BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

The Board of Trustees approved a Letter of Engagement with Baker Tilly US LLP through Resolution No. 24-2023 on July 18, 2023 for financial management services. Mr. Don Rhoads was contracted to work for the Town of Wellington through December 31, 2023 with an amount not to exceed \$120,000; staff anticipates the full amount to be expended by the end of the year. The work that Mr. Rhoads has completed for Wellington has been extensive and will culminate with the consideration of the 2024 draft budget. Staff anticipates opening up recruitment for a Finance Director after the first of the year and would like to retain Mr. Rhoads until the recruitment is completed and allow him to assist the new Director in the transition to Wellington.

An extension for Mr. Rhoads services has been requested and Baker Tilly has offered the attached change order with an hourly rate of \$175; this is the same rate as the 2023 Letter of Engagement. The proposed 2024 Town of Wellington Budget has included \$90,000 for Professional Services in the Finance Department. We anticipate utilizing Mr. Rhoads services January 1, 2024 - June 1, 2024 for approximately 20 hours per week; responsibilities would include continued oversight of financials and financial reporting for 2024, review and creation of financial policies, financial planning and assisting with the Finance Director recruitment.

If the Board of Trustees is supportive of this request, a resolution approving the change order will be placed on the January 9, 2024 Trustee agenda.

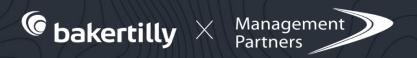

Subject: Finance Director/Treasurer - Separation of Duties

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

At the November 28, 2023 Board of Trustee meeting, the Trustees provided direction to conduct the recruitment of a new Finance Director/Treasurer in-house. During the discussion, the option to separate the two positions was brought up and direction was given to investigate the separation further and report back on December 12, 2023. For Board of Trustee use, staff has included information on the Treasurer's responsibilities as noted in the Wellington Municipal Code and the current responsibilities of the Finance Director which are outlined in the attached job description.

The Finance Director/Treasurer position is currently identified as one full-time exempt employee for Wellington with a salary range of \$103,700-\$155,500; based on information submitted to the Colorado Municipal League (CML) the average 2023 salary range for a Finance Director is \$112,282-\$162,352 (average of 86 cities/towns). CML includes the term "Treasurer" in several job descriptions: City Clerk, City/Town Clerk/Treasurer, Finance Director, Town Administrator/Clerk, Treasurer/Bookkeeper and City Treasurer. The Wellington Municipal Code provides the duties of the Treasurer at Sec. 2-3-30(c) which includes payment of invoices, tracking of payments and assuring they are charged to the correct general ledger accounts, creating a report of all transactions after March 1 of each year, solicit bids for the annual audit along with other duties as assigned or required by state law.

In December, 2021 CML did a search of their database for statutory municipalities that had both a Finance Director and a Treasurer. The only statutory town that fit was the Town of Collbran (population 368 in 2021); their administrator is the Town Administrator/Town Clerk/Treasurer/PIO and they also have a Finance Director. Leadville and Salida are the two statutory cities that have elected Treasurers and appointed Finance Directors. The Salida Treasurer position was part of a 2018 special election to change the position from elected to appointed. The question did not pass and is still an elected position. More information regarding the Salida City Treasurer including responsibilities can be found at this link

https://www.cityofsalida.com/elected/page/city-treasurer. The term is for four years with no voting powers; the Treasurer is paid \$450 per month. The attached CML report indicates municipalities that have an employee with the term "Treasurer" in their job title, who the Treasurer reports to, the population of the municipality, the number of employees along with the annual budget that was reported.

A review of CML data indicates the municipalities that have only a Treasurer and no Finance Director are Burlington, Fort Morgan, Lamar, Rangely and Silt. Burlington and Fort Morgan Treasurers are a direct report to the Manager/Administrator; Lamar reports to the Administrator and the City Council. There was no information readily available for the Rangely or Silt reporting structure. The salary ranges for appointed Treasurers who have no additional titles (such as Clerk/Treasurer) are varied depending on the size of the municipality, starting at \$52,511 to \$111,182.

Don Rhoads, Finance Director/Treasurer, has been working with Wellington since August, 2023 and has been



in the municipal finance industry for most of his career. Based on his experience and time in Wellington, he advised that success for Wellington could include a Finance Director and Assistant or Deputy Finance Director or Finance Manager. At a high level, the Finance Director would review the financial reports and general ledger data being generated by and through the Assistant/Deputy/Manager to ensure timeliness and accuracy of reporting. The separation of duties would also enable the Finance Director to perform long-term financial planning/visioning for the municipality. The draft job description for the Finance Director is also attached for your knowledge.

Staff can provide additional information on this topic at the direction of the Board of Trustees.

JOB TITLE: Finance Director

REPORTS TO: Town Administrator

SUMMARY:

Under direction of the Town Administrator performs management and technical duties as the Town's Director of Finance, with responsibility for directing the Town's financial operations and safeguarding the assets; manage the annual financial and compliance audit, annual budget development, financial statement preparation and reporting; assures compliance with state and Federal regulations, and Town policies and procedures. The director also serves as Town Treasurer, an appointment made by the Board of Trustees pursuant to the Town's municipal code.

ESSENTIAL JOB FUNCTIONS:

- Serves as the principal financial advisor to the Town Administrator, Mayor, and Board of Trustees. Evaluates and analyzes financial issues and policies, recommends and implements solutions; identifies and monitors financial goals and objectives; evaluates Town's needs, and recommends financial resource requirements.
- Assists the Town Administrator and department heads in the preparation of the annual operating and long-range capital budgets.
- Develops and manages strategies to assure effective financial planning and analysis; reviews Town strategies and determines financial resource requirements and goals.
- Advises and consults the elected Town Board, advisory boards, department heads, and the Town Administrator on fiscal problems and makes recommendations for specific courses of action.
- Monitors expenditures, budget condition, cash flow, directs receipts, deposits, and investments of the Town. Prepares revenue, expenditure, debt, cost, and other statements.
- Administers accounts payable, utility billing, accounts receivable, and payroll.
- Maintains the capital asset inventory and depreciation schedules for enterprise funds.
- Interprets laws, rules, regulations, and guidelines pertaining to accounting and financial procedures; establishes internal financial controls, and assures the financial activities are in compliance with all laws, policies and regulations and the organization's strategic direction.
- Coordinates all external financial reporting and preparation of consolidated financial statements; manages the preparation and filing of all financial reports.



- Manages Finance Department operations; directs the continuous improvement of the work processes; oversees accounts payable, utility billing, accounts receivable and payroll; assures the quality of the financial activities, services, and work products; oversees the Town's investments, and credit and bond ratings.
- Supervises accounting system and prepares statements and reports on financial affairs to administrative and elected officials.
- Meets regularly with Town Administrator to evaluate operations and technical issues, may direct the implementation of solutions.
- Supervises staff through appropriate work oversight; prioritizes and coordinates work assignments; trains, coaches and instructs employees; monitors work and evaluates performance.
- Assures effective communication of financial issues; clarifies and reconciles complex financial issues; evaluates and analyzes fiscal policies and procedures and recommends solutions.
- Researches, organizes, compiles, summarizes, and analyzes data and information for special projects and strategic planning; develops and documents recommendations; recommends tax and rate adjustments; prepares and presents reports to management.
- Maintains professional competence in accounting principles and techniques; reviews and applies new or revised laws, regulations, and accounting standards.
- Serves as the liaison to the Colorado Department of Revenue for maintenance of confidential sales tax collection records.
- Performs other duties as assigned.

