evaluated using the following Findings for Approval (Section 15-2-170(d)):

- 1. The preliminary plat represents a functional system of land use and is consistent with the rationale and criteria set forth in this Code and the Comprehensive Plan.
- 2. The land use mix within the project conforms to the Town's Zoning District Map and furthers the goals and policies of the Comprehensive Plan including:
 - a. The proposed development promotes the Town's small town, rural character;
 - b. Proposed residential development adds diversity to the Town's housing supply;
 - c. Proposed commercial development will benefit the Town's economic base;
 - d. Parks and open space are incorporated into the site design;
 - e. The proposed project protects the Town's environmental quality; and
 - f. The development enhances cultural, historical, educational and/or human service opportunities.
- 3. The utility design is adequate at a capacity that promotes the Town's character while strengthening the Town's vitality.
- 4. The transportation design meets the intent of the Comprehensive Plan to provide increased connectivity, reduce traffic impacts, and encourage walkability.
- 5. Negative impacts on adjacent land uses have been identified and satisfactorily mitigated.
- 6. There is a need or desirability within the community for the applicant's development and the development will help achieve a balance of land use and/or housing types within the Town, according to the Town's goals.

On May 5, 2025, the Planning Commission held a public hearing to consider the preliminary plat for Sage Farms Filing 1. The staff report that was presented to the Planning Commission is attached with this report and should be referenced for consideration of the above findings. Following the public hearing, the Planning Commission voted to forward a recommendation to the Board of Trustees to approve the preliminary plat for Sage Farms Filing 1, as presented, based on the Findings for Approval.



The findings that the Planning Commission based their recommendation on are in the attached Planning Commission report under "Background/Discussion." The Board of Trustees considers the same Findings for Approval that are considered by the Planning Commission. The Board of Trustees may adopt the Planning Commission's Findings, may modify the Planning Commission's Findings, or may make its own Findings. Upon making Findings for Approval, the Board may choose to approve the preliminary plat, approve the preliminary plat with conditions, or deny the preliminary plat application.

This preliminary plat was advertised for public hearings before the Planning Commission and Board of Trustees as required by law. Staff received one written correspondence in support included as *Attachment I* in the attached Planning Commission staff report. No other written correspondence or phone calls on the Sage Farms Filing 1 preliminary plat hearing item were received by the time the Board of Trustees agenda packet was published.

- Reliable and Resilient Public Services Transportation Goal 1. Create an efficient and safe transportation system for all modes of transportation within and beyond town boundaries.
- Reliable and Resilient Public Services Transportation Goal 2. Improve safety and connectivity of trails and sidewalks to provide active transportation to everyday destinations like schools, parks, downtown, and places for work, worship, and shopping.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Approval of the preliminary plat will allow the applicant to move forward with the final plat and closer to construction. Property taxes and building material use tax collected from new developments fund Town operations for essential services. Impact fee revenues generated from new development fund Town infrastructure, streets, and parks necessitated by growth.

Infrastructure needed for the development is installed or improved and paid for by the developer. Where Town infrastructure plans require over-sizing to meet future growth needs, the Town has the ability to share costs for the incremental oversizing costs, take advantage of construction equipment while it is already mobilized for



construction, and limit the disruption and expense of excavating in already developed areas to expand existing infrastructure. Additionally, streets and infrastructure installed to support the proposed subdivision will meet the infrastructure needs of the future commercial lots that will create opportunities for existing businesses to expand and new businesses to locate in Wellington that will strengthen the Town's economic base and generate additional retail sales tax.

There is no direct cost to the Town associated with a preliminary plat approval. Any financial impacts to the Town for subdivision development or infrastructure oversizing are contemplated in a development agreement and is evaluated by the Board of Trustees with the consideration of the final plat.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of the preliminary plat of Sage Farms Filing 1 based upon the recommendation and Findings for Approval made by the Planning Commission at the May 5, 2025, public hearing.

MOTION RECOMMENDATION

Move to approve the preliminary plat for Sage Farms Filing 1 based on the Findings for Approval recommended by the Planning Commission and authorize the applicant to move forward with preparation of the final plat.

Reason For Request:

Background:

- The Sage Farms PUD will be developed as a phased development. The first filing for phase 1 is a major subdivision of the 293.5 acres site to create 241 single-family lots, open space areas, five outlots for future development, and one lot for existing agricultural operations.
- A Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District is an approved development plan with adopted zoning regulations that supplement the underlying base zoning district. A PUD is a unified plan of development that does not correspond to typical regulations outlined in the Land Use Code and allows for flexibility and innovative design. The PUD District "is created to allow and encourage compatible uses to be developed in accordance with a unified development plan in harmony with the environment and surrounding neighborhood" (Land Use Code Section 15-3-50(2)).
- An "Outlot" is a parcel of land that is designated as unbuildable and is intended to be replatted and developed in the future in accordance with adopted procedures and development standards.
- Pursuant to the Land Use Code Section 15-2-170, "the purpose of the major subdivision preliminary plat is to provide the Town with an overall master plan for the proposed development."
- On April 9, 2025, the Parks, Recreation, Open Space, and Trails (PROST) Board reviewed the parks and open space areas proposed for the preliminary plat for Sage Farms Filing 1.



- 1. The PROST Board was supportive of the overall parks and trails layout and connectivity, including the north-south trail alignment, the locations and layout of the pocket parks, and the enhanced trail crossings at Streets B and H.
- 2. The PROST Board suggested the developer consider adding pedestrian lighting options, poured-in-place rubber surfacing for the playground, and evaluate and make recommendations for trail width and surfacing design suitable for meeting the intent of the 2015 Parks and Trails Master Plan and the neighborhood context. The trail standards can be updated with the final plat submission.
- The preliminary plat and Sage Farms PUD text amendments are submitted for concurrent review. The applications are being considered concurrently but are processed as separate requests.
- The PUD text amendments and preliminary plat were advertised for public hearings before the Planning Commission and Board of Trustees as required by law.
 - 1. Staff received one written correspondence in support included as *Attachment I*. No other written correspondence or phone calls on the Sage Farms Filing 1 preliminary plat hearing item were received by the time the agenda packet was published.

Preliminary Plat Process and Findings for Approval:

- A preliminary plat application was submitted to Town staff for review in accordance with Section 15-2-170 of the Land Use Code.
- The application was determined to be complete. Town staff reviewed submitted documents, including the soils report, sanitary sewer capacity memo, irrigation plans, preliminary utility plans, preliminary plat, preliminary plat closure report, preliminary drainage report, traffic impact study, landscape and open space plans, and North Poudre Irrigation Company (NPIC) ditch lateral modification plans.
- The Planning Commission evaluates the project using the following criteria Preliminary Plat Findings for Approval (Land Use Code Section 15-2-170(d):
- 1. The preliminary plat represents a functional system of land use and is consistent with the rationale and criteria set forth in the Land Use Code and the Comprehensive Plan.
- 2. The land use mix within the project conforms to the Town's Zoning District Map and furthers the goals and policies of the Comprehensive Plan including:
 - a. The proposed development promotes the Town's small town, rural character;
 - b. Proposed residential development adds diversity to the Town's housing supply;
 - c. Proposed commercial development will benefit the Town's economic base;
 - d. Parks and open space are incorporated into the site design;
 - e. The proposed project protects the Town's environmental quality; and
 - f. The development enhances cultural, historical, educational and/or human service opportunities.
- 3. The utility design is adequate at a capacity that promotes the Town's character while strengthening the Town's vitality.
- 4. The transportation design meets the intent of the Comprehensive Plan to provide increased connectivity, reduce traffic impacts, and encourage walkability.
- 5. Negative impacts on adjacent land uses have been identified and satisfactorily mitigated.
- 6. There is a need or desirability within the community for the applicant's development and the development will help achieve a balance of land use and/or housing types within the Town, according to the Town's goals.
- The Planning Commission will need to consider any testimony presented during the public hearing.



- Preliminary plats are processed in accordance with Section 15-2-170(c)(3.a.) of the Land Use Code and are reviewed by the Planning Commission at a public hearing, and a recommendation is forwarded to the Board of Trustees. The Planning Commission may make one of the following recommendations:
 - o Recommend approval of the preliminary plat;
 - o Recommend approval of the preliminary plat with conditions;
 - o Recommend denial of the preliminary plat application.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

The Findings for Approval for a preliminary plat are listed below (in **bold** text), along with Staff's recommendation for each finding (in regular text).

Findings for Approval (Land Use Code Section 15-2-170(d)):

- 1. The preliminary plat represents a functional system of land use and is consistent with the rationale and criteria set forth in the Land Use Code and the Comprehensive Plan.
 - The Future Land Use Map identifies this area as a mix of commercial, low density residential, medium density residential, and parks and open space. The portion of the Sage Farms PUD proposed to be platted as Sage Farms Filing 1 is the area designated as Low Density Residential. In the Comprehensive Plan (pg. 81) it is described as "Neighborhoods composed predominantly of detached and attached single family homes that are supported by neighborhood amenities and public facilities. While these areas may be more reliant on vehicles given the dispersion of housing, they should still be connected to the Town's trail network providing safe and active means to access jobs, services, schools, and parks, and connecting to the larger, regional trail system."
 - The proposed layout of 241 single-family lots and open space areas with trail connections throughout this phase of the development is consistent with the intent of the low density residential designation outlined in the Sage Farms PUD and Comprehensive Plan.
 - The preliminary plat has been designed to be consistent with the approved Sage Farms Planned Unit Development (PUD) Zone Overlay District. For the proposed preliminary plat of Sage Farms Filing 1, the area primarily impacted is designated as "Single-Family A." The intent of this designation, as outlined in the Sage Farms PUD, is "to provide for the development of Single-Family Detached Dwellings and Single-Family Attached Dwellings including Parks, Open space, trail systems, and green belts."
 - The development of single-family lots and two pocket parks with trail connectivity is consistent with the intent of the Sage Farms PUD.
 - The preliminary plat for Sage Farms Filing 1 creates the possibility for a mix of detached and attached single-family dwellings in a walkable environment that is connected to surrounding trails and park amenities.
- 2. The land use mix within the project conforms to the Town's Zoning District Map and furthers the goals and policies of the Comprehensive Plan including:
 - a. The proposed development promotes the Town's small town, rural character;
 - o The Sage Farms PUD was created to be sensitive to existing surrounding uses.



o The preliminary plat for Sage Farms Filing 1 to create 241 single-family lots will be a similar layout and density to the existing surrounding residential neighborhoods at Sage Meadows, Columbine Estates (otherwise known as Mountain View Ranch), and the Knolls Subdivision.

b. Proposed residential development adds diversity to the Town's housing supply;

- The preliminary plat showing the lot layouts is included as *Attachment C*.
- o The proposed lot layouts for residential development range in size from approximately 4,000 square feet to 12,000 square feet, with the typical lot at around 5,000 square feet. This diversity of lot sizes will allow for flexibility in the layout and sizes of the homes, which will add diversity to the Town's housing supply.
- Outlots are proposed to be designated with access to public streets and utility infrastructure that would support additional housing diversity following future approvals.

c. Proposed commercial development will benefit the Town's economic base;

- Outlot C on the preliminary plat is proposed for a future commercial development. Streets and utilities will be installed that support the future commercial development.
- Outlot E as proposed on the preliminary plat is also anticipated to be further subdivided in the future and will include development of commercial uses in the future.
- o Beginning infrastructure installation now and planning for future phases that include commercial development benefits the Town's economic base.

d. Parks and open space are incorporated into the site design;

- o The Bicycle and Pedestrian Recommendations Map (Comprehensive Plan, pg. 64) was created before the Sage Farms PUD was approved. The preliminary plat for the Sage Farms Filing 1 development proposes to connect to the existing priority bicycle and pedestrian corridor identified north of G.W. Bush Ave. at Sage Meadows Dr.
- o Two pocket parks are required for this phase of development based on the number of single-family lots being platted (1 pocket park for each 200 dwellings). A pocket park is located near the entrance of the development from G.W. Bush Ave. (Tract DD on the preliminary plat) and the second pocket park is located in the middle of Block 7 (Tract FF on the preliminary plat).
- o A north-south trail is proposed through this phase of the development and will connect across G.W. Bush Ave. to the existing trail adjacent to Sage Meadows Dr.
- o Conceptual landscape and park details are included as *Attachment G*.

e. The proposed project protects the Town's environmental quality; and

- The developer and North Poudre Irrigation Company (NPIC) are working to relocate and underground the irrigation ditch lateral at the northwest corner of the Sage Farms PUD development area.
- A geologic and preliminary geotechnical investigation report was included with the application. This
 report includes development recommendations for grading and additional testing during
 construction. These recommendations will be followed to ensure appropriate grading, compaction,
 and utility construction.
- o The existing agricultural uses on the property have impacted the natural environment. Agricultural operations on the larger property will continue until areas are developed for approved urban uses.



• Established and operating groundwater wells will be the source of water for outdoor irrigation that will ensure landscaped areas remain attractive.

f. The development enhances cultural, historical, educational and/or human service opportunities.

- o There are no known cultural or historical elements associated with the existing project site.
- o The proposed trail connection will support the culture of the community by enhancing outdoor recreation and fitness.
- o As outlined in the 2021 Comprehensive Plan, a component of the Town's character is its agricultural heritage.
 - The existing agricultural operations yard along State Highway 1 will be platted as Block 14, Lot 1 in the preliminary plat. This configuration allows the agricultural uses to remain in operation until the future phases of the project result in the land being redeveloped.