KNOWLEDGE, SKILLS, AND ABILITIES:

- Thorough knowledge of the principles, methods and practices of municipal finance; Governmental accounting; GAAP accounting; budget accounting; computerized financial accounting systems; utility pricing, billing and collections; governmental fund auditing and audit preparation.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

The Town has prioritized installing automatic meters for the past 5 years with the intention of utilizing a fully efficient Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) when replacements were complete. This has been an ongoing Capital Improvement Project in the budget. The metering infrastructure will provide exceptional water savings benefits for the Town and the residents of Wellington. Advanced Metering systems are a catalyst project across the state of Colorado and in Larimer county in terms of water efficiency. These systems can detect leaks, reverse flow, empty pipes, etc. in a matter of seconds and provide the Town with the ability to notify residents of any concerns and suggestions instantly. Currently, many leaks in the Town of Wellington can go undetected until the water customer receives their bill at the end of the month. This extended period of undetected leaks can cause high water costs to customers, prolonged damage to the infrastructure that may require extensive repairs, and significant water waste for our supply.

The Bureau of Reclamation WaterSMART program aims to work with states, tribes, and local entities to fund and implement projects that increase water supply in the Western United States by modernizing existing infrastructure. They seek to provide assistance to water managers for projects that seek to conserve and use water more efficiently. Municipal metering projects are one of the most funded projects through the WaterSMART program because it provides some of the highest traceable water savings among entities.

The WaterSMART Water and Energy Efficiency Grant provides a 50/50 cost share funding for projects that can be completed within 2 or 3 years. The Town's proposed project would include replacing 1,076 meters and radios in existing homes in Wellington and installing networking infrastructure and software. The network and software already ties into the Town's existing billing system. The Town of Wellington would seek \$499,994.54 from the Bureau of Reclamation for this AMI project. The Town's 50% contribution for the project would include \$314,277.04 of in-kind services and \$185,717.50 in budgeted dollars. The in-kind services breakdown includes salary and benefits for 6 staff members that would be involved in the project and equipment costs for equipment the Town already owns. There are no additional positions created or new staff hours accrued beyond the designated job duties of these 6 positions. The ability to include these in-kind services reduces the budget impact of this project for the Town. Some communities choose to hire contractors to complete these projects, but current Town staff are well versed in the replacement process of the meters and have been doing the replacements for the past several years so this project can be completed in house. The current budgeted numbers are based off quotes received from the Town's supplier in July of 2023. This is a 3-year project and there is an expectation that with inflation, there may need to be small adjustments to the costs for the project.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

The mission of the Wellington Housing Authority is accomplished through a collaboration between a number of entities. The Town of Wellington, it's statutorily-regulated Wellington Housing Authority, the non-profit Wellington Community Housing entity that owns the properties, and Housing Catalyst, which manages the properties.

Earlier in 2023, the audit firm for Housing Catalyst identified an issue where the defined membership of the Board of Directors of Wellington Community Housing caused the non-profit to be considered a "component unit" of the town. This designation causes accounting and auditing issues related to who controls and who needs to account for the assets. The Board of Trustees appoints both the Housing Authority members and the non-profits board.

Several solutions were proposed, but the attached proposal seeks to resolve the issue in a way that the accountants and auditors feel comfortable with. The process for removing a member from a housing authority is defined by C.R.S. § 29-4-208(1), which requires a public hearing and that the removal be for cause. The proposed changes to the Wellington Community Housing by-laws mirrors this language for the board of directors of that non-profit. The effect is that while the Town appoints, its ability to remove directors requires something more than just the desires of the board.

Because the non-profit board and housing authority share members, this also has the effect of providing more clarity in the removal process, whereby a single person would not be subject to two process with different standards.

WHEREAS, the members of the Wellington Housing Authority and Wellington Community Housing board of directors are appointed by the Wellington Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, any changes to the by-laws of Wellington Community Housing (the "By-Laws") must be approved by the Town of Wellington Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, the Wellington Community Housing Board of Directors desire to amend the By-Laws to change the provisions relating to removal of the Board of Directors to mirror C.R.S. § 29-4-208(1), governing the removal of members of the Wellington Housing Authority; and

WHEREAS, such change to the By-Laws will cause Wellington Community Housing to no longer be considered a "Constituent Unit" of the Town of Wellington and as such, the assets of the non-profit will not be included within the assets of the Town for purposes of audits; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees finds that such a change is beneficial to the Town of Wellington.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board of Trustees for the Town of Wellington, Colorado, as follows:

1. The Board of Trustees approves the By-Laws of Wellington Community Housing as were adopted by the Board of Directors of Wellington Community Housing on November 27, 2023.

Action Item: Approval to Revise Bylaws to Address Town Component Unit Issue

Board Action Requested: Review and approve revised Wellington Community Housing bylaws for consistency with state housing authorities' law in order to address the "component unit" of the Town of Wellington issue.

Background: Over the past several months, you will recall that our audit firm flagged an issue with the way the Town of Wellington Board of Trustees appoints and removes directors of the board of Wellington Community Housing, presently making it a component unit of the Town of Wellington. After many conversations with this board, legal counsel, the Town Administrator, and the Town Board of Trustees, all parties agree that the best way to address this issue is to revise the bylaws of Wellington Community Housing such that the Town Board of Trustees can remove a seated director for cause in a public forum. This approach is consistent with Colorado Revised Statutes Housing Authorities law and is consistent with the intent to operate Wellington Community Housing in this manner.

Attached are clean and redlined versions of the Wellington Community Housing bylaws and a Secretary's Certificate. The only change is Article VII, Section 6(c) on page 3, to now state:

<u>Removal of Directors</u>. The Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, Colorado may remove a Director for inefficiency or neglect of duty or misconduct in office, but only after the Director has been given a copy of the charges made against the Director and the Director has had an opportunity to be heard in person and represented by counsel.

Fiscal Impact: Minimal fiscal impact. There may be savings related to not having to include as a component unit of the Town of Wellington's financial statements and audit reports.

AMENDED AND RESTATED BYLAWS OF WELLINGTON COMMUNITY HOUSING (Adopted November ____ 2023)

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of the corporation is WELLINGTON COMMUNITY HOUSING ("the Corporation").

ARTICLE II. PURPOSES

The purposes for which the nonprofit corporation is organized are as follows:

- 1. To own, maintain, repair, improve, operate, rent, lease, and manage affordable rental housing for low-income households.
- 2. To do such other lawful acts of a charitable or educational nature, within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States and the regulations thereunder, as they now exist or as they may hereafter be amended.

ARTICLE III. POWERS

The nonprofit corporation shall have all powers, rights, and privileges granted to a nonprofit corporation under the Colorado Revised Nonprofit Corporation Act, as it now exists or as it may hereafter be amended, including but not limited to the power to finance the acquisition, rehabilitation, maintenance, and improvement of rental housing for low-income households through the issuance state and local bonds and private activity bonds, participation in the low income housing tax credit program, receipt of governmental grants and loans, private bank financing, and all other local, state, and federal programs; subject to the following limitations and restrictions:

No part of the assets or net earnings of the nonprofit corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, any Director or officer of the corporation, or to any private individual (except that reasonable compensation may be paid for services rendered to or for the corporation affecting one or more of its purposes, and benefits may be conferred that are in conformity with said purposes).

No Director or officer of the nonprofit corporation or any private individual shall be entitled to share in the distribution of any of the nonprofit corporation's assets on dissolution of the nonprofit corporation.

No substantial part of the activities of the nonprofit corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the nonprofit corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office (including the publication or distribution of statements).

Notwithstanding any other provisions of these Articles, the nonprofit corporation shall not conduct or carry on any activities not permitted to be conducted or carried on by an organization exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States and the regulations thereunder, as they now exist or as they may hereafter be amended, or by an organization contributions to which are deductible under Section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States and the regulations thereunder, as they now exist or as they may hereafter be amended.

ARTICLE IV. DISSOLUTION

Upon dissolution of the nonprofit corporation, the assets of the nonprofit corporation shall be distributed as follows:

Upon dissolution of the nonprofit corporation, the Board of Directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of the debts and liabilities of the nonprofit corporation, distribute all assets of the nonprofit corporation to the Housing Authority of the Town of Wellington ("WHA") if it is then in existence and if not, the Board of Directors shall dispose of the assets of the nonprofit corporation exclusively for the purpose of the corporation stated herein by distributing such assets to one or more organizations as shall at the time qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the United States Internal Revenue Code (or under the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue law), as the Board of Directors shall determine.

Any of such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by any court of record with general equity jurisdiction in the State of Colorado, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as such court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE V. OFFICES

The initial office of the Corporation shall be at 1715 West Mountain Avenue, Fort Collins, Colorado 80521.

ARTICLE VI. MEMBERS

The Corporation shall not have members.

ARTICLE VII. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- 1. <u>Powers</u>. All powers of the Corporation shall be exercised by or under the authority of, and the business and affairs of the Corporation managed under the direction of, the Board of Directors.
- 2. <u>Qualifications of Directors</u>. A Director shall be a natural person who is eighteen (18) years of age or older. Directors shall be residents of the Town of Wellington, Colorado, or the surrounding area. No officer, commissioner, agent, or employee of Housing Catalyst may be a Director of the Corporation.

- 3. <u>Number of Directors</u>. The Board of Directors shall consist of not less than 5 nor more than 7 Directors. Initially the Board of Directors shall consist of 5 members. The number of Directors may be changed from time to time by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, Colorado.
- 4. <u>Election, Appointment, and Designation of Directors</u>. All Directors shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, Colorado. The initial members of the Board of Directors and the expiration date of each initial Director's term in office are as follows:

John Evans December 2025

5. Terms of Directors.

- (a) After the expiration of the initial term of each member of the initial Board of Directors, Directors shall be appointed for terms of 5 years each.
- (b) A decrease in the number of Directors or in the term of office does not shorten an incumbent Director's term.
- (c) The term of a Director filling a vacancy expires at the end of the unexpired term that such Director is filling.
- (d) Despite the expiration of a Director's term, a Director continues to serve until the Director's successor is appointed and qualifies or until there is a decrease in the number of Directors.

6. Resignation of Directors.

- (a) A Director may resign at any time by giving written notice of resignation to the Corporation.
- (b) A resignation of a Director is effective when the notice is received by the Corporation unless the notice specifies a later effective date.
- (c) <u>Removal of Directors</u>. The Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, Colorado may remove a Director for inefficiency or neglect of duty or misconduct in office, but only after the Director has been given a copy of the charges made against the Director and the Director has had an opportunity to be heard in person and represented by counsel.

- 7. <u>Vacancy on Board</u>. If a vacancy occurs on the Board of Directors, the vacancy shall be filled by the entity that appointed the Director who previously occupied the vacant position.
- 8. <u>Compensation of Directors</u>. Directors shall not receive compensation for service on the Board of Directors. However, any Director may be reimbursed for the actual expenses incurred by the Director in the performance of his or her duties.

ARTICLE VIII. MEETINGS AND ACTION OF THE BOARD

1. Meetings.

- (a) The Board of Directors may hold regular or special meetings.
- (b) The Board of Directors may permit any Director to participate in a regular or special meeting by telephone. The Board of Directors may conduct the meeting by any means of communication by which all Directors participating may hear each other during the meeting. A Director participating in a meeting by this means is deemed to be present in person at the meeting.

2. <u>Action Without Meeting</u>.

- (a) Any action required or permitted to be taken at a Board of Directors' meeting may be taken without a meeting if each member of the Board in writing either:
 - 1) Votes for such action; or
- 2) Votes against such action or abstains from voting and waives the right to demand that action not be taken without a meeting.
- (b) Action is taken under this section only if the affirmative vote for such action equals or exceeds the minimum number of votes that would be necessary to take such action at a meeting at which all of the Directors then in office were present and voted.
- (c) No action taken pursuant to this section shall be effective unless writings describing the action taken and otherwise satisfying the requirements of subsection (a) hereinabove, signed by all Directors and not revoked pursuant to subsection (d) of this section, are received by the Corporation. Any such writing may be received by the Corporation by electronically transmitted facsimile or other form of wire or wireless communication providing the Corporation with a complete copy of the document, including a copy of the signature on the document. A Director's right to demand that action not be taken without a meeting shall be deemed to have been waived if the Corporation receives a writing satisfying the requirements of subsection (a) hereinabove that has been signed by the Director and not revoked pursuant to subsection (d) hereinafter. Action taken pursuant to this section shall be effective when the last writing necessary to effect the action is received by the Corporation unless the writings describing the action taken set forth a different effective date.
- (d) Any Director who has signed a writing pursuant to this section may revoke such writing by a writing signed and dated by the Director describing the action and stating that

the Director's prior vote with respect thereto is revoked, if such writing is received by the Corporation before the last writing necessary to effect the action is received by the Corporation.

- (e) Action taken pursuant to this section has the same effect as action taken at a meeting of Directors and may be described as such in any document.
- (f) All signed, written instruments necessary for any action taken pursuant to this section shall be filed with the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors.

3. Notice of Meeting.

- (a) Regular meetings of the Board of Directors may be held without notice of the date, time, place, or purpose of the meeting.
- (b) Special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be preceded by at least two (2) days' notice of the date, time, and place of the meeting. The notice need not describe the purpose of the special meeting.

4. Waiver of Notice.

- (a) A Director may waive any notice of a meeting before or after the time and date of the meeting stated in the notice. Except as provided by subsection (b) hereinafter, the waiver shall be in writing and signed by the Director entitled to the notice. Such waiver shall be delivered to the Corporation for filing with the Corporation records, but such delivery and filing shall not be conditions of the effectiveness of the waiver.
- (b) A Director's attendance at or participation in a meeting waives any required notice to that Director of the meeting unless, at the beginning of the meeting or promptly upon the Director's later arrival, the Director objects to holding the meeting or transacting business at the meeting because of lack of notice or defective notice and does not thereafter vote for or assent to action taken at the meeting.