3. The utility design is adequate at a capacity that promotes the Town's character while strengthening the Town's vitality.

- Water, sanitary sewer, and stormwater infrastructure designs are included in the overall preliminary utility plans for Sage Farms Filing 1 (*Attachment D*).
- Water and sanitary sewer lines are designed to meet the needs for this phase of single-family lots and includes stubouts for future buildout of the adjacent commercial and multi-family developments.
- Water distribution plans include adequate fire hydrant spacing for fire protection.
- o Sanitary sewer design plans include oversizing of interceptor lines to accommodate areas of future growth in accordance with the Town's infrastructure plans and oversizing policies.
- o A non-potable water irrigation system is being designed to utilize existing groundwater wells on the site and will ensure preservation of Town-treated water resources.
- The proposed irrigation ponds will have access to the North Poudre Irrigation Company (NPIC) ditch water as a redundant irrigation water supply alternative to further protect Town-treated water sources.
- The Developer is working with NPIC to enclose the existing irrigation ditch lateral that supports safety and aesthetics along the collector roadway and adjacent to trails, sidewalks and residential uses.

4. The transportation design meets the intent of the Comprehensive Plan to provide increased connectivity, reduce traffic impacts, and encourage walkability.

- o The Master Street Plan Map (Comprehensive Plan, pg. 62) identifies G.W. Bush Ave. (CR 60) as an arterial roadway. The development contemplates constructing improvements to this roadway to accommodate the additional single-family residential densities, and future multi-family and commercial uses.
- With the first phase of construction, the south side of G.W. Bush Ave. will also include a detached sidewalk consistent with this corridor and will connect with existing public sidewalks.
- 10 ft. public sidewalks are also included along Wild Grass Ln. adjacent to the future commercial Outlot and prioritizes pedestrian traffic along this collector roadway.



- A trail system is proposed north-south through the development that will connect the pocket parks and existing trail at Sage Meadows Dr. This trail system increases pedestrian connectivity and encourages walkability.
- 5. Negative impacts on adjacent land uses have been identified and satisfactorily mitigated.
 - o Negative impacts on adjacent land uses are not anticipated as a result of the preliminary plat.
 - o The single-family residential character of Sage Farms Filing 1 is compatible with the existing adjacent residential land uses to the north and east at Sage Meadows Subdivision, Columbine Estates Subdivision (also known as Mountain View Ranch) and The Knolls Subdivision.
- 6. There is a need or desirability within the community for the applicant's development and the development will help achieve a balance of land use and/or housing types within the Town, according to the Town's goals.
 - o In the 2025-2029 Strategic Plan, the Board of Trustees identified the goal to grow responsibly by advancing cohesive and holistic new developments and by improving housing diversity.
 - Sage Farms Filing 1 is the first phase of the master planned 293.5-acre Sage Farms PUD development. This initial phase is for a portion of the single-family development.
 - The infrastructure and layout for the future multi-family and commercial developments is being considered with this stage of the development to ensure a cohesive and usable space for all anticipated land uses and modes of transportation.
 - o In the 2025-2029 Strategic Plan, the Board of Trustees identified the goal to foster economic vibrancy.
 - The future phases of the Sage Farms PUD will incorporate commercial uses that are anticipated to expand current local business and recruit new businesses.
 - o The 2025 Housing Needs & Affordability Assessment identifies that approximately 800 new residential units are needed by 2030 to meet projected homeownership demand.
 - The addition of 241 single-family residential lots in this proposed phase of development will help to meet the projected demand.
 - Infrastructure supporting the Outlots for future development of multi-family and single-family attached units will also contribute to meeting projected demand for a variety of housing types and price ranges.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Based upon the above findings, Town staff recommends the preliminary plat for Sage Farms Filing 1 satisfies the Findings for Approval in accordance with the Land Use Code and Town staff recommends approval of the preliminary plat (motion option 1, below).

Below are motion options for the Planning Commission to consider:

- 1. Move to forward a recommendation to the Board of Trustees to approve the preliminary plat for Sage Farms Filing 1, as presented, based on the Findings for Approval.
- 2. Move to forward a recommendation to the Board of Trustees to approve the preliminary plat for Sage Farms Filing 1, based on the Findings for Approval and including conditions of approval.
- 3. Move to forward a recommendation to the Board of Trustees to deny the preliminary plat for Sage Farms Filing 1 based on the Findings for Approval.
- 4. Move to continue the public hearing to a future date.

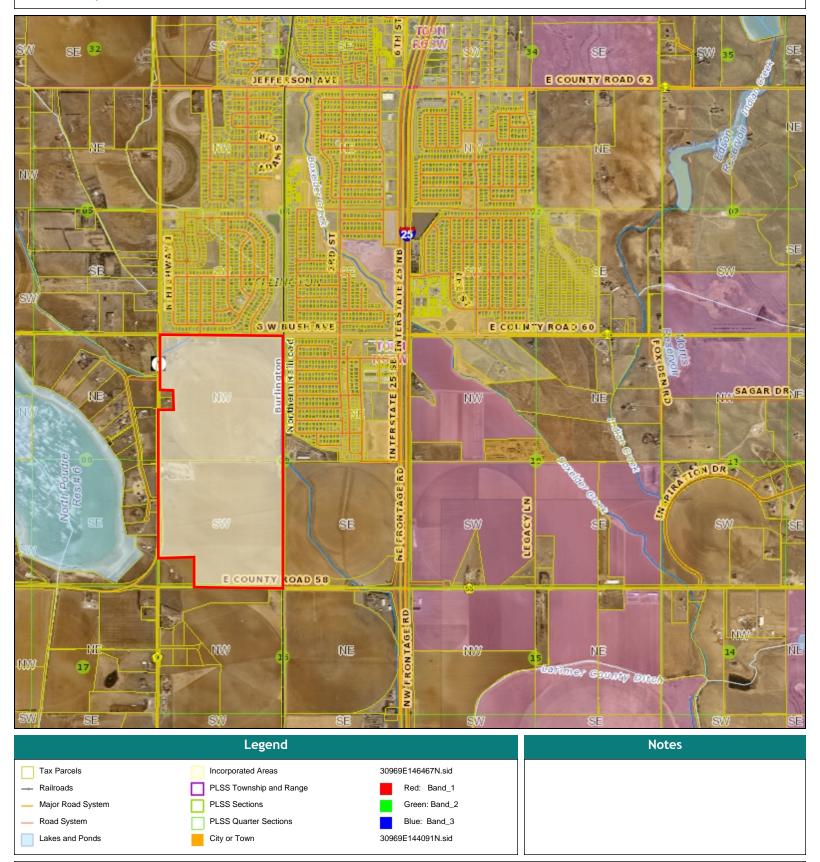

Sage Farms First Filing Preliminary Plat

The Town of Wellington Planning Commission approved the Sage Farms Annexation and PUD zoning on August 8, 2023, and the Town Board approved the annexation and zoning on January 23, 2024, with Resolution 20-2023 and 21-2024 and Ordinance Number 02-2024. This first Filing includes portions of the north half of the Sage Farms PUD allowing single and multi-family residential, parks and open space as well as the commercial parcel on the southeast corner of the GW Bush and Hwy. 1 intersection.

The project site for Filing 1 consists of approximately 293.5 acres that will be subdivided into single-family detached residential homes, open space, several pocket parks, and outlots for future development. 241 single family lots are proposed and 5 additional outlots for future development as well as a 3.7-acre lot along the east side of Hwy. 1 where the existing agricultural operations are being conducted. Future commercial and multifamily developments are planned along the south side of G.W. Bush Ave. as approved on the Sage Farms P.U.D. (Tracts A-D).

The higher density multi-family tracts are located to the north of the site and transition to the lower density single-family homes, The commercial development is located north and west of the multi-family parcels proving somewhat of a buffer from the lower density single-family homes.

A variety of housing types and sizes will be included within this first filing including alley loaded single-family homes and varying lot sizes so that there is a mix of different home sizes and price ranges. The development will provide street, sidewalk and trail connections to the neighborhood to the north (Sage Meadows) but is currently limited to providing connections to the east by the existing railroad and the west by State Highway 1. Connections to the south will be continued as the parcels south of this first filing are developed.

Existing Zoning and Land Uses

The current zoning is – Town of Wellington PUD – Planned Unit Development Overlay District The current land use is agricultural.

Natural and Man-Made Site Features

The proposed development is located at the southeast corner of G.W. Bush Avenue and Colorado Hwy. 1 about 1.50 miles west of Interstate 25. The site is approximately 3 miles south of the downtown area of Wellington. It is bounded to the east by the BNSF railroad. It is part of the Northwest Quarter of Section 9, Township 8 North, Range 68 West of the 6th P.M. Town of Wellington, County of Larimer, State of Colorado.

The property is currently being used for farming and agricultural uses and it has a portion of the North Poudre Irrigation Company ditch running through the north, east and west portions of the site. The proposed development will install an irrigation pipe along the south side of G.W. Bush Ave. to underground the existing open ditch and is working with the North Poudre Irrigation Company on the design of the pipeline. The site slopes from north to south with the lowest point on the property in the southeast corner. There are several existing farmhouses and numerous outbuildings on the site as well as several large trees. Railroad tracks border the east property line of the site.

Water Rights Information

The Town of Wellington, Colorado will provide potable water services.

Irrigation for residential and commercial landscaping, lawns and parks will be provided by existing non-potable water well historically used to irrigate the lands included within the Sage Farms First Filing. A Special Purpose Entity (SPE) will own the existing well and provide the required irrigation water to the HOA for all outdoor watering. A separate North Poudre Irrigation lateral will be constructed to provide additional irrigation water to the SPE if needed to supplement the existing well water.

It will be irrigated by non-potable water provided by the following water well:

Kershner Well and Pumping System with Subterranean Water Well Priority No. 265 S.W., Appropriation Date: May 31, 1947; Adjudication Date: September 10, 1953, CA 11217, for 4.01 cubic feet per second ("Kershner Well"). The Kershner Well was registered on February 17, 1958 under Registration Number 19015, with change of ownership registration on January 2, 2013 under Registration Number 19015-R.

The well water provided by the Kershner Well will be utilized only to irrigate land historically irrigated by the Kershner Well.

Existing and Proposed Infrastructure

Three access locations to the project site will be on G. W. Bush Ave. Sage Meadows Drive will continue south as a full-movement intersection. Wild Grass Lane will also continue south and the intersection with G.W. Bush Ave. will be replaced with a roundabout. An additional right-in/right-out assess from G.W. Bush Ave. just east of Hwy 1 is provided for the future development of the northwest commercial lot. (Tract C).

State Highway 1 and G.W. Bush Ave. – Currently (without and development of Sage Farms) during morning peak hour with existing traffic, a signal warrant is almost reached for SH 1 and G.W. Bush Ave. The signal warrant will be met in the morning peak hour with full build out of Sage Meadows Filing 2. Delich Associates compared traffic counts they did in 2022 for the Mast TIS and the 2024 counts they did in May. Traffic on G.W. Bush Ave. has increased 30%. The through traffic of SH1 increased 58%. This increase may be associated with the new middle school and high school.

The proposed road infrastructure will follow the typical cross sections detailed in the approved Sage Farms PUD document. This includes design criteria and dimensions for the minor collector, residential local, and alley streets.

A pedestrian trail connection to the Sage Meadows subdivision, north of G.W. Bush Ave., is proposed with this development. It will be routed internally through the site and provides a location for future connections on the south side of the neighborhood next to the interim pond. This trail will be continued with the relocation of the pond and future development of the south tracts. This trail will provide a continuation of the trail system in Wellington and provide safe pedestrian circulation throughout the neighborhood and to future commercial areas.

Existing water mains which will serve the property are located within the existing Town limits in the Sage Meadows neighborhood to the north as well as within GW Bush Ave. A sanitary sewer trunk main is located just north of the site within Sage Meadows neighborhood in Wild Grass Lane that will be extended to the south and east to serve future phases of Sage Farms as well as future development north and west of Sage Meadows. Another 15" sanitary sewer main is located along the eastern portion of the property and connects to the existing sanitary sewer to the east. This existing sanitary sewer main will serve the majority of the single-family homes and the commercial parcel within this first filing plat. The developer and Town of Wellington will need to agree to a cost sharing agreement for the extension of the sanitary sewer mains required to serve the remaining residential units within the Sage Farms PUD and well as the Village of Sage Farms

commercial development south of this first filing plat prior to any other additional future development.

Drainage and stormwater will be collected using a system of swales, curb and gutter, and storm drain systems. Stormwater flows will be conveyed and discharged to an interim pond on the south side of Filing 1. This pond will provide the volume required for the single-family residential area and 4 future tracts (Tracts A-D). With the future development of the south tract this pond will be resized and relocated. The pond will be an infiltration pond because of the lack of surrounding infrastructure.

Financing of Municipal Service Expansion

Sage Farms will be developed in phases pursuant to the existing Annexation Agreement and a written development agreement providing for the expansion of the Town's utilities and roads required for each development phase. The developer shall enter into a cost sharing (reimbursement) agreement with the Town that allows the developer to be reimbursed for any improvements that benefit this and other properties as these properties develop and connect into these improvements. These regional improvements include the required sanitary sewer main extensions through the Sage Farms development and to the east of the site as well as traffic related improvements to State Highway 1. The developer will most likely finance the required improvements and expansions through private funds and construction loans secured by the property.