5. Quorum and Voting.

- (a) A quorum of the Board of Directors consists of a majority of Directors in office immediately before the meeting begins.
- (b) If a quorum is present when a vote is taken, the affirmative vote of a majority of the Directors present at the meeting is the act of the Board of Directors unless the vote of a greater number of Directors is required by these Bylaws.
- (c) For purposes of determining a quorum with respect to a particular proposal, and for purposes of casting a vote for or against a particular proposal, a Director may be deemed to be present at a meeting and to vote if the Director has granted a signed, written proxy to another Director who is present at the meeting, authorizing the other Director to cast the vote that is directed to be cast by the written proxy with respect to the particular proposal that is described with reasonable specificity in the proxy. Except as provided in this subsection (c), Directors may not vote or otherwise act by proxy.

- (d) A Director who is present at a meeting of the Board of Directors when Board of Directors action is taken is deemed to have assented to all action taken at the meeting unless:
- 1) The Director objects at the beginning of the meeting, or promptly upon the Director's arrival, to holding the meeting or transacting business at the meeting and does not thereafter vote for or assent to any action taken at the meeting;
- 2) The Director contemporaneously requests that the Director's dissent or abstention as to any specific action taken be entered in the minutes of the meeting; or
- 3) The Director causes written notice of the Director's dissent or abstention as to any specific action to be received by the presiding officer of the meeting before adjournment of the meeting or by the Corporation promptly after adjournment of the meeting.
- (e) The right of dissent or abstention pursuant to subsection (d) hereinabove as to a specific action is not available to a Director who votes in favor of the action taken.

6. Committees of the Board.

- (a) The Board of Directors may create one or more committees of the Board and appoint one or more Directors to serve on them.
- (b) The creation of a committee of the Board and appointment of Directors to it shall be approved by a majority of all the Directors in office when the action is taken.
- (c) Action without meeting, notice, waiver of notice, and quorum and voting requirements of the Board of Directors apply to committees of the Board and their members as well.
- (d) To the extent specified by the Board of Directors, each committee of the Board shall have the authority of the Board of Directors, except that a committee of the Board shall not authorize distributions; elect, appoint, or remove any Director; amend articles of incorporation; adopt, amend, or repeal bylaws; approve a plan of merger; or approve a sale, lease, exchange, or other disposition of all, or substantially all, of its property, with or without good will, other than in the usual and regular course of business.
- (e) The creation of, delegation of authority to, or action by a committee does not alone constitute compliance by a Director with the standards of conduct described in these Bylaws.
- (f) Nothing in these Bylaws shall prohibit or restrict the Corporation from establishing by action of the Board of Directors one or more committees, advisory Boards, auxiliaries, or other bodies of any kind, having such members and rules of procedure as the Board of Directors may provide, in order to provide such advice, service, and assistance to the Corporation, and to carry out such duties and responsibilities for the Corporation, as may be specified by the Board of Directors; except that if any such committee or other body has one or more members thereof who are entitled to vote on committee matters and who are not then also

Directors, such committee or other body may not exercise any power or authority of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IX. STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

1. General Standards of Conduct for Directors and Officers.

- (a) Each Director shall discharge the Director's duties as Director, including the Director's duties as a member of a committee of the Board, and each officer with discretionary authority shall discharge the officer's duties under that authority in good faith, with the care an ordinarily prudent person in a like position would exercise under similar circumstances, and in a manner the Director or officer reasonably believes to be in the best interests of the Corporation.
- (b) In discharging duties, a Director or officer is entitled to rely on information, opinions, reports, or statements, including financial statements and other financial data, if prepared or presented by:
- 1) One or more officers or employees of the Corporation whom the Director or officer reasonably believes to be reliable and competent in the matters presented;
- 2) Legal counsel, a public accountant, or another person as to matters the Director or officer reasonably believes are within such person's professional or expert competence; or
- 3) In the case of a Director, a committee of the Board of Directors of which the Director is not a member if the Director reasonably believes the committee merits confidence.
- (c) A Director or officer is not acting in good faith if the Director or officer has knowledge concerning the matter in question that makes reliance otherwise permitted by subsection (b) hereinabove unwarranted.
- (d) A Director or officer is not liable to the Corporation for any action taken or omitted to be taken as a Director or officer, as the case may be, if, in connection with such action or omission, the Director or officer performed the duties of the position in compliance with this section.
- (e) A Director, regardless of title, shall not be deemed to be a trustee with respect to the Corporation or with respect to any property held or administered by the Corporation, including, without limitation, property that may be subject to restrictions imposed by the donor or transferor of such property.

2. Liability of Directors for Unlawful Distributions.

(a) A Director who votes for or assents to a distribution knowingly made in violation of these Bylaws is personally liable to the Corporation for the amount of the distribution that exceeds what could have been distributed without violating these Bylaws if it is established that the Director did not perform the Director's duties in compliance with the foregoing section.

In any proceeding commenced under this section, a Director shall have all of the defenses ordinarily available to the Director.

- (b) A Director held liable under subsection (a) hereinabove for an unlawful distribution is entitled to contribution:
- 1) From every other Director who could be held liable under subsection (a) hereinabove for the unlawful distribution; and
- 2) From each person who accepted the distribution knowing the distribution was made in violation of these Bylaws, the amount of the contribution from such person being the amount of the distribution to that person that exceeds what could have been distributed to that person without violating these Bylaws.

ARTICLE X. <u>DIRECTORS' CONFLICTING INTEREST TRANSACTIONS</u>

- 1. As used in this section, "conflicting interest transaction" means a contract or other financial relationship between the Corporation and a Director of the Corporation, or between the Corporation and a party related to a Director, or between the Corporation and an entity in which a Director of the Corporation is a Director or officer or has a financial interest.
- 2. No loans shall be made by the Corporation to its Directors or officers. Any Director or officer who assents to or participates in the making of any such loan shall be liable to the Corporation for the amount of such loan until the repayment thereof.
- 3. No conflicting interest transaction shall be void or voidable or be enjoined, set aside, or give rise to an award of damages or other sanctions in a proceeding by the Corporation solely because the conflicting interest transaction involves a Director of the Corporation or a party related to a Director or an entity in which a Director of the Corporation is a Director or officer or has a financial interest, or solely because the Director is present at or participates in the meeting of the Corporation's Board of Directors or of the committee of the Board of Directors that authorizes, approves, or ratifies the conflicting interest transaction, or solely because the Director's vote is counted for such purpose if:
- (a) The material fact as to the Director's relationship or interest and as to the conflicting interest transaction are disclosed or are known to the Board of Directors or the committee, and the Board of Directors or the committee, in good faith, authorizes, approves, or ratifies the conflicting interest transaction by the affirmative vote of a majority of the disinterested Directors, even though the disinterested Directors are less than a quorum; or
- (b) The material facts as to the Director's relationship or interest and as to the conflicting interest transaction are disclosed or are known to the members of the Board entitled to vote thereon, and the conflicting interest transaction is specifically authorized, approved, or ratified in good faith by a vote of the members of the Board entitled to vote thereon; or
 - (c) The conflicting interest transaction is fair as to the Corporation.

- 4. Common or interested Directors may be counted in determining the presence of a quorum at a meeting of the Board of Directors or of a committee which authorizes, approves, or ratifies the conflicting interest transaction.
- 5. For purposes of this section, a "party related to a Director" shall mean a spouse, a descendent, an ancestor, a sibling, the spouse or descendent of a sibling, an estate or trust in which the Director or a party related to a Director has a beneficial interest, or an entity in which a party related to a Director is a Director, officer, or has a financial interest.