Development Phasing and Schedule

Sage Farms First Filing will be developed in a series of phases with the first phase of development construction hopefully beginning in the fall of 2025 with lots available by mid to late 2026. The first phase will include approximately 100-125 single family lots with the future phases being developed based upon market conditions. This first phase will also allow for the development of the commercial parcel in the northwest portion of the site after approval of a site plan by the Town of Wellington.

Statement on how the Proposed Preliminary Plat is Consistent with the Wellington Land Use Code and Comprehensive Plan

The Town of Wellington has recently updated the Town's Comprehensive Plan and the Land Use Code, and the plan anticipates and accommodates future growth with the Town's Growth Management Area. Over the past fifteen to twenty years, the Town has witnessed a significant amount of residential growth. Wellington residents want to continue to investigate the development of innovative land uses that provide a sound tax base, preserve the quality of life, and balance residential and commercial development. Citizens want to ensure that new development does not overburden existing infrastructure and services and does not detract from the community's existing character."

In following the Town's vision for purposefully planning for growth as outlined in the Comprehensive Plan, the proposed development ensures the logical extension of the Town existing neighborhoods in a fiscally sound manner providing predictability in the rate, location and character of the growth within the Town's Growth Management Area while not creating a net negative fiscal burden on the Town, and with an anticipated net positive fiscal benefit to the Town upon occupancy of all property zoned for residential and commercial uses in Sage Farms.

Wellington Comprehensive Plan and Land Use Code

The Town of Wellington has adopted a Comprehensive Plan and the Wellington Land Use Code of which both describe and require future development within the Town to meet standards that will provide the same level of service to new areas as it is currently providing within the existing town. These documents, we believe, allow the Town to achieve controlled, orderly and efficient growth. To accomplish orderly, controlled growth, Wellington will rely on the Town's Land Use Code and Comprehensive Plan to provide the basic guidelines for development and construction of new areas around the Town.

Statement of Conformance with the Wellington Comprehensive Master Plan

The Town of Wellington has recently updated the Town's Comprehensive Plan (2021) and the Community Vision Statement states "Our friendly and supportive community welcomes you with a smile. Together, we take pride in celebrating and protecting our town's character and values while welcoming productive ideas that enhance our quality of life. Our dreams take root and blossom in Wellington."

The citizens of Wellington choose to deal with the issue of growth proactively in order to maintain the quality of life in the community. Over the past fifteen years, the Town has witnessed a significant amount of residential growth. Wellington residents want to continue to investigate the development of innovative land uses that provide a sound tax base, preserve the quality of life, and balance residential and commercial development. Citizens want to ensure that new development does not overburden existing infrastructure and services and does not detract from the community's existing character."

In following the Town's Community Vision and Themes outlined in the Comprehensive Plan, the proposed development ensures the logical extension of the Town boundaries in a fiscally sound manner providing predictability in the rate, location and character of the growth within the Town's Growth Management Area while not creating a net negative fiscal burden on the Town.

The applicant believes that the proposed Rezoning and Preliminary Replat meet the intent of the Town's Comprehensive Plans Goals and Strategies. By allowing the rezoning and preliminary plat to proceed as proposed, the applicant has met the following goals and themes as stated in the 2021 Comprehensive Plan.

Community Cohesion (CC) Goals & Strategies

- CP.2.3 Identify incentives to encourage new housing developments and retrofits to include energy-efficient and water-wise materials and practices while ensuring homes are both affordable and cost comparable.
- CP.2.5 Ensure adequate park, trail, and open spaces are added to land use mix as the population grows.

Reliable & Resilient Public Services Facilities & Programs (F & P) Goals and Strategies

- F&P.1.2 Ensure the expansion and upgrades of utilities, infrastructure and amenities are consistent with Town Plans (e.g. Water Efficiency, Stormwater Management, Emergency Preparedness, Infrastructure Plan, and the Comprehensive Plan)
- F&P.2.2 Require new utilities and existing overhead utilities to be underground for major development projects.
- F&P.2.3 Require new development to demonstrate how they will connect to and improve the existing networks for active transportation, vehicular traffic, open space and parks and essential infrastructure for water, wastewater, and stormwater.

Statement of Conformance with the Wellington Land Use Code

It is the intent of the proposed Saddleback Subdivision Preliminary First Replat and Rezoning to comply with the Town's Land Use Code as it was revised and adopted in 2022. The applicant believes that the project as proposed is in compliance with the general intent of the Zoning and Subdivision Regulations of the Land Use Code including:

ZONING

3.01 Purpose and Organization

- 3.01.1 Purpose.
 - A. Encourage the most appropriate use of land throughout the Town and ensure logical growth of the various physical elements of the Town,

 - A. Intent. The Residential Medium Density District is intended for a mix of small lot single-family detached dwellings.
- 3.02.07 Table of Dimensional Standards for Residential Zones

4.01 Purpose and Organization

4.02-1 Table of Allowable Uses (for the R-3 Zoning District)

5.01 Purpose and Organization

5.01.1 Purpose. This article establishes uniform standards for the development and improvement of property throughout the Town of Wellington to ensure quality development that is consistent with the Town's Comprehensive Plan.

5.04 Landscaping and Screening

- 5.04.8 Park and Open Space Landscape Standards
 - A. Purpose and intent: Landscaping in park and open space areas that are commonly used by the public for passive and active recreation shall be appropriate to the use and function of the area, respectful of water conservation practices, and include trees, shrubs, ground cover, and site furnishings appropriate to use.
 - B. Applicability: The following requirements shall apply to all new development of public parks, pocket parks, detention ponds, trail connections and common open space areas for both public and HOA use.
 - C. General Design Standards
 - 1. All parks shall be landscaped and programmed to create a balance of plant material with no more than fifty percent (50%) of the total landscaped area comprised of high water plant species.
 - 5. Park periphery and detention pond areas shall consist of low water or native plant material and grass seed mix.
 - 6. Common open spaces and trail connections shall be landscaped with a balance of low water or native plant material and grass seed mix to reduce the need for supplemental irrigation in hard to reach areas.
 - 9. Development shall provide a mechanism such as a homeowners association and covenants for long-term maintenance of parks, detention ponds, and common open spaces, in order to ensure the continued upkeep of the property.
- 5.04.9 Standard Lot Detached and Attached Single-Family Residential Development Landscape Standards

- A. Purpose and intent: To ensure that single-family residences contain consistently landscaped front yards and are designed with water conservation in mind.
- B. Applicability: In addition to landscaping the right-of-way tree lawn, detached and attached single-family parcels developed as part of an overall subdivision, shall meet the following standards.
- C. General design standards:
 - 2. There shall be a minimum of seventy-five percent (75%) live materials between the front of the single-family residential structure and the curb, excluding the paved driveway areas.
 - 3. Each single-family residential owner shall maintain the owner's yard and landscaping within the adjacent road right-of-way.

5.05 Off-Street Parking

5.05.7 Off-Street Parking Requirement. Off-street parking shall be provided in accordance with the minimum ratios specified in Table 5.05.7-1

5.10 Stormwater and Sewer

5.10.1 Purpose. The intent of this section s to ensure that the stormwater drainage system addresses the broader goals of drainage and flood control problem alleviation, environmental preservation enhancement that consider quality, water way stability and natural habitat and resource protection, and long-term maintenance of the Town's drainage systems.

5.10.4 Sanitary sewer

- A. All residential uses shall have a sanitary sewer facilities designed by a registered professional engineer in accordance with the regulations and standards of the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment.
- B. The sanitary sewer system shall be connected to an existing public sanitary sewer system and consist of a closed system of sanitary sewer mains and lateral branch connections to each structure or lot upon which a structure is to be built.
- C. Sanitary sewer lines are to be of sufficient size and design to collect all sewage from all proposed pr portable structures within the subdivision or development and designed per the Town of Wellington Standard Design Criteria and Standard Construction Requirements.

5.10.5 Potable Water

B. All water utilities shall be designed per the Town of Wellington Standard Design Criteria and Standard Construction Requirements.

5.11 Transportation and Connectivity

5.11.1 Purpose.

- A. Establish a safe, efficient, attractive transportation system that promotes all modes of transportation and is sensitive to the environment.
- 5.11.3 Streets. The local street system of any proposed development is designed to be safe, efficient, convenient, and attractive and consider the use by all modes of transportation that will use the system.

A. Street Layout

- 1. All streets are aligned to join with planned or existing streets consistent with the approved Street Master Plan and Comprehensive Master Plan.
- 2. The street layout forms an interconnected system of streets primarily in a grid or modified pattern adapted to the topography, unique natural features, environmental constraints, and peripheral open space areas.
- 4. The use of cul-de-sacs and other roadways with a single point of access are minimized.

- F. Access. Access to all subdivisions shall come from a public street.
- I. Street Names. Names of new streets comply with the IGA with Larimer County and the Municipalities of Larimer County concerning standardization of street names.

5.11.4 Sidewalks, Pathways, and Trails

- B. Sidewalks Required
 - 1. In all zoning districts, except for the R-1, LI and I Districts, sidewalks are required along both sides of the street.

SUBDIVISION REGULATIONS

6.01 Purpose and Organization

- B. Intent. This Article promotes the health, safety, convenience, order, prosperity and welfare of the present and future inhabitants of the Town by:
 - 2. Promoting compact, well-defined neighborhoods that enhance the Town's character.
 - 3. Create livable neighborhoods that foster a sense of community.
 - 8. Providing open spaces for adequate stormwater management.

6.01 Design and Improvement Standards

- A. Applicability. All applications shall comply with the density, dimension, design and zoning standards per the approved PUD.
- C. Community Design Principles. The design, layout, and orientation of subdivisions, lots, buildings and infrastructure shall be consistent with the approved PUD and Comprehensive Plan.
 - 3.g Water conservation.
 - 4. Compact urban growth. The Comprehensive Master Plan includes a compact urban growth policy that encourages and directs development to take place within areas contiguous to existing development in the community.

6.02 Dedications

- A. Streets. All street rights-of-way shall be dedicated to the Town.
- B. Sidewalks, walkways, and multi-use trails
 - 1. All walkways, sidewalks, and multi-use paths located within the right-of-way shall be dedicated to the Town.
 - 2. All walkways, sidewalks, and multi-use paths that are not located with the right-of-way shall be dedicated to a duly formed owners' association.

C. Utilities

- 1. Utility easement width. Utility easement widths and locations shall comply with the design standards.
- 2. Multiple installations within easement. Easements shall be designed to provide efficient installation of utilities. Public utility installations shall be located to permit multiple installations within easements.
- 3. Underground utilities.
 - a. Telephone lines, electric lines, cable television lines and other utility services shall be placed underground.

Landscape Plan - Planting Beds







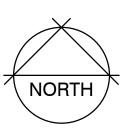
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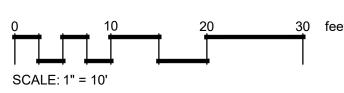

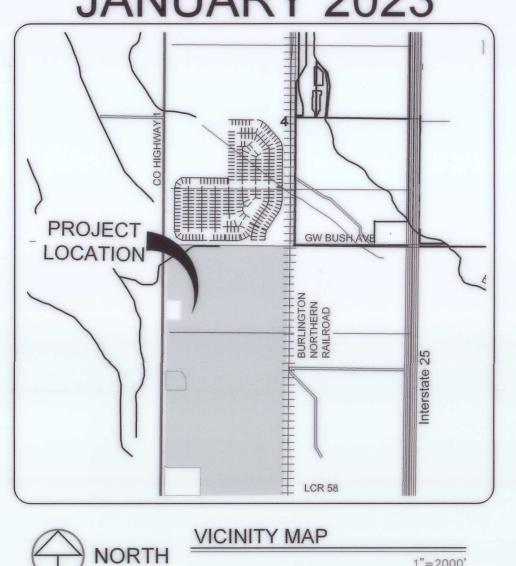

This Zoning Map is a PUD - Planned Unit Development Overlay District ("PUD Zone") to serve as a master-planned development under Land Use Code 15-3-50 for the zoning of the property consisting of approximately 291.1 acres within the serial annexations for Sage Farms Annexation and Village at Sage Farms Annexation to the Town of Wellington, Colorado ("Town").