ARTICLE XI. LIMITS OF CERTAIN LIABILITIES OF DIRECTORS

- 1. There shall be no personal liability, either direct or indirect, of any Director or officer to the Corporation for monetary damages for any breach or breaches of fiduciary duty as Director or officer, except that this provision shall not eliminate the liability of a Director or officer to the Corporation for monetary damages for any breach, act, omission, or transaction to which the Nonprofit Corporation Act expressly prohibits the elimination of liability.
- 2. This provision shall not limit the rights of Directors or officers of the Corporation for indemnification or other assistance from the Corporation. This provision shall not modify, restrict, or otherwise diminish the provisions of C.R.S. § 13-21-116(2)(b) (concerning elimination of liability of Directors, except for willful and wanton acts or omissions); any amendment or successor provision thereto; or any law limiting or eliminating liabilities.
- 3. Any repeal or modification of the foregoing provisions of this article the Corporation or any repeal or modification of the provisions of the Nonprofit Corporation Act which permits the elimination of liability of Directors by this article shall not affect adversely any elimination of liability, right, or protection of a Director or officer of the Corporation with respect to any breach, act, omission, or transaction of such Director or officer occurring prior to the time of such repeal or modification.

ARTICLE XII. INDEMNIFICATION

- 1. Indemnification Definitions. As used in this article:
- (a) "Director" means an individual who is or was a Director of the Corporation or an individual who, while a Director of the Corporation, is or was serving at the Corporation's request as a Director, officer, partner, Board of Directors, trustee, employee, fiduciary, or agent of another domestic or foreign corporation, nonprofit corporation, or other person or of an employee benefit plan. A Director is considered to be serving an employee benefit plan at the Corporation's request if the Director's duties to the Corporation also impose duties on, or otherwise involve services by, the Director to the plan or to the participants in or beneficiaries of the plan. "Director" includes, unless the context requires otherwise, the estate or personal representative of a Director.
 - (b) "Expenses" includes attorney fees.
- (c) "Liability" means the obligation incurred with respect to a proceeding to pay a judgment, settlement, penalty, fine (including an excise tax assessed with respect to an employee benefit plan), or reasonable expenses.

- (d) "Party" includes a person who was, is, or is threatened to be made a named defendant or respondent in a proceeding.
 - (e) "Proceeding" means any threatened, pending, or completed action, suit, or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative, or investigative, and whether formal or informal.

2. <u>Authority to Indemnify Directors</u>.

- (a) Except as provided in subsection (d) hereinafter, the Corporation shall indemnify a person made a party to a proceeding because the person is or was a Director against liability incurred in the proceeding if:
 - 1) The person's conduct was in good faith; and
 - 2) The person reasonably believed:
- (i) In the case of conduct in an official capacity with the Corporation, that the conduct was in the Corporation's best interests;
- (ii) In all other cases, that the conduct was at least not opposed to the Corporation's best interests; and
- (iii) In the case of any criminal proceeding, the person had no reasonable cause to believe the conduct was unlawful.
- (b) A Director's conduct with respect to an employee benefit plan for a purpose the Director reasonably believed to be in the interests of the participants in or beneficiaries of the plan is conduct that satisfies the requirement of subsection (2)(ii) hereinabove. A Director's conduct with respect to an employee benefit plan for a purpose that the Director did not reasonably believe to be in the interests of the participants in or beneficiaries of the plan shall be deemed not to satisfy the requirements of subsection (a)(1) hereinabove.
- (c) The termination of a proceeding by judgment, order, settlement, or conviction or upon a plea of *nolo contendre* or its equivalent is not, of itself, determinative that the Director did not meet the standard of conduct described in this section.
 - (d) The Corporation may not indemnify a Director under this section:
- 1) In connection with a proceeding by or in the right of the Corporation in which the Director was adjudged liable to the Corporation; or
- 2) In connection with any other proceeding charging that the Director derived an improper personal benefit, whether or not involving action in an official capacity, in which proceeding the Director was adjudged personally liable on the basis that the Director derived an improper personal benefit.

- (e) Indemnification permitted under this section in connection with a proceeding by or in the right of the Corporation is limited to reasonable expenses incurred in connection with the proceeding.
- 3. <u>Mandatory Indemnification of Directors</u>. The Corporation shall indemnify a person who was wholly successful, on the merits or otherwise, in the defense of any proceeding to which the person was a party because the person is or was a Director, against reasonable expenses incurred by the person in connection with the proceeding.

4. Advance of Expenses to Directors.

- (a) The Corporation shall pay for or reimburse the reasonable expenses incurred by a Director who is a party to a proceeding in advance of final disposition of the proceeding if:
- 1) The Director furnishes to the Corporation a written affirmation of the Director's good faith belief that the Director has met the standard of conduct described in these Bylaws;
- 2) The Director furnishes to the Corporation a written undertaking, executed personally or on the Director's behalf, to repay the advance if it is ultimately determined that the Director did not meet the standard of conduct; and
- 3) A determination is made that the facts then known to those making the determination would not preclude indemnification under this article.
- (b) The undertaking required by subsection (a)(2) hereinabove shall be a general obligation of the Director but need not be secured and may be accepted without reference to financial ability to make repayment.

5. Determination and Authorization of Indemnification of Directors.

- (a) The Corporation may not indemnify a Director under this article unless authorized in the specific case after a determination has been made that indemnification of the Director is permissible in the circumstances because the Director has met the standard of conduct set forth in these Bylaws. The Corporation shall not advance expenses to a Director under this article unless authorized in the specific case after the written affirmation and undertaking required by these Bylaws are received and the determination required by these Bylaws has been made.
 - (b) The determination required by subsection (a) hereinabove shall be made:
- 1) By the Board of Directors by a majority vote of those present at a meeting at which a quorum is present, and only those Directors not parties to the proceeding shall be counted in satisfying the quorum; or
- 2) If a quorum cannot be obtained, a majority vote of a committee of the Board of Directors designated by the Board of Directors, which committee shall consist of two

- (2) or more Directors not parties to the proceeding; except that Directors who are parties to the proceeding may participate in the designation of Directors for the committee.
- (c) If a quorum cannot be obtained as contemplated in subsection (b)(1) hereinabove, and a committee cannot be established under subsection (b)(2) hereinabove, or even if a quorum is obtained or a committee is designated, if a majority of the Directors constituting such quorum or such committee so directs, the determination required to be made by subsection (a) hereinabove shall be made by independent legal counsel selected by a vote of the Board of Directors or the committee in the manner specified in subsection (b)(1) or (b)(2) hereinabove, or if a quorum of the full Board cannot be obtained and a committee cannot be established, by independent legal counsel selected by a majority vote of the full Board of Directors.
- (d) Authorization of indemnification and advance of expenses shall be made in the same manner as the determination that indemnification or advance of expenses is permissible; except that if the determination that indemnification or advance of expenses is permissible is made by independent legal counsel, authorization of indemnification and advance of legal expenses shall be made by the body that selected such counsel.