This PUD Zone is a Site Specific Development Plan and a final development plan for this Planned Unit Development under Land Use Code 15-7-20 and under Colorado Revised Statutes Section 24-68-101 et. seq. for vested rights. This Mixed-Use PUD is intended to create a compatible variety of land uses that provide for a homogeneous development of mixed uses that are in keeping with the property's unique physical aspects including two existing irrigation water wells which can be used for non-potable irrigation of the developed property, access from two existing public roads and unique topography allowing drainage flows along the southeas portion of the property. This zoning map is also in compliance with the Town's Comprehensive Plan. The PUD Zoning Map supplements the underlying standard zone district with modification of lot size, bulk or type of use, density, lot coverage, open space or other considerations that are incompatible and inappropriate for the overall PUD Zone and that do not correspond with existing underlying standard zone district. H. PUD OVERLAY DISTRICT JUSTIFICATION

This PUD Zone is a mixed-use site development plan for property controlled by two affiliated landowners and under a unified plan of development for an anticipated number and density of residential dwelling units and commercial uses. It creates a compatible variety of land uses that provide for a homogeneous neighborhood of mixed uses and affordable housing that are in keeping with the property's unique, site specific topography for stormwater systems and two independent nonpotable irrigation systems that will be utilized consistent with historical water well usage. The northern portion of the property is currently adjoining public infrastructure sufficient to facilitate anticipated, existing market demand for residential dwelling units and commercial uses. Southern portion of the property is not currently served by public infrastructure sufficient to support development consistent with the objectives set forth in the Town Comprehensive Plan. The PUD Zone and vested property rights are necessary and desirable in order to ensure reasonable certainty and stability for the development of the property; stimulate economic growth consistent with the Town Comprehensive Plan; secure a reasonable investment-backed expectation over the lengthy timeframe anticipated to complete development of the residential neighborhoods and commercial uses; and, to foster public and private cooperation necessary to fund and then complete the community wide impact studies for the design, permitting, and construction of the anticipated off-site public infrastructure improvements to support development of the commercial uses in southern portions of the property consistent with the Town Comprehensive Plan. To accomplish these objectives, the PUD Zone overlays and modifies specific terms of the underlying standard zone district which do not correspond in lot size, bulk or type of use, density, lot coverage, open space and other considerations. J. DEFINITIONS

Accessory Building. A subordinate building or structure, the use of which is customarily incidental to that of the main building or to the main use of the land, which is located on the same lot (or on a contiguous lot in the same ownership) with the main building or use.

Accessory Dwelling Unit. An additional dwelling unit integrated within a single-family dwelling, or located in a detached accessory building, such as carriage houses or agricultural-type out buildings, located on the same lot as single-family dwellings. An Accessory Dwelling Unit is not counted as a dwelling unit in calculating the allowed density per acre in a zone district.

Accessory Use. A subordinate use, clearly incidental and related to the main structure, building or use of land and located on the same lot (or on a contiguous lot in the same ownership) as that of the main structure, building or use.

Alley. A paved constructed vehicular access way serving one (1) or more properties and abutting a public or private road. An Alley may

be a public or private access way. An Alley may satisfy, but does not need to satisfy, emergency access requirements.

Agriculture. The use of land for accessory uses for treating or storing farm products and equipment.

Bed and Breakfast. An establishment operated in a private residence or portion thereof, which provides temporary accommodations to overnight guests for a fee, and which is occupied by the operator of such establishment.

Boarding and Rooming House. A building or portion of which is used to accommodate, for compensation, four (4) or more boarders or roomers, not including members of the occupant's immediate family who might be occupying such building.

Building means any permanent structure built for the shelter or enclosure of persons, animals, chattels or property of any kind, which is governed by the following characteristics:

a) Is permanently affixed to the land.b) Has one (1) or more floors and a roof.

Child Care Center. A facility, by whatever name known, which is maintained for the whole or part of a day for the care of seven (7) or more children under the age of sixteen (16) years who are not related to the owner, operator or manager, whether such facility is operated with or without compensation for such care and with or without stated educational purposes, except that a childcare center shall not include any family child care home as defined by the State. The term includes, but is not limited to, facilities commonly known as day care centers, day nurseries, nursery schools, preschools, play groups, day camps, summer camps, centers for developmentally disabled children and those facilities which give twenty-four-hour-per-day care for dependent and neglected children. Child care centers are also those facilities for children under the age of six (6) years with stated educational purposes which are operated in conjunction with a public, private, or parochial college or a private or parochial school, except that the term shall not apply to a kindergarten maintained in connection with a public, private, or parochial elementary school system of at least six (6) grades.

Civic Space. Public or quasi-public uses in residential or business areas that are accessible to the public and primarily serve as gathering or meeting areas for the immediate community, or reserved as open space that provides a community amenity or promotes environmental or ecological functions. Civic spaces may be public buildings; defined space in residential, commercial, or mixed-use buildings; or outdoor space constructed to accommodate community gatherings. They can be the settings where celebrations are held, where social and economic exchanges take place, where friends run into each other, and where cultures mix. Civic spaces include active or passive recreational uses, nature and recreation trails, nature preserves (such as wildlife sanctuaries, conservation areas, and game preserves), cultural amenities (e.g. fountains, ice rinks, reflecting pools), open spaces, parks, squares, plazas, playgrounds, or memorial parks. This includes any of the following as defined below:

- Active recreation: Recreational uses requiring constructed facilities for organized activities, such as playing fields, ball courts, and playgrounds.
- b) Dog park: A park that provides a variety of recreational amenities for dogs and persons that may include benches, parking, restrooms, and water fountains. If dogs are to be unleashed, the area must be fenced.
- c) Community space: Buildings or facilities that provide gathering places, such as community centers, property owner association meeting spaces, or clubhouses.
- d) Open space: Areas of trees, shrubs, lawns, grass, pathways and other natural and man-made amenities not within individual building lots, set aside for the use and enjoyment of residents, visitors and other persons, unoccupied by buildings or facilities unless related to recreational activities. Generally, open space is intended to provide light and air and is designed for either scenic or recreational purposes. For the purpose of this Code, open space includes active recreation space, common open space, and dedicated open space.
- e) Park or plaza: An open space which may be improved and landscaped; usually surrounded by streets and buildings.
- f) Urban deck: A platform for landscaped greens or engineered to accommodate buildings, which spans over major roadways. The intent of an urban deck is to create and enable pedestrian movement across an otherwise, typically impenetrable barrier, and to provide space for activity that can link both sides of the roadway.
- g) Wetlands mitigation bank: A natural resource management technique authorized by Part 404 of the Federal Clean Water Act, or other state or federal law, as applicable, using wetland preservation, restoration, creation and/or enhancement to offset or replace wetland functions that are lost due to development. Wetland mitigation banks are typically large areas of wetlands operated by private or public entities, which may sell credits to other entities to compensate for wetland loss or impact at development sites or enter into other similar arrangements.

Code means the Municipal Code of the Town, including this Land Use Code.

Community Facility. A place, structure, area, or other facility used to provide fraternal, cultural, social, educational, or recreational programs or activities. This includes swimming pools, tennis courts, and similar facilities of a homeowners association, open to the public or a designated part of the public, and which may be publicly or privately owned.

Dwelling means a building used exclusively for residential occupancy, including single-family dwellings, two-family dwellings and multi-family dwellings.

Dwelling unit means one (1) or more rooms and a single kitchen and at least one (1) bathroom, designed, occupied or intended for occupancy as separate quarters for the exclusive use of a single family for living, cooking and sanitary purposes, located in a single-family, two-family or multi-family dwelling or mixed-use building.

Dwelling, two-family or duplex means a building occupied by two (2) families living independently of each other.

Golf Course. A tract of land laid out with a course having nine (9) or more holes for playing golf, including any accessory clubhouse, driving range, offices, restaurant, concession stand, picnic tables, pro shop, maintenance facilities, or similar accessory uses or structures.

Grocery Store. A retail establishment primarily selling food, as well as other convenience and household goods, without a limitation on the number of square feet of the Building structure.

Group Home state-licensed facilities for developmentally disabled, handicapped, seniors or children as defined by and meeting the requirements of Section 31-23-303(2), C.R.S., or similar state statute.

Home Occupation. An occupation or business activity which results in a product or service and is conducted in whole or in part in a dwelling unit and is subordinate to the residential use of the dwelling unit. Home Occupation shall not include home offices for

Industrial and Manufacturing, Heavy. Manufacturing of paper, chemicals, plastics, rubber, cosmetics, drugs, nonmetallic mineral products (such as concrete and concrete products, glass), primary metals, acetylene, cement, lime, gypsum or plaster-of-Paris, chlorine, corrosive acid or fertilizer, insecticides, disinfectants, poisons, explosives, paint, lacquer, varnish, petroleum products, coal products, plastic and synthetic resins, electrical equipment, appliances, batteries, and machinery. This group also includes asphalt mixing plants, concrete mixing plants, smelting, animal slaughtering, oil refining, and magazine contained explosives facilities.

Industrial and Manufacturing, Light. Manufacturing of products, from extracted, raw, recycled or secondary materials, including bulk storage and handling of those products and materials, or crushing, treating, washing, and/or processing of materials. This includes similar establishments, and businesses of a similar and no more objectionable character. It also includes incidental finishing and storage. Goods or products manufactured or processed on-site may be sold at retailor wholesale on or off the premises. This does not include any activity listed under Industrial and Manufacturing, Heavy. Examples of general manufacturing include the manufacture or production of the following goods or products: apparel (including clothing, shoes, dressmaking); boats and transportation equipment; brooms; caskets; communication or computation equipment; dairy products; die-cut paperboard and cardboard; drugs, medicines, pharmaceutical; electrical equipment or machinery; farm machinery; fasteners and buttons; feed and grain; food/baking(including coffee roasting, creameries, ice cream, ice, frozen food, confectionery, and beverage); fruit and vegetable processing, canning and storage; gaskets; glass products made of purchased glass; household appliances; industrial controls; leather and allied products; lithographic and printing processes (including printing plants as defined below); mattresses; medical equipment and supplies; medicines; mill work and similar woodwork; mobile homes; musical instruments; novelties; office supplies; optical goods; photographic equipment; prefabricated and modular housing and components; printing and print supplies (including printing plants); 3-D printing, radio and TV receiving sets; sanitary paper products; scientific and precision instruments; service industry machines; signs; textiles (including dyeing, laundry bags, canvas products, dry goods, hosiery, millinery); tobacco products; toys, sporting and athletic goods; and watches and clocks. A "printing plant" means a facility devoted to printing or bookbinding, including related large-scale storage and transshipment.

Land Use Code means Chapter 15 of the Town of Wellington Municipal Code.

Livestock includes horses, cattle, sheep and llamas, but does not include swine, chickens, goats, roosters, fowl, peacocks, guinea hens or other animals not allowed to be maintained within the Town by this Code (except that swine, chickens, goats, roosters, fowl, peacocks or guinea hens maybe permitted with the Board of Trustees' approval in isolated circumstances, including for 4-H-type projects that do not unreasonably impact neighbors).

Long-term care facility means any of the following:

- a) Convalescent center means a health institution that is planned, organized, operated and maintained to offer facilities and services to in-patients requiring restorative care and treatment and that is either an integral patient care unit of a general hospital or a facility physically separated from, but maintaining an affiliation with, all services in a general hospital.
- b) Nursing care facility means a health institution planned, organized, operated and maintained to provide facilities and health services with related social care to in-patients who require regular medical care and twenty-four-hour-per-day nursing services for illness, injury or disability. Each patient shall be under the care of a physician licensed to practice medicine in the State. The nursing services shall be organized and maintained to provide twenty-four-hour-per-day nursing services under the direction of a registered professional nurse employed full time.
- c) Intermediate health care facility means a health-related institution planned, organized, operated and maintained to provide facilities and services which are supportive, restorative or preventive in nature, with related social care, to individuals who because of a physical or mental condition, or both, require care in an institutional environment but who do not have an illness, injury or disability for which regular medical care and twenty-four-hour-per-day nursing services are required.

Lot means a designated parcel, tract or area of land established by plat or subdivision.

Manufactured Home. A single-family dwelling which is partially or entirely manufactured in a factory; which is not less than twenty-four (24) feet in width and thirty-six (36) feet in length; which is installed on an engineered permanent foundation; which has brick, wood or cosmetically equivalent siding extending to the ground level; which has a pitched roof; which has the delivery system including wheels, tires, axles and tongue hitch removed; and which is certified pursuant to the National Manufactured Housing

Construction and Safety Standards Act of 1974, 42 U.S.C. 5401 et seq., as amended.

Medical Care Facility. An establishment, whether or not licensed or required to be licensed by the State Board of Health or the State Hospital Board, by or in which facilities are maintained, furnished, conducted, operated, or offered to prevent, diagnose, or treat human disease, pain, injury, deformity, or physical condition, whether medical or surgical, of two (2) or more non-related mentally or physically sick or injured persons; or for the care of two (2) or more non-related persons requiring or receiving medical, surgical, or nursing attention or service as acute, chronic, convalescent, aged, or physically disabled. This use includes an intermediate care facility, mental retardation facility, outpatient surgery center, birthing facility, diagnostic imaging facility, radiation therapy facility, dialysis facility, medical/physical rehabilitation and trauma unit, or related institution or facility that offers treatment on an outpatient basis. This use may be operated for profit or nonprofit, privately owned, or operated by a local government unit. This use includes any hospital, defined as any licensed and State of Colorado accredited health care institution with an organized medical and professional staff and with inpatient beds available around-the-clock, whose primary function is to provide inpatient medical, nursing, and other health-related services to patients for both surgical and nonsurgical conditions and that usually provides some outpatient services (such as emergency care).

Medical Office. A facility operated by one (1) or more duly licensed members of the human healthcare professions, including but not limited to physicians, dentists, chiropractors, psychiatrists and osteopaths, where patients are not lodged overnight but are admitted for

Mixed use means the development of a lot, tract or parcel of land, building or structure with two (2) or more different uses, including but not limited to residential, office, retail, public uses, personal service or entertainment uses, designed, planned and constructed as a unit.

Mixed-Use Dwelling. Multi-Family Dwelling units contained within a mixed-use building attached above the building's nonresidential uses (the mixed-use building may contain office or commercial uses below the residential use).

Multi-Family Dwelling. A dwelling contained in a structure also containing other dwellings in which each unit is attached to another at one (1) or more party walls and at either the floor or the ceiling. The number of dwelling units provided in a Multi-Family Dwelling is limited only by the density allowed in the applicable zone district. This includes apartments and manor style apartments. This does not include townhomes or duplexes, which are considered single-family attached dwellings.