6. <u>Indemnification of Officers, Employees, Fiduciaries, and Agents.</u>

- (a) An officer is entitled to mandatory indemnification under this article, in each case to the same extent as a Director.
- (b) The Corporation shall indemnify and advance expenses to an officer, employee, fiduciary, or agent of the Corporation to the same extent as to a Director.
- (c) The Corporation shall also indemnify and advance expenses to an officer, employee, fiduciary, or agent who is not a Director to a greater extent, if not inconsistent with public policy or these Bylaws, general or specific action of the Board of Directors or voting members, or contract.
- 7. <u>Insurance</u>. The Corporation shall purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of a person who is or was a Director, officer, employee, fiduciary, or agent of the Corporation or who, while a Director, officer, employee, fiduciary, or agent of the Corporation, is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a Director, officer, partner, member of the Board of Directors, trustee, employee, fiduciary, or agent of another domestic or foreign corporation, nonprofit corporation, or other person, or of an employee benefit plan, against liability asserted against or incurred by the person in that capacity or arising from the person's status as a Director, officer, employee, fiduciary, or agent, whether or not the Corporation would have power to indemnify the person against the same liability under this article. Any such insurance may be procured from any insurance company designated by the Board of Directors, whether such insurance company is formed under the laws of this state or any other jurisdiction of the United States or elsewhere, including any insurance company in which the Corporation has an equity or any other interest through stock ownership or otherwise.
- 8. <u>Limitation of Indemnification of Directors</u>. This article does not limit the Corporation's power to pay or reimburse expenses incurred by a Director in connection with an

appearance as a witness in a proceeding at a time when the Director has not been made a named defendant or respondent in the proceeding.

ARTICLE XIII. OFFICERS

- 1. Officers. The Corporation shall have a president, a secretary, a treasurer, and such other officers as may be designated by the Board of Directors. An officer shall be a natural person who is eighteen (18) years of age or older. An officer need not be a Director of the Corporation. Officers may be appointed by the Board of Directors. A duly appointed officer may appoint one or more officers or assistant officers if authorized by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall delegate to the secretary or to one or more other persons responsibility for the preparation and maintenance of minutes of the Directors' meetings and other records and information required to be kept by the Corporation and for authenticating records of the Corporation. The same individual may simultaneously hold more than one office in the Corporation.
- 2. <u>President</u>. The president shall be the chief executive officer of the Corporation. The president shall preside at all meetings the Board. The president shall have the general powers and duties that are usually vested in the office of president of a corporation, including, but not limited to, the power to appoint committees from time to time as the president may determine to be appropriate to assist in the conduct of the affairs of the Corporation or as may be established by the Board at any regular or special meetings.
- 3. <u>Vice President</u>. The vice president shall have all the powers and authority and perform all functions and duties of the president in the absence of the president or his or her inability for any reason to exercise such powers and functions or to perform such duties.
- 4. <u>Secretary</u>. The secretary shall keep all minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors and the minutes of all meetings of the Corporation. The secretary shall have charge of all books and papers that the Board may direct and shall, in general, perform all the duties incident to the office of the secretary.
- 5. <u>Treasurer</u>. The treasurer shall have the responsibility for the Corporation funds and shall be responsible for keeping a full and accurate account of all receipts and disbursements in the books belonging to the Corporation; provided, however, that when a Board of Directors has been delegated the responsibility of collecting and disbursing funds, the treasurer's responsibility shall be to review the accounts of the Board of Directors not less often than quarterly. The treasurer shall perform such other duties as from time to time may be assigned by the Board of Directors.
- 6. Resignation and Removal of Officers. An officer may resign at any time by giving written notice of resignation to the Corporation. A resignation of an officer is effective when the notice is received by the Corporation unless the notice specifies a later effective date. If a resignation is made effective at a later date, the Board of Directors may permit the officer to remain in office until the effective date and may fill the pending vacancy before the effective date with the provision that the successor does not take office until the effective date, or the Board may remove the officer at any time before the effective date and may fill the resulting vacancy. The Board of Directors may remove any officer at any time without cause. The Board of Directors

may make provisions for the removal of officers by other officers. An officer who resigns or is removed or whose appointment has expired may deliver to the Colorado Secretary of State for filing a statement to that effect.

7. <u>Contract Rights with Respect to Officers</u>. The appointment of an officer does not itself create contract rights. An officer's removal does not affect the officer's contract rights, if any, with the Corporation. An officer's resignation does not affect the Corporation's contract rights, if any, with the officer.

ARTICLE XIV. CORPORATION RECORDS

- 1. The Corporation shall keep as permanent records minutes of all meetings of its Board of Directors, a record of all actions taken by the Board of Directors without a meeting, a record of all actions taken by a committee of the Board of Directors in place of the Board of Directors on behalf of the Corporation, and a record of all waivers of notices of meetings of the Board of Directors or any committee of the Board of Directors.
 - 2. The Corporation shall maintain appropriate accounting records.
- 3. The Corporation shall maintain its records in written form or in another form capable of conversion into written form within a reasonable time.
- 4. The Corporation shall keep a copy of each of the following records at its principal office:
 - (a) Its Articles of Incorporation;
 - (b) Its Bylaws;
- (c) A list of the names and business or home addresses of its current Directors and officers;
- (d) A copy of its most recent corporate report delivered to the Colorado Secretary of State; and
- (e) All financial statements prepared for periods ending during the last three (3) years.

ARTICLE XV. AMENDMENT

These Bylaws may be amended by vote of a majority of the Directors voting in person or by proxy at a meeting at which a quorum of the Directors is present, if notice of the meeting indicated that amendment of the Bylaws would be considered at the meeting and the general substance of the amendment. Any amendment to these Bylaws shall be approved by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, Colorado.

89BYLAWS OF WELLINGTON COMMUNITY HOUSING (A Nonprofit Corporation)

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of the corporation is WELLINGTON COMMUNITY HOUSING ("the Corporation").

ARTICLE II. PURPOSES

The purposes for which the nonprofit corporation is organized are as follows:

- 1. To own, maintain, repair, improve, operate, rent, lease, and manage affordable rental housing for low-income households.
- 2. To do such other lawful acts of a charitable or educational nature, within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States and the regulations thereunder, as they now exist or as they may hereafter be amended.

ARTICLE III. POWERS

The nonprofit corporation shall have all powers, rights, and privileges granted to a nonprofit corporation under the Colorado Revised Nonprofit Corporation Act, as it now exists or as it may hereafter be amended, including but not limited to the power to finance the acquisition, rehabilitation, maintenance, and improvement of rental housing for low-income households through the issuance state and local bonds and private activity bonds, participation in the low income housing tax credit program, receipt of governmental grants and loans, private bank financing, and all other local, state, and federal programs; subject to the following limitations and restrictions:

No part of the assets or net earnings of the nonprofit corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, any Director or officer of the corporation, or to any private individual (except that reasonable compensation may be paid for services rendered to or for the corporation affecting one or more of its purposes, and benefits may be conferred that are in conformity with said purposes).

No Director or officer of the nonprofit corporation or any private individual shall be entitled to share in the distribution of any of the nonprofit corporation's assets on dissolution of the nonprofit corporation.

No substantial part of the activities of the nonprofit corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the nonprofit corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office (including the publication or distribution of statements).

Notwithstanding any other provisions of these Articles, the nonprofit corporation shall not conduct or carry on any activities not permitted to be conducted or carried on by an organization exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States and the regulations thereunder, as they now exist or as they may hereafter be amended, or by an organization contributions to which are deductible under Section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States and the regulations thereunder, as they now exist or as they may hereafter be amended.