Multitenant building or development means a building or series of buildings on a parcel or several parcels under common ownership, management, and control and whose occupants are distinct users that each occupy a portion of the multitenant building or development.

Open space means any land or water area with its surface open to the sky, which serves specific uses of providing park and recreation opportunities, conserving natural areas and environmental resources, structuring urban development form and protecting areas of agricultural, archeological or historical significance. Open space shall not be considered synonymous with vacant or unused land but serves important urban functions. Usable open space shall exclude areas used for off-street parking, off-street loading, service driveways and setbacks from oil and gas wells and their appurtenances or other hazards to the public.

Park means an area open to the general public and reserved for recreational, educational or scenic purposes.

Pawn Shop. Any business that loans money on deposit of personal property or deals in the purchase or possession of personal property on condition of selling that property back to the pledger or depositor, or loans or advances money on personal property by taking chattel mortgage security on it, and takes or receives that personal property and issues a lien upon the personal property.

Religious Land Use. A structure or group of structures intended for regular gatherings of people to attend, participate in or conduct religious services and other related activities and associated accessory uses. Associated accessory uses may include religious instruction classrooms, church offices, counseling programs, private school, youth programs, summer camps, recreational facilities, caretaker's quarters, and sale of religious items.

Sign, subdivision entrance means a type of permanent freestanding sign located at the entrance to a subdivision in a residential district or a distinct phase of a subdivision in a residential district.

Single-Family Attached Dwelling. A dwelling contained in a structure that shares party walls with another dwelling. This includes duplexes and townhomes.

Single-Family Detached Dwelling. A single-family dwelling (a building designed exclusively for occupancy by one (1) family) which is not attached to any other dwelling or building by any means, excluding mobile homes and manufactured housing situated on a permanent foundation

Site specific development plan means the final plat of a subdivision or final development plan of a PUD (Planned Unit Development) when approved by the Board of Trustees pursuant to the Land Use Code.

Stable. A facility that keeps or boards horses owned for the private use of the owners and/or residents of the property. This also includes horses owned by non-owners or non-residents of the property for private use. Accessory uses are permitted and include but are not limited to offices, storage areas, caretaker's quarters, educating and training in equitation, and caring for, breeding, or training horses associated

Transit Facilities. Includes transit or bus shelters bus terminals, stations, and associated right-of-way. A "transit shelter" means a roofed structure on or adjacent to the right-of-way of a street, which is designed and used primarily for the protection and convenience of bus passengers. Includes accessory vehicle and bicycle parking.

Town Comprehensive Plan means the plan, which was adopted by the Planning Commission and Board of Trustees in accordance with Section 31-23-206, C.R.S., to guide the future growth, protection and development of the Town, affording adequate facilities for housing, transportation, comfort, convenience, public health, safety and general welfare of its population.

Town means the Town of Wellington, a municipal corporation of the State, in its present incorporated form or in any later reorganized, consolidated, enlarged or reincorporated form.

Vested property rights means the right to undertake and complete the development and use of the property under the terms and conditions of a site-specific development plan.

Veterinary Facilities, Large animals. Any facility which is maintained by or for the use of a licensed veterinarian in the diagnosis, treatment, or prevention of animal diseases.

We write in support of the project and wish to provide additional insight to the Planning Commission in connection with the approval process. To that end, we offer the following requests and recommendations:

- 1. In connection with assessing the water and sanitary sewer needs to the project and the need to connect going north, we would ask that you bring into consideration our parcel by including its capacity needs. We welcome an opportunity to discuss a Reimbursement Agreement to the extent that infrastructure upsizing is necessary in order to serve our adjacent parcel. Future development of our parcel is likely to follow the buildout of the Sage Farms development.
- Any storm water management associated with this development needs to be managed by the project itself and should not have any adverse impact on surrounding lands including our lands.
- 3. Road infrastructure needs should be addressed on a regional basis and any road upgrades should be mandated based on traffic impact analysis conducted.
- 4. Water resource management must be considered and adequate water sources identified to support this project without adverse impact on water resources currently available to surrounding lands.

If we can provide additional guidance, we would be happy to do so.

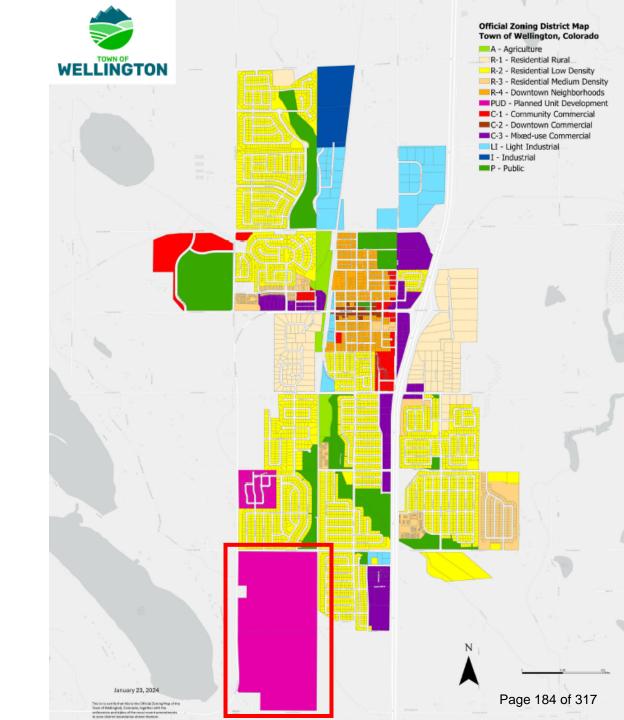

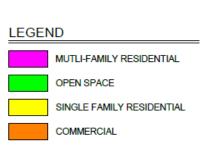

Sage Farms Conceptual Master Plan



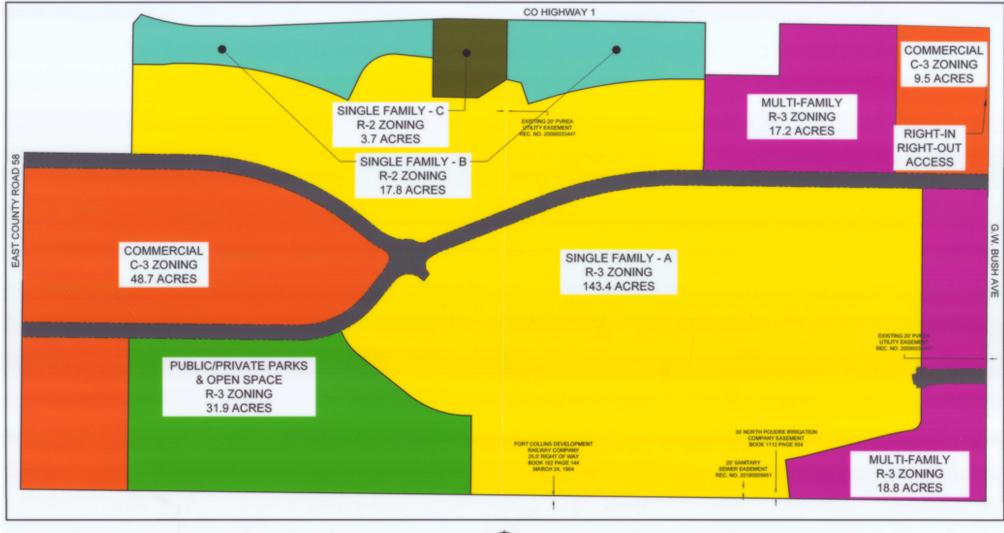






Sage Farms PUD Zoning Map







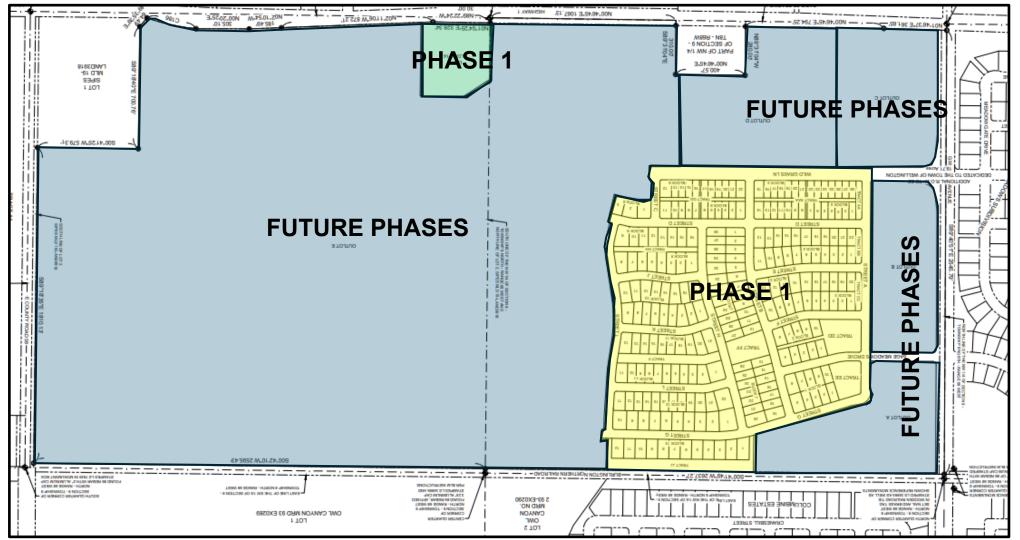

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Sage Farms Planned Unit Development (PUD) establishes the development standards for Sage Farms – a 293.5-acre site at the southwest side of Wellington that was approved for a mix of single-family residential, multi-family residential, commercial, and parks and open space uses. The proposed text amendments are to remove numerical standards in Section D.2.B. that limits the development of no more than six (6) single-family detached units accessing an alley and no more than six (6) single-family attached units per building. Section D.2.B. applies only to those areas zoned Single-Family A in the PUD.

The Planning Commission held a public hearing to consider the proposed text amendments to the approved Sage Farms PUD and voted to forward a recommendation of approval to the Board of Trustees based on the Findings for Approval included in the Staff Report. The Planning Commission report and included Findings is attached.

The Board of Trustees conducts a public hearing when evaluating a text amendment to a PUD. This agenda item is for the public hearing only. Following the close of the public hearing, there is a separate agenda item for action on the proposed text amendment.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

On January 23, 2024, the Wellington Board of Trustees passed Ordinance No. 02-2024 approving the Sage Farms Annexation and Village at Sage Farms Annexation and establishing the zoning as a Planned Unit Development (PUD). A Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District is an approved development plan with adopted zoning regulations that supplement the underlying base zoning district. It is a unified plan of development that does not correspond to typical regulations outlined in the Land Use Code and allows for flexibility and innovative design. The Sage Farms PUD created development standards and regulations that are specific to the Sage Farms project.

Since the proposed amendments are related to standards for single family attached and detached units, the amendments are processed as text amendments to the Land Use Code. Land Use Code amendments are processed in accordance with Section 15-2-50 of the Land Use Code and are reviewed by the Planning Commission at a public hearing and a recommendation is made to the Board of Trustees. In their review of the amendments, the Board of Trustees uses the Land Use Code Amendment Findings for Approval as the review criteria (Section 15-2-50(d)):

- 1. The amendment is not likely to result in significant adverse impacts upon the natural environment (including air, water, noise, stormwater management, wildlife, and vegetation) or such impacts will be substantially mitigated;
- 2. The amendment is necessary for the protection of health, safety, welfare, and morals of the community;
- 3. The amendment is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and the intent stated in this Land Use Code; and



4. The amendment is consistent with any other prior approvals and official plans and policies created under the guidance of that plan for these areas.

On May 5, 2025, the Planning Commission conducted a public hearing to consider the proposed code text amendments. Staff received one written correspondence in advance of the agenda publication. The correspondence supports the proposed amendments, and is included as *Attachment E* to the Planning Commission staff report. At the Planning Commission hearing, one resident provided comments on the Sage Farms development, but did not object to the text amendments. No other written correspondence or phone calls on the Sage Farms PUD text amendment public hearing item were received by the time the agenda packet was published. Following public testimony, the Planning Commission deliberated on the proposed amendments and voted 6-1 to forward a recommendation to the Board of Trustees to approve the proposed text amendments to the Sage Farms PUD, as presented, based on the Findings for Approval. The Findings for Approval that the Planning Commission reviewed are included in the attached staff report under the "Staff Comments (text amendment)" section of the report.

The Board of Trustees may adopt the Planning Commission's Findings, may modify the Planning Commission's Findings, or may make its own Findings. Upon making Findings for Approval, the Board should close the public hearing.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

General Location:

Land east of State Highway 1 to BNSF Railroad and south of G.W. Bush Ave. (CR60) to CR58 – Location Map included in *Attachment A*

Applicant/Owner:

FC Farm Holding, LLC and Sipes Farm Holding, LLC

Reason For Request:

- The applicant has submitted a request to change numerical standards applicable to the approved Sage Farms Planned Unit Development (PUD). The PUD text at Section D.2.B. limits the development of no more than six (6) single-family detached units accessing an alley and no more than six (6) single-family attached units per building.
- The applicant requests to amend the text of the PUD to remove the limitation on the number of units to be consistent with the intent of the Sage Farms PUD, and to align with similar applicable standards in the Town's Land Use Code.