ARTICLE IV. DISSOLUTION

Upon dissolution of the nonprofit corporation, the assets of the nonprofit corporation shall be distributed as follows:

Upon dissolution of the nonprofit corporation, the Board of Directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of the debts and liabilities of the nonprofit corporation, distribute all assets of the nonprofit corporation to the Housing Authority of the Town of Wellington ("WHA") if it is then in existence and if not, the Board of Directors shall dispose of the assets of the nonprofit corporation exclusively for the purpose of the corporation stated herein by distributing such assets to one or more organizations as shall at the time qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the United States Internal Revenue Code (or under the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue law), as the Board of Directors shall determine.

Any of such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by any court of record with general equity jurisdiction in the State of Colorado, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as such court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE V. OFFICES

The initial office of the Corporation shall be at 1715 West Mountain Avenue, Fort Collins, Colorado 80521.

ARTICLE VI. MEMBERS

The Corporation shall not have members.

ARTICLE VII. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- 1. <u>Powers</u>. All powers of the Corporation shall be exercised by or under the authority of, and the business and affairs of the Corporation managed under the direction of, the Board of Directors.
- 2. <u>Qualifications of Directors</u>. A Director shall be a natural person who is eighteen (18) years of age or older. Directors shall be residents of the Town of Wellington, Colorado, or the surrounding area. No officer, commissioner, agent, or employee of Housing Catalyst may be a Director of the Corporation.

- 3. <u>Number of Directors</u>. The Board of Directors shall consist of not less than 5 nor more than 7 Directors. Initially the Board of Directors shall consist of 5 members. The number of Directors may be changed from time to time by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, Colorado.
- 4. <u>Election, Appointment, and Designation of Directors</u>. All Directors shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, Colorado. The initial members of the Board of Directors and the expiration date of each initial Director's term in office are as follows:

Daknis's replacement shall expire December

2022)

Bob Novascone December 2021
Amy Combs December 2023
Ashley MacDonald December 2024
John Evans December 2025

5. Terms of Directors.

- (a) After the expiration of the initial term of each member of the initial Board of Directors, Directors shall be appointed for terms of 5 years each.
- (b) A decrease in the number of Directors or in the term of office does not shorten an incumbent Director's term.
- (c) The term of a Director filling a vacancy expires at the end of the unexpired term that such Director is filling.
- (d) Despite the expiration of a Director's term, a Director continues to serve until the Director's successor is appointed and qualifies or until there is a decrease in the number of Directors.

6. Resignation of Directors.

- (a) A Director may resign at any time by giving written notice of resignation to the Corporation.
- (b) A resignation of a Director is effective when the notice is received by the Corporation unless the notice specifies a later effective date.
- (c) Removal of Directors. A Director may be removed by the entity that appointed the Director. The Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, Colorado may remove a Director for inefficiency or neglect of duty or misconduct in office, but only after the Director has been given a copy of the charges made against the Director and the Director has had an opportunity to be heard in person and represented by counsel.

- 7. <u>Vacancy on Board</u>. If a vacancy occurs on the Board of Directors, the vacancy shall be filled by the entity that appointed the Director who previously occupied the vacant position.
- 8. <u>Compensation of Directors</u>. Directors shall not receive compensation for service on the Board of Directors. However, any Director may be reimbursed for the actual expenses incurred by the Director in the performance of his or her duties.

ARTICLE VIII. MEETINGS AND ACTION OF THE BOARD

1. Meetings.

- (a) The Board of Directors may hold regular or special meetings.
- (b) The Board of Directors may permit any Director to participate in a regular or special meeting by telephone. The Board of Directors may conduct the meeting by any means of communication by which all Directors participating may hear each other during the meeting. A Director participating in a meeting by this means is deemed to be present in person at the meeting.

2. Action Without Meeting.

- (a) Any action required or permitted to be taken at a Board of Directors' meeting may be taken without a meeting if each member of the Board in writing either:
 - 1) Votes for such action; or
- 2) Votes against such action or abstains from voting and waives the right to demand that action not be taken without a meeting.
- (b) Action is taken under this section only if the affirmative vote for such action equals or exceeds the minimum number of votes that would be necessary to take such action at a meeting at which all of the Directors then in office were present and voted.
- (c) No action taken pursuant to this section shall be effective unless writings describing the action taken and otherwise satisfying the requirements of subsection (a) hereinabove, signed by all Directors and not revoked pursuant to subsection (d) of this section, are received by the Corporation. Any such writing may be received by the Corporation by electronically transmitted facsimile or other form of wire or wireless communication providing the Corporation with a complete copy of the document, including a copy of the signature on the document. A Director's right to demand that action not be taken without a meeting shall be deemed to have been waived if the Corporation receives a writing satisfying the requirements of subsection (a) hereinabove that has been signed by the Director and not revoked pursuant to subsection (d) hereinafter. Action taken pursuant to this section shall be effective when the last writing necessary to effect the action is received by the Corporation unless the writings describing the action taken set forth a different effective date.
- (d) Any Director who has signed a writing pursuant to this section may revoke such writing by a writing signed and dated by the Director describing the action and stating that

the Director's prior vote with respect thereto is revoked, if such writing is received by the Corporation before the last writing necessary to effect the action is received by the Corporation.

- (e) Action taken pursuant to this section has the same effect as action taken at a meeting of Directors and may be described as such in any document.
- (f) All signed, written instruments necessary for any action taken pursuant to this section shall be filed with the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors.

3. Notice of Meeting.

- (a) Regular meetings of the Board of Directors may be held without notice of the date, time, place, or purpose of the meeting.
- (b) Special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be preceded by at least two (2) days' notice of the date, time, and place of the meeting. The notice need not describe the purpose of the special meeting.

4. Waiver of Notice.

- (a) A Director may waive any notice of a meeting before or after the time and date of the meeting stated in the notice. Except as provided by subsection (b) hereinafter, the waiver shall be in writing and signed by the Director entitled to the notice. Such waiver shall be delivered to the Corporation for filing with the Corporation records, but such delivery and filing shall not be conditions of the effectiveness of the waiver.
- (b) A Director's attendance at or participation in a meeting waives any required notice to that Director of the meeting unless, at the beginning of the meeting or promptly upon the Director's later arrival, the Director objects to holding the meeting or transacting business at the meeting because of lack of notice or defective notice and does not thereafter vote for or assent to action taken at the meeting.

5. Quorum and Voting.

- (a) A quorum of the Board of Directors consists of a majority of Directors in office immediately before the meeting begins.
- (b) If a quorum is present when a vote is taken, the affirmative vote of a majority of the Directors present at the meeting is the act of the Board of Directors unless the vote of a greater number of Directors is required by these Bylaws.
- (c) For purposes of determining a quorum with respect to a particular proposal, and for purposes of casting a vote for or against a particular proposal, a Director may be deemed to be present at a meeting and to vote if the Director has granted a signed, written proxy to another Director who is present at the meeting, authorizing the other Director to cast the vote that is directed to be cast by the written proxy with respect to the particular proposal that is described with reasonable specificity in the proxy. Except as provided in this subsection (c), Directors may not vote or otherwise act by proxy.