Background:

- On January 23, 2024, the Wellington Board of Trustees passed Ordinance No. 02-2024 approving the Sage Farms Annexation and Village at Sage Farms Annexation, established the zoning as a Planned Unit Development (PUD), approved the annexation agreements, and established vested development rights.
- The Sage Farms PUD allows a mix of single-family residential, multi-family residential, commercial, and parks and open space uses.
- The Sage Farms PUD will be developed as a phased development. The first filing for phase 1 is a major subdivision of the 293.5 acres site to create 241 single-family lots, open space areas, five outlots for future development, and one lot to accommodate existing agricultural operations.
- The preliminary plat for the first filing is subject to the PUD text standards sought to be amended.
- The preliminary plat and PUD text amendments are submitted for concurrent review. The applications are being considered concurrently, but are processed as separate requests.
- The applicant has summarized the proposed PUD text amendments, included as *Attachment B*.
- The PUD text amendments and preliminary plat were advertised for public hearings before the Planning Commission and Board of Trustees as required by law.

1. Staff received one written correspondence in support included as *Attachment E*. No other written correspondence or phone calls on the Sage Farms PUD text amendment public hearing item were received by the time the agenda packet was published.

Text Amendment Process and Findings for Approval:

- Pursuant to Section 15-2-70(b)(2) of the Land Use Code, a rezone that includes "changes to standards or characteristics of zoning districts (such as floor area ratio or setbacks) shall be processed as text amendments to the Land Use Code."
- Since the proposed amendments are related to standards for single family attached and detached units, the amendments are processed as text amendments to the Land Use Code.
- Land Use Code amendments are processed in accordance with Section 15-2-50 of the Land Use Code and are reviewed by the Planning Commission at a public hearing and a recommendation is made to the Board of Trustees. The Planning Commission may choose to either recommend approval, approval with conditions, denial, or may continue the public hearing to another date.
- The Planning Commission evaluates the request using the following criteria Land Use Code Amendment Findings for Approval (Land Use Code Section 15-2-50(d)):
 - 1. The amendment is not likely to result in significant adverse impacts upon the natural environment (including air, water, noise, stormwater management, wildlife, and vegetation) or such impacts will be substantially mitigated;
 - 2. The amendment is necessary for the protection of health, safety, welfare, and morals of the community;
 - 3. The amendment is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and the intent stated in this Land Use Code; and
 - 4. The amendment is consistent with any other prior approvals and official plans and policies created under the guidance of that plan for these areas.
- The Planning Commission will need to consider any testimony presented during the public hearing.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

The Findings for Approval for a text amendment are listed below (in **bold** text), along with Staff's recommendation for each finding (in regular text).

Land Use Code Amendment Findings for Approval (Land Use Code Section 15-2-50(d)):

- 1. The amendment is not likely to result in significant adverse impacts upon the natural environment (including air, water, noise, stormwater management, wildlife, and vegetation) or such impacts will be substantially mitigated;
 - The proposed amendments to remove the language in the PUD that limits the development to no more than six (6) single-family detached units accessing an alley and no more than six (6) single-family attached units per building, will not result in significant adverse impacts upon the environment.
 - o The amendments will remove overly restrictive language in the Single-family A zoned areas of the PUD to ensure that development in these areas is organized in a usable and efficient way.
 - o The proposed amendments only affect unit and block layout but will not impact the development densities that were approved and established through the PUD.

2. The amendment is necessary for the protection of health, safety, welfare, and morals of the community;

• The PUD text amendments will remove language that currently inhibits the ability for usable and cohesive lot and block layouts. The proposed amendments will allow additional flexibility and other applicable provisions of the PUD will still ensure a thoughtful development layout that will benefit the health, safety, and welfare of the future residents of Sage Farms and the community as a whole.

3. The amendment is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and the intent stated in this Land Use Code; and

- o The proposed PUD text amendments are consistent with the intent of the Comprehensive Plan, the Land Use Code, and the Sage Farms PUD.
- o The proposed PUD text amendments impact the single-family zoned areas of the Sage Farms PUD. Specifically, those areas designated as "Single-Family A."
- o The intent of the "Single-Family A" designation on the Sage Farms PUD is to provide for a mix of small lot single-family detached, single-family attached, and multi-family dwellings in a walkable environment.
- The proposed amendments to remove the unit count limit per building and alley access limit will allow for more flexible building, lot, and block layouts. This flexibility will allow the thoughtful layout of the neighborhoods to ensure walkability and connectivity are prioritized. The Sage Farms PUD was approved as being consistent with the Comprehensive Plan for the medium density residential land use designation and is intended to allow for single-family and multifamily neighborhoods with local and walkable commercial areas with access to public facilities and amenities.
- The proposed PUD text change to remove the restrictions on alley access and unit count per building will continue to be consistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

4. The amendment is consistent with any other prior approvals and official plans and policies created under the guidance of that plan for these areas.

- The proposed PUD text amendments to remove the dwelling unit limitation and alley access limitation will not impact the approved densities or mix of land uses that were established for the Sage Farms PUD.
- o All other provisions of the Sage Farms PUD will remain in effect.
- The removal of the limitation on the number of dwelling units is consistent with the adoption of Ordinance No. 08-2025 approving amendments to the Land Use Code to increase opportunities for housing affordability. The Land Use Code amendments approved April 8, 2025 similarly removed several limitations on the number of dwelling units allowed per building.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Based upon the above findings, Town staff recommends the PUD Text Amendment satisfies the Findings for Approval in accordance with the Land Use Code. Town staff recommends approval of the proposed text amendments, as presented (motion option 1, below).

Below are motion options for the Planning Commission to consider:

1. Move to forward a recommendation to the Board of Trustees to approve the proposed text amendments to the Sage Farms PUD, as presented, based on the Findings for Approval.

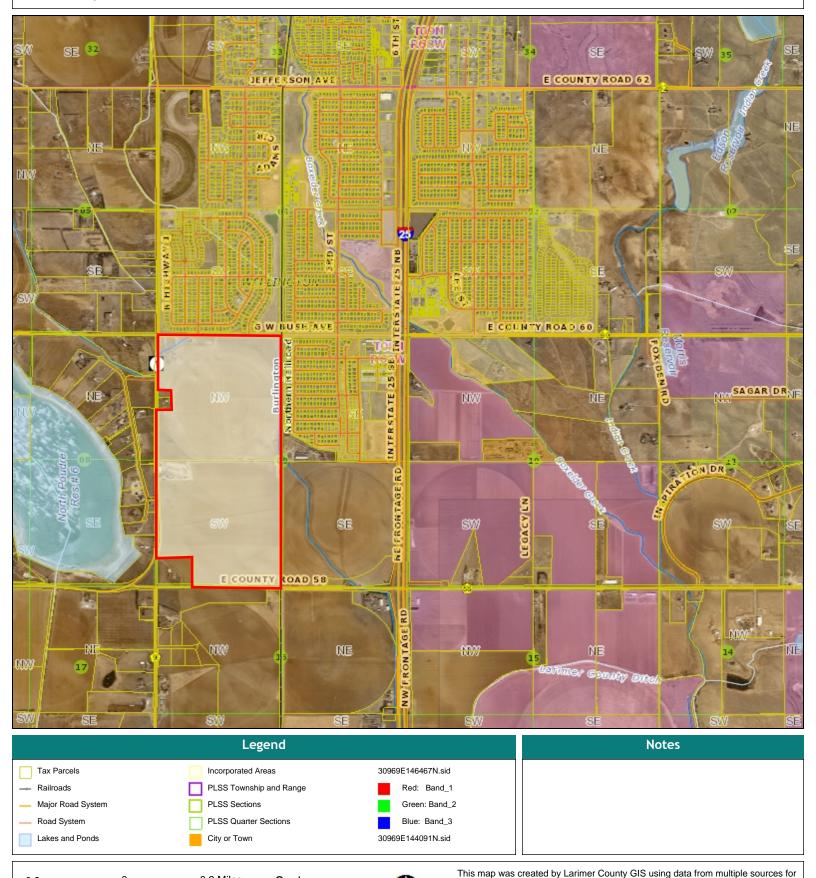

In review of the preliminary plat submittal by the Town staff it was noticed there was an unattended restriction on the use of an alley for vehicle access to both single-family and multi-family dwellings. Under the Land Use Standards Permitted Uses on the PUD the following sections state:

- D.2.B.2 Single-Family Detached Dwellings (including up to six Single-Family Detached Dwellings utilizing the same Alley for vehicular access) (P)
- D.2.B.3 Single-Family Attached Dwellings (including up to six Single-Family Attached Dwellings per Building; Alley loaded Single-Family Attached Dwellings are Allowed) (P)

The PUD amendment request is to delete the restriction of a maximum of six dwellings in each of the above land use standards and substitute the following language:

- D.2.B.2 Single-Family Detached Dwellings (including Alley loaded Single-Family Detached Dwellings) (P)
- D.2.B.3 Single-Family Attached Dwellings (including Alley loaded Single-Family Attached Dwellings are Allowed) (P)

By allowing this amendment to the approved PUD it would eliminate the restriction of a maximum of six alley accessed dwellings thereby clarifying the original intent of the land use on the PUD.

D. Development Standards 1. Minimum Lot Size - There shall be no minimum lot size for open space areas though a minimum of 20% of the site excluding the commercial parcels shall by designated as Parks and Open space (both public 2. Pocket Parks - There shall be a minimum of one pocket park for each 200 Single-Family Detached

E. PARKING STANDARDS

1. Off Street Parking Requirements - shall comply per section 5.05.07 of the Town Land Use Code as amended from time to time with the exception of any one-bedroom dwelling units which shall be allowed to have a minimum of one off street parking space per unit.

F. AUXILLARY USE STANDARDS

1. Pedestrian Paths/Trails Paths and trails shall be provided within park/open space areas and to link, where feasible, between residential and commercial use areas and open space. Such paths shall consist of asphalt, concrete, or other approved materials and range from 5 to 10 feet in width. Such paths shall be maintained by a homeowner's association, the Town of Wellington and/or special improvement district depending upon location, subject to approval by such entity.

G. MISCELLANEOUS REQUIREMENTS

Areas disturbed during construction shall be treated in such a manner so as to minimize the impacts of erosion and dust pollution. No other polluting activity shall be permitted on a permitted basis

Temporary trailers and/or residential units may be used as sales or construction offices during the sales and construction period in accordance with Section 15-4-50 and all applicable permits. Temporary material storage, concrete batch plants and other temporary construction uses may be permitted during the construction period provided such activities are secured and in accordance with Section 15-4-50 and all applicable permits. Such temporary uses shall terminate 90 days after construction of the final building within the project.

Buffering adjacent to the commercial use areas shall be utilized to minimize the impacts of vehicular noise on adjacent residential areas. Commercial structures shall be placed in such a fashion to further buffer the parks and traveled areas. Where differing land uses abut one another, buffering techniques shall be implemented to diffuse any negative impacts. These buffering techniques and their locations shall be determined at the time of platting and subdivision approvals.

4. Zoning Boundaries The zoning boundaries may be modified or changed by a maximum of 10% with an administrative approval by the Town's Planning Director though the overall densities or total Gross Leaseable Area (GLA) shall not exceed the maximum amounts as listed on this PUD Zone.

H. PUD OVERLAY DISTRICT JUSTIFICATION

This PUD Zone is a mixed-use site development plan for property controlled by two affiliated landowners and under a unified plan of development for an anticipated number and density of residential dwelling units and commercial uses. It creates a compatible variety of land uses that provide for a homogeneous neighborhood of mixed uses and affordable housing that are in keeping with the property's unique, site specific topography for stormwater systems and two independent nonpotable irrigation systems that will be utilized consistent with historical water well usage. The northern portion of the property is currently adjoining public infrastructure sufficient to facilitate anticipated, existing market demand for residential dwelling units and commercial uses. Southern portion of the property is not currently served by public infrastructure sufficient to support development consistent with the objectives set forth in the Town Comprehensive Plan. The PUD Zone and vested property rights are necessary and desirable in order to ensure reasonable certainty and stability for the development of the property; stimulate economic growth consistent with the Town Comprehensive Plan; secure a reasonable investment-backed expectation over the lengthy timeframe anticipated to complete development of the residential neighborhoods and commercial uses; and, to foster public and private cooperation necessary to fund and then complete the community wide impact studies for the design, permitting, and construction of the anticipated off-site public infrastructure improvements to support development of the commercial uses in southern portions of the property consistent with the Town Comprehensive Plan. To accomplish these objectives, the PUD Zone overlays and modifies specific terms of the underlying standard zone district which do not correspond in lot size, bulk or type of use, density, lot coverage, open space and other considerations. The PUD Zone also allows for:

the existing agricultural uses to continue to be permitted in the Single-Family C use area. modifies the R-3 Residential Medium Density zone allowing a reduction in the maximum density allowed in the Single-Family A use area.

modifies the R-2 Residential Low Density zone allowing an increase the minimum lot size for Single-Family B and Single-Family C use areas. modifies the R-2 Residential Low Density zone allowing a reduction in the maximum density allowed

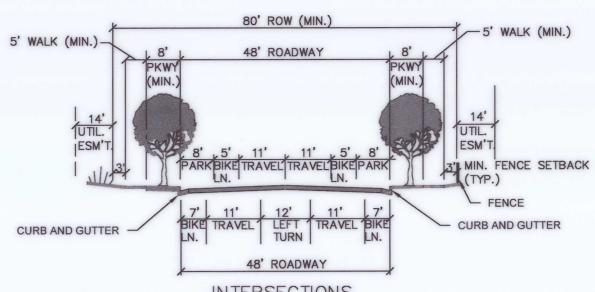

J. DEFINITIONS

Accessory Building. A subordinate building or structure, the use of which is customarily incidental to that of the main building or to the main use of the land, which is located on the same lot (or on a contiguous lot in the same ownership) with the main building or use.

Accessory Dwelling Unit. An additional dwelling unit integrated within a single-family dwelling, or located in a detached accessory building, such as carriage houses or agricultural-type out buildings, located on the same lot as single-family dwellings. An Accessory Dwelling Unit is not counted as a dwelling unit in calculating the allowed density per acre in a zone district.

Accessory Use. A subordinate use, clearly incidental and related to the main structure, building or use of land and located on the same lot (or on a contiguous lot in the same ownership) as that of the main structure, building or use.

Alley. A paved constructed vehicular access way serving one (1) or more properties and abutting a public or private road. An Alley may

be a public or private access way. An Alley may satisfy, but does not need to satisfy, emergency access requirements.

Agriculture. The use of land for accessory uses for treating or storing farm products and equipment.

Bed and Breakfast. An establishment operated in a private residence or portion thereof, which provides temporary accommodations to overnight guests for a fee, and which is occupied by the operator of such establishment.

Boarding and Rooming House. A building or portion of which is used to accommodate, for compensation, four (4) or more boarders or roomers, not including members of the occupant's immediate family who might be occupying such building.

Ruilding means any permanent structure built for the shelter or enclosure of account a sixth building.

Building means any permanent structure built for the shelter or enclosure of persons, animals, chattels or property of any kind, which is governed by the following characteristics:

a) Is permanently affixed to the land.b) Has one (1) or more floors and a roof.

Child Care Center. A facility, by whatever name known, which is maintained for the whole or part of a day for the care of seven (7) or more children under the age of sixteen (16) years who are not related to the owner, operator or manager, whether such facility is operated with or without compensation for such care and with or without stated educational purposes, except that a childcare center shall not include any family child care home as defined by the State. The term includes, but is not limited to, facilities commonly known as day care centers, day nurseries, nursery schools, preschools, play groups, day camps, summer camps, centers for developmentally disabled children and those facilities which give twenty-four-hour-per-day care for dependent and neglected children. Child care centers are also those facilities for children under the age of six (6) years with stated educational purposes which are operated in conjunction with a public, private, or parochial college or a private or parochial school, except that the term shall not apply to a kindergarten maintained in connection with a public, private, or parochial elementary school system of at least six (6) grades.

Civic Space. Public or quasi-public uses in residential or business areas that are accessible to the public and primarily serve as gathering or meeting areas for the immediate community, or reserved as open space that provides a community amenity or promotes environmental or ecological functions. Civic spaces may be public buildings; defined space in residential, commercial, or mixed-use buildings; or outdoor space constructed to accommodate community gatherings. They can be the settings where celebrations are held, where social and economic exchanges take place, where friends run into each other, and where cultures mix. Civic spaces include active or passive recreational uses, nature and recreation trails, nature preserves (such as wildlife sanctuaries, conservation areas, and game preserves), cultural amenities (e.g. fountains, ice rinks, reflecting pools), open spaces, parks, squares, plazas, playgrounds, or memorial parks. This includes any of the following as defined below:

- a) Active recreation: Recreational uses requiring constructed facilities for organized activities, such as playing fields, ball courts, and playgrounds.
- b) Dog park: A park that provides a variety of recreational amenities for dogs and persons that may include benches, parking, restrooms, and water fountains. If dogs are to be unleashed, the area must be fenced.
- c) Community space: Buildings or facilities that provide gathering places, such as community centers, property owner association meeting spaces, or clubhouses.
- d) Open space: Areas of trees, shrubs, lawns, grass, pathways and other natural and man-made amenities not within individual building lots, set aside for the use and enjoyment of residents, visitors and other persons, unoccupied by buildings or facilities unless related to recreational activities. Generally, open space is intended to provide light and air and is designed for either scenic or recreational purposes. For the purpose of this Code, open space includes active recreation space, common open space, and dedicated open space.
- e) Park or plaza: An open space which may be improved and landscaped; usually surrounded by streets and buildings.
- f) Urban deck: A platform for landscaped greens or engineered to accommodate buildings, which spans over major roadways. The intent of an urban deck is to create and enable pedestrian movement across an otherwise, typically impenetrable barrier, and to provide space for activity that can link both sides of the roadway.
- g) Wetlands mitigation bank: A natural resource management technique authorized by Part 404 of the Federal Clean Water Act, or other state or federal law, as applicable, using wetland preservation, restoration, creation and/or enhancement to offset or replace wetland functions that are lost due to development. Wetland mitigation banks are typically large areas of wetlands operated by private or public entities, which may sell credits to other entities to compensate for wetland loss or impact at development sites or enter into other similar arrangements.

Code means the Municipal Code of the Town, including this Land Use Code.

Community Facility. A place, structure, area, or other facility used to provide fraternal, cultural, social, educational, or recreational programs or activities. This includes swimming pools, tennis courts, and similar facilities of a homeowners association, open to the public or a designated part of the public, and which may be publicly or privately owned.

Dwelling means a building used exclusively for residential occupancy, including single-family dwellings, two-family dwellings and multi-family dwellings.

Dwelling unit means one (1) or more rooms and a single kitchen and at least one (1) bathroom, designed, occupied or intended for occupancy as separate quarters for the exclusive use of a single family for living, cooking and sanitary purposes, located in a single-family, two-family or multi-family dwelling or mixed-use building.

Dwelling, two-family or duplex means a building occupied by two (2) families living independently of each other.

Golf Course. A tract of land laid out with a course having nine (9) or more holes for playing golf, including any accessory clubhouse, driving range, offices, restaurant, concession stand, picnic tables, pro shop, maintenance facilities, or similar accessory uses or structures.

Grocery Store. A retail establishment primarily selling food, as well as other convenience and household goods, without a limitation on the number of square feet of the Building structure.

Group Home state-licensed facilities for developmentally disabled, handicapped, seniors or children as defined by and meeting the requirements of Section 31-23-303(2), C.R.S., or similar state statute.

Home Occupation. An occupation or business activity which results in a product or service and is conducted in whole or in part in a dwelling unit and is subordinate to the residential use of the dwelling unit. Home Occupation shall not include home offices for

Industrial and Manufacturing, Heavy. Manufacturing of paper, chemicals, plastics, rubber, cosmetics, drugs, nonmetallic mineral products (such as concrete and concrete products, glass), primary metals, acetylene, cement, lime, gypsum or plaster-of-Paris, chlorine, corrosive acid or fertilizer, insecticides, disinfectants, poisons, explosives, paint, lacquer, varnish, petroleum products, coal products, plastic and synthetic resins, electrical equipment, appliances, batteries, and machinery. This group also includes asphalt mixing plants,

concrete mixing plants, smelting, animal slaughtering, oil refining, and magazine contained explosives facilities.

Industrial and Manufacturing, Light. Manufacturing of products, from extracted, raw, recycled or secondary materials, including bulk storage and handling of those products and materials, or crushing, treating, washing, and/or processing of materials. This includes similar establishments, and businesses of a similar and no more objectionable character. It also includes incidental finishing and storage. Goods or products manufactured or processed on-site may be sold at retailor wholesale on or off the premises. This does not include any activity listed under Industrial and Manufacturing, Heavy. Examples of general manufacturing include the manufacture or production of the following goods or products: apparel (including clothing, shoes, dressmaking); boats and transportation equipment; brooms; caskets; communication or computation equipment; dairy products; die-cut paperboard and cardboard; drugs, medicines, pharmaceutical; electrical equipment or machinery; farm machinery; fasteners and buttons; feed and grain; food/baking(including coffee roasting, creameries, ice cream, ice, frozen food, confectionery, and beverage); fruit and vegetable processing, canning and storage; gaskets; glass products made of purchased glass; household appliances; industrial controls; leather and allied products; lithographic and printing processes (including printing plants as defined below); mattresses; medical equipment and supplies; medicines; mill work and similar woodwork; mobile homes; musical instruments; novelties; office supplies; optical goods; photographic equipment; prefabricated and modular housing and components; printing and print supplies (including printing plants); 3-D printing, radio and TV receiving sets; sanitary paper products; scientific and precision instruments; service industry machines; signs; textiles (including dyeing, laundry bags, canvas products, dry goods, hosiery, millinery); tobacco products; toys, sporting and athletic goods; and watches and clocks. A "printing plant" means a facility devoted to printing or bookbinding, including related large-scale storage and transshipment.

Land Use Code means Chapter 15 of the Town of Wellington Municipal Code.

Livestock includes horses, cattle, sheep and llamas, but does not include swine, chickens, goats, roosters, fowl, peacocks, guinea hens or other animals not allowed to be maintained within the Town by this Code (except that swine, chickens, goats, roosters, fowl, peacocks or guinea hens maybe permitted with the Board of Trustees' approval in isolated circumstances, including for 4-H-type projects that do not unreasonably impact neighbors).

Long-term care facility means any of the following:

- a) Convalescent center means a health institution that is planned, organized, operated and maintained to offer facilities and services to in-patients requiring restorative care and treatment and that is either an integral patient care unit of a general hospital or a facility physically separated from, but maintaining an affiliation with, all services in a general hospital.
- b) Nursing care facility means a health institution planned, organized, operated and maintained to provide facilities and health services with related social care to in-patients who require regular medical care and twenty-four-hour-per-day nursing services for illness, injury or disability. Each patient shall be under the care of a physician licensed to practice medicine in the State. The nursing services shall be organized and maintained to provide twenty-four-hour-per-day nursing services under the direction of a registered professional nurse employed full time.
- c) Intermediate health care facility means a health-related institution planned, organized, operated and maintained to provide facilities and services which are supportive, restorative or preventive in nature, with related social care, to individuals who because of a physical or mental condition, or both, require care in an institutional environment but who do not have an illness, injury or disability for which regular medical care and twenty-four-hour-per-day nursing services are required.

Lot means a designated parcel, tract or area of land established by plat or subdivision.

Manufactured Home. A single-family dwelling which is partially or entirely manufactured in a factory; which is not less than twenty-four (24) feet in width and thirty-six (36) feet in length; which is installed on an engineered permanent foundation; which has brick, wood or cosmetically equivalent siding extending to the ground level; which has a pitched roof; which has the delivery system including wheels, tires, axles and tongue hitch removed; and which is certified pursuant to the National Manufactured Housing

Construction and Safety Standards Act of 1974, 42 U.S.C. 5401 et seq., as amended.

Medical Care Facility. An establishment, whether or not licensed or required to be licensed by the State Board of Health or the State Hospital Board, by or in which facilities are maintained, furnished, conducted, operated, or offered to prevent, diagnose, or treat human disease, pain, injury, deformity, or physical condition, whether medical or surgical, of two (2) or more non-related mentally or physically sick or injured persons; or for the care of two (2) or more non-related persons requiring or receiving medical, surgical, or nursing attention or service as acute, chronic, convalescent, aged, or physically disabled. This use includes an intermediate care facility, mental retardation facility, outpatient surgery center, birthing facility, diagnostic imaging facility, radiation therapy facility, dialysis facility, medical/physical rehabilitation and trauma unit, or related institution or facility that offers treatment on an outpatient basis. This use may be operated for profit or nonprofit, privately owned, or operated by a local government unit. This use includes any hospital, defined as any licensed and State of Colorado accredited health care institution with an organized medical and professional staff and with inpatient beds available around-the-clock, whose primary function is to provide inpatient medical, nursing, and other health-related services to patients for both surgical and nonsurgical conditions and that usually provides some outpatient services (such as emergency care).

Medical Office. A facility operated by one (1) or more duly licensed members of the human healthcare professions, including but not limited to physicians, dentists, chiropractors, psychiatrists and osteopaths, where patients are not lodged overnight but are admitted for

Mixed use means the development of a lot, tract or parcel of land, building or structure with two (2) or more different uses, including but not limited to residential, office, retail, public uses, personal service or entertainment uses, designed, planned and constructed as a unit.

Mixed-Use Dwelling. Multi-Family Dwelling units contained within a mixed-use building attached above the building's nonresidential uses (the mixed-use building may contain office or commercial uses below the residential use).

Multi-Family Dwelling. A dwelling contained in a structure also containing other dwellings in which each unit is attached to another at one (1) or more party walls and at either the floor or the ceiling. The number of dwelling units provided in a Multi-Family Dwelling is limited only by the density allowed in the applicable zone district. This includes apartments and manor style apartments. This does not include townhomes or duplexes, which are considered single-family attached dwellings.

Multitenant building or development means a building or series of buildings on a parcel or several parcels under common ownership, management, and control and whose occupants are distinct users that each occupy a portion of the multitenant building or development.

Open space means any land or water area with its surface open to the sky, which serves specific uses of providing park and recreation opportunities, conserving natural areas and environmental resources, structuring urban development form and protecting areas of agricultural, archeological or historical significance. Open space shall not be considered synonymous with vacant or unused land but serves important urban functions. Usable open space shall exclude areas used for off-street parking, off-street loading, service driveways and setbacks from oil and gas wells and their appurtenances or other hazards to the public.

Park means an area open to the general public and reserved for recreational, educational or scenic purposes.

Pawn Shop. Any business that loans money on deposit of personal property or deals in the purchase or possession of personal property on condition of selling that property back to the pledger or depositor, or loans or advances money on personal property by taking chattel mortgage security on it, and takes or receives that personal property and issues a lien upon the personal property.

Religious Land Use. A structure or group of structures intended for regular gatherings of people to attend, participate in or conduct religious services and other related activities and associated accessory uses. Associated accessory uses may include religious instruction classrooms, church offices, counseling programs, private school, youth programs, summer camps, recreational facilities, caretaker's quarters, and sale of religious items.

Sign, subdivision entrance means a type of permanent freestanding sign located at the entrance to a subdivision in a residential district or a distinct phase of a subdivision in a residential district.

Single-Family Attached Dwelling. A dwelling contained in a structure that shares party walls with another dwelling. This includes duplexes and townhomes.

We write in support of the project and wish to provide additional insight to the Planning Commission in connection with the approval process. To that end, we offer the following requests and recommendations:

- 1. In connection with assessing the water and sanitary sewer needs to the project and the need to connect going north, we would ask that you bring into consideration our parcel by including its capacity needs. We welcome an opportunity to discuss a Reimbursement Agreement to the extent that infrastructure upsizing is necessary in order to serve our adjacent parcel. Future development of our parcel is likely to follow the buildout of the Sage Farms development.
- Any storm water management associated with this development needs to be managed by the project itself and should not have any adverse impact on surrounding lands including our lands.
- 3. Road infrastructure needs should be addressed on a regional basis and any road upgrades should be mandated based on traffic impact analysis conducted.
- 4. Water resource management must be considered and adequate water sources identified to support this project without adverse impact on water resources currently available to surrounding lands.

If we can provide additional guidance, we would be happy to do so.

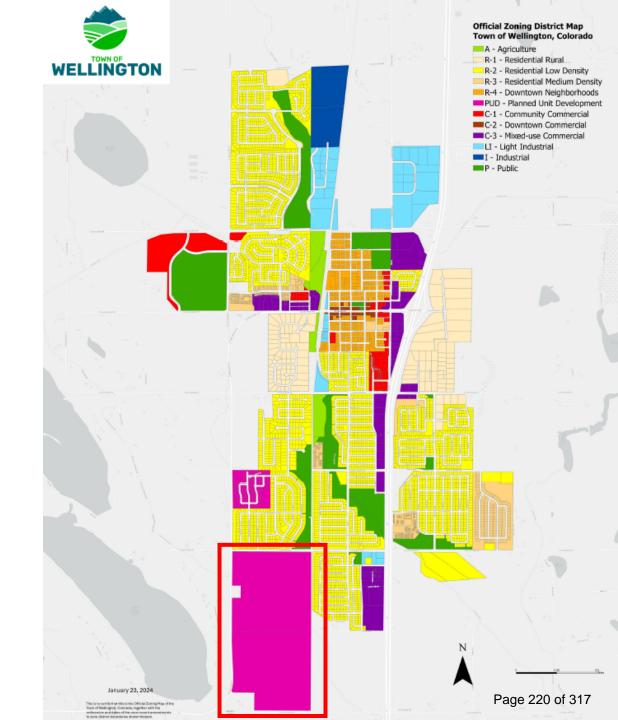

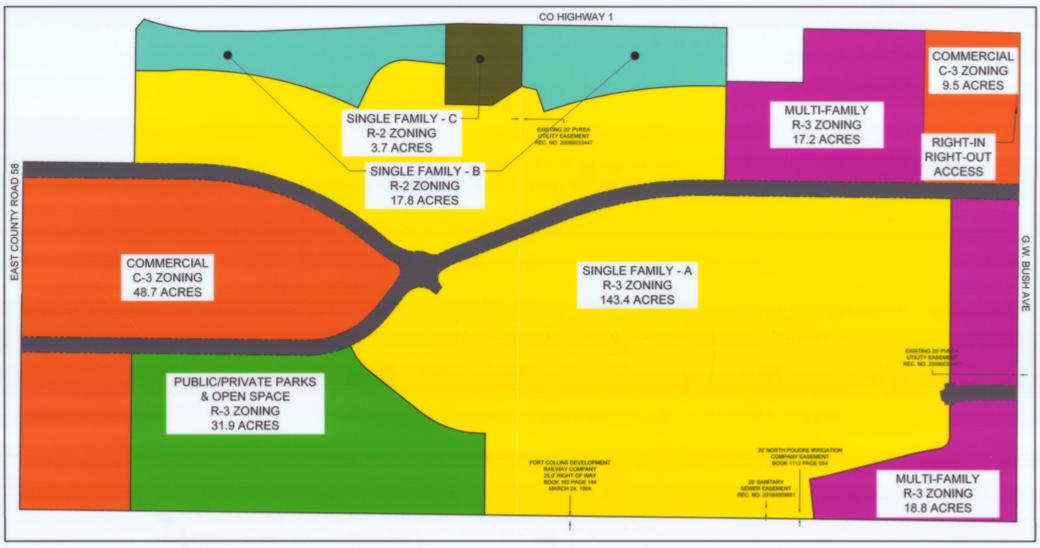

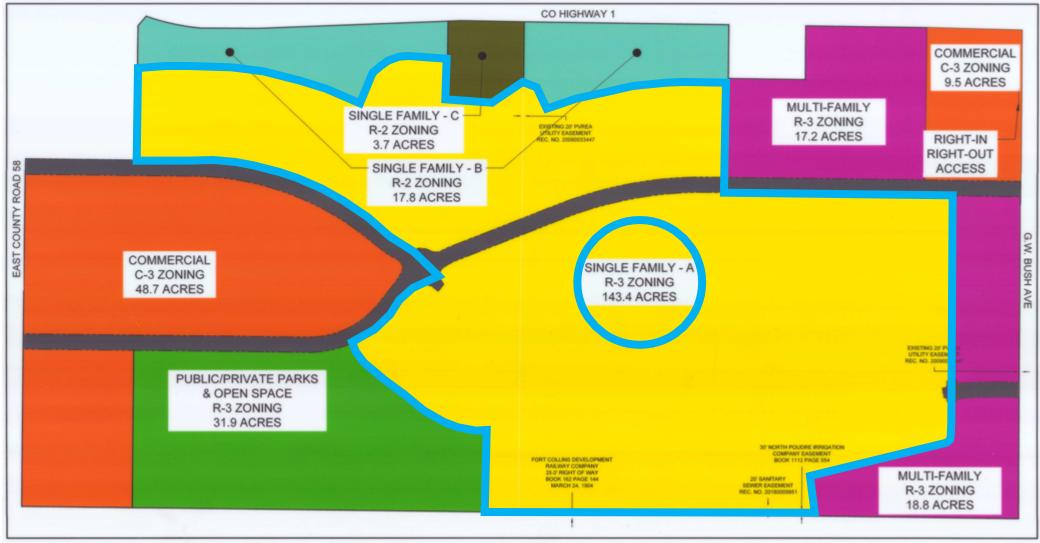
Sage Farms PUD Zoning Map

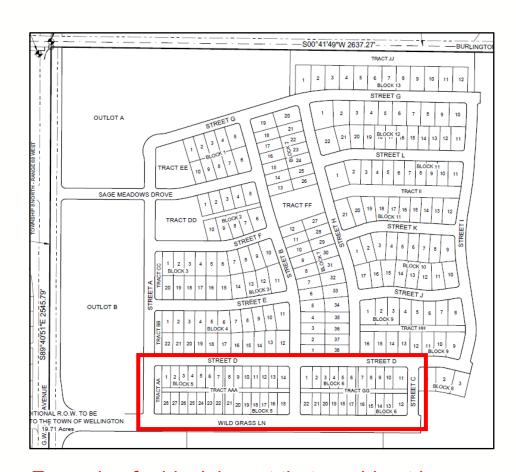

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees passed Ordinance No. 02-2024 that approved the Sage Farms Annexation and Village at Sage Farms Annexation and established the zoning as a Planned Unit Development (PUD); and

WHEREAS, Section D.2.B. of the approved Sage Farms PUD limits the development of no more than six (6) single-family detached units accessing an alley and no more than six (6) single-family attached units per building; and

WHEREAS, the Owners of property affected by the Sage Farms PUD, FC Farm Holding, LLC and Sipes Farm Holding, LLC, 395 Delozier Drive, Suite 110, Fort Collins, CO 80524, has requested to amend said Section D.2.B. of the approved Sage Farms PUD by removing the text that limits the number of units per building and the number of units accessing an alley; and

The Board of Trustees hereby declares that should any section, paragraph, sentence, word or other portion of this ordinance or the rules and regulations adopted herein be declared invalid for any reason, such invalidity shall not affect any other portion of this ordinance or said rules and regulations, and the Board of Trustees hereby declares that it would have passed all other portions of this ordinance and adopted all other portions of said rules and regulations, independent of the elimination here from of any such portion which may be declared invalid.
- 4. Necessity. In the opinion of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, this ordinance is necessary for the preservation and protection of the health, safety, welfare and property of the inhabitants and owners of property in the Town of Wellington.
- 5. Certification. The Town Clerk shall certify to the passage of this ordinance and make not less than three copies of the adopted ordinance available for inspection by the public during regular business hours and shall record at least one certified copy of the ordinance with the Clerk and Recorder of Larimer County.

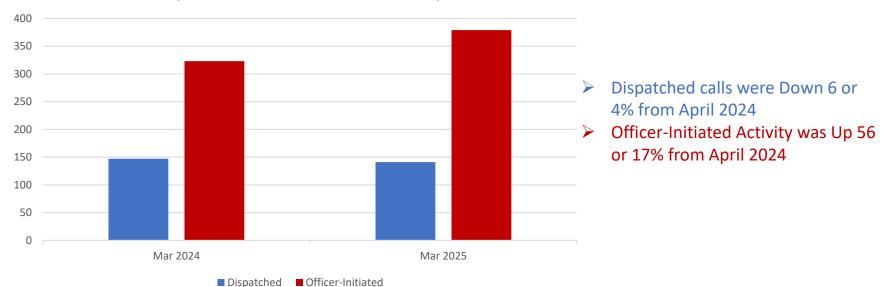

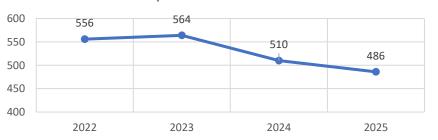

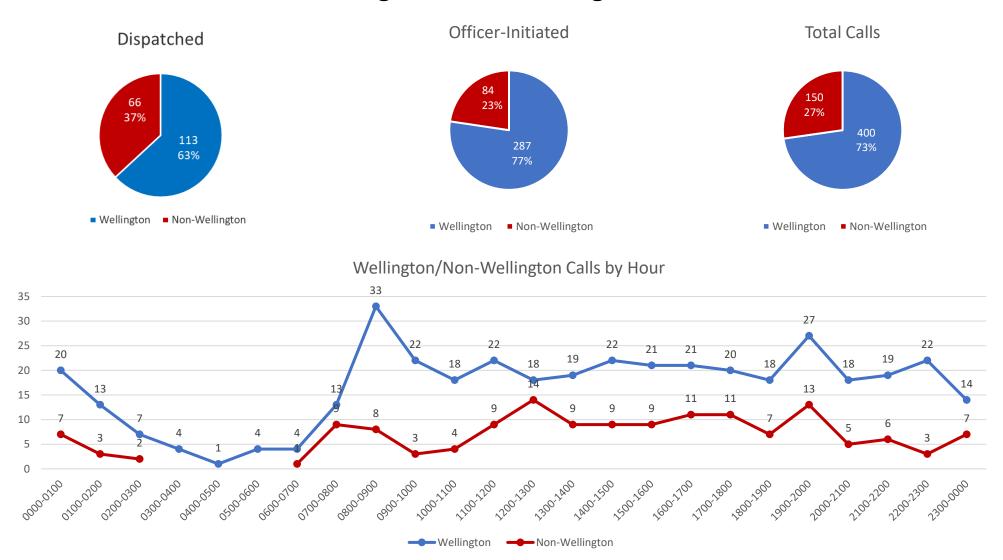

Wellington Drinking Water and Wastewater Utilities Monthly Production and Operational Summary Report As of May 1, 2025

Monthly Production Summary

- Drinking Water
 - Total April monthly volumetric production to meet demand was 22 million gallons (MG), which is slightly above average production for the last 5 years.
 - The Conventional Plant produced 15 MG.
 - o The Nanofiltration Plant came back into production in April.
 - The Nanofiltration Plant produced 7 MG.
 - Please see the attached charts for various additional data related to drinking water production.

Wastewater

- The total influent volume for April was approximately 18 MG, which is in line with the average influent volume for April over the last 5 years.
- Hydraulic loading for April was at 0.61 million gallons per day (MGD). This hydraulic load represents 67% of the currently permitted maximum hydraulic capacity.
- Organic loading for March was 1,760 pounds of BOD, which is below average for April over the last 5 years. This represents 67% of the currently permitted maximum organic capacity.

Monthly Operational Summary

- Drinking Water Treatment Plants
 - Conventional Plant
 - Treatment processes were operational all month without issue.
 - Nanofiltration Plant

 - Operational all month on the new side of the plant.
 - Water Operations staff continued to work closely with the expansion project instrumentation and controls team, as well as the electrical and HVAC teams, to address ongoing plant optimization processes.