- (d) A Director who is present at a meeting of the Board of Directors when Board of Directors action is taken is deemed to have assented to all action taken at the meeting unless:
- 1) The Director objects at the beginning of the meeting, or promptly upon the Director's arrival, to holding the meeting or transacting business at the meeting and does not thereafter vote for or assent to any action taken at the meeting;
- 2) The Director contemporaneously requests that the Director's dissent or abstention as to any specific action taken be entered in the minutes of the meeting; or
- 3) The Director causes written notice of the Director's dissent or abstention as to any specific action to be received by the presiding officer of the meeting before adjournment of the meeting or by the Corporation promptly after adjournment of the meeting.
- (e) The right of dissent or abstention pursuant to subsection (d) hereinabove as to a specific action is not available to a Director who votes in favor of the action taken.

6. Committees of the Board.

- (a) The Board of Directors may create one or more committees of the Board and appoint one or more Directors to serve on them.
- (b) The creation of a committee of the Board and appointment of Directors to it shall be approved by a majority of all the Directors in office when the action is taken.
- (c) Action without meeting, notice, waiver of notice, and quorum and voting requirements of the Board of Directors apply to committees of the Board and their members as well.
- (d) To the extent specified by the Board of Directors, each committee of the Board shall have the authority of the Board of Directors, except that a committee of the Board shall not authorize distributions; elect, appoint, or remove any Director; amend articles of incorporation; adopt, amend, or repeal bylaws; approve a plan of merger; or approve a sale, lease, exchange, or other disposition of all, or substantially all, of its property, with or without good will, other than in the usual and regular course of business.
- (e) The creation of, delegation of authority to, or action by a committee does not alone constitute compliance by a Director with the standards of conduct described in these Bylaws.
- (f) Nothing in these Bylaws shall prohibit or restrict the Corporation from establishing by action of the Board of Directors one or more committees, advisory Boards, auxiliaries, or other bodies of any kind, having such members and rules of procedure as the Board of Directors may provide, in order to provide such advice, service, and assistance to the Corporation, and to carry out such duties and responsibilities for the Corporation, as may be specified by the Board of Directors; except that if any such committee or other body has one or more members thereof who are entitled to vote on committee matters and who are not then also

Directors, such committee or other body may not exercise any power or authority of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IX. STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

1. General Standards of Conduct for Directors and Officers.

- (a) Each Director shall discharge the Director's duties as Director, including the Director's duties as a member of a committee of the Board, and each officer with discretionary authority shall discharge the officer's duties under that authority in good faith, with the care an ordinarily prudent person in a like position would exercise under similar circumstances, and in a manner the Director or officer reasonably believes to be in the best interests of the Corporation.
- (b) In discharging duties, a Director or officer is entitled to rely on information, opinions, reports, or statements, including financial statements and other financial data, if prepared or presented by:
- 1) One or more officers or employees of the Corporation whom the Director or officer reasonably believes to be reliable and competent in the matters presented;
- 2) Legal counsel, a public accountant, or another person as to matters the Director or officer reasonably believes are within such person's professional or expert competence; or
- 3) In the case of a Director, a committee of the Board of Directors of which the Director is not a member if the Director reasonably believes the committee merits confidence.
- (c) A Director or officer is not acting in good faith if the Director or officer has knowledge concerning the matter in question that makes reliance otherwise permitted by subsection (b) hereinabove unwarranted.
- (d) A Director or officer is not liable to the Corporation for any action taken or omitted to be taken as a Director or officer, as the case may be, if, in connection with such action or omission, the Director or officer performed the duties of the position in compliance with this section.
- (e) A Director, regardless of title, shall not be deemed to be a trustee with respect to the Corporation or with respect to any property held or administered by the Corporation, including, without limitation, property that may be subject to restrictions imposed by the donor or transferor of such property.

2. <u>Liability of Directors for Unlawful Distributions</u>.

(a) A Director who votes for or assents to a distribution knowingly made in violation of these Bylaws is personally liable to the Corporation for the amount of the distribution that exceeds what could have been distributed without violating these Bylaws if it is established that the Director did not perform the Director's duties in compliance with the foregoing section.

In any proceeding commenced under this section, a Director shall have all of the defenses ordinarily available to the Director.

- (b) A Director held liable under subsection (a) hereinabove for an unlawful distribution is entitled to contribution:
- 1) From every other Director who could be held liable under subsection (a) hereinabove for the unlawful distribution; and
- 2) From each person who accepted the distribution knowing the distribution was made in violation of these Bylaws, the amount of the contribution from such person being the amount of the distribution to that person that exceeds what could have been distributed to that person without violating these Bylaws.

ARTICLE X. <u>DIRECTORS' CONFLICTING INTEREST TRANSACTIONS</u>

- 1. As used in this section, "conflicting interest transaction" means a contract or other financial relationship between the Corporation and a Director of the Corporation, or between the Corporation and a party related to a Director, or between the Corporation and an entity in which a Director of the Corporation is a Director or officer or has a financial interest.
- 2. No loans shall be made by the Corporation to its Directors or officers. Any Director or officer who assents to or participates in the making of any such loan shall be liable to the Corporation for the amount of such loan until the repayment thereof.
- 3. No conflicting interest transaction shall be void or voidable or be enjoined, set aside, or give rise to an award of damages or other sanctions in a proceeding by the Corporation solely because the conflicting interest transaction involves a Director of the Corporation or a party related to a Director or an entity in which a Director of the Corporation is a Director or officer or has a financial interest, or solely because the Director is present at or participates in the meeting of the Corporation's Board of Directors or of the committee of the Board of Directors that authorizes, approves, or ratifies the conflicting interest transaction, or solely because the Director's vote is counted for such purpose if:
- (a) The material fact as to the Director's relationship or interest and as to the conflicting interest transaction are disclosed or are known to the Board of Directors or the committee, and the Board of Directors or the committee, in good faith, authorizes, approves, or ratifies the conflicting interest transaction by the affirmative vote of a majority of the disinterested Directors, even though the disinterested Directors are less than a quorum; or
- (b) The material facts as to the Director's relationship or interest and as to the conflicting interest transaction are disclosed or are known to the members of the Board entitled to vote thereon, and the conflicting interest transaction is specifically authorized, approved, or ratified in good faith by a vote of the members of the Board entitled to vote thereon; or
 - (c) The conflicting interest transaction is fair as to the Corporation.

- 4. Common or interested Directors may be counted in determining the presence of a quorum at a meeting of the Board of Directors or of a committee which authorizes, approves, or ratifies the conflicting interest transaction.
- 5. For purposes of this section, a "party related to a Director" shall mean a spouse, a descendent, an ancestor, a sibling, the spouse or descendent of a sibling, an estate or trust in which the Director or a party related to a Director has a beneficial interest, or an entity in which a party related to a Director is a Director, officer, or has a financial interest.

ARTICLE XI. LIMITS OF CERTAIN LIABILITIES OF DIRECTORS

- 1. There shall be no personal liability, either direct or indirect, of any Director or officer to the Corporation for monetary damages for any breach or breaches of fiduciary duty as Director or officer, except that this provision shall not eliminate the liability of a Director or officer to the Corporation for monetary damages for any breach, act, omission, or transaction to which the Nonprofit Corporation Act expressly prohibits the elimination of liability.
- 2. This provision shall not limit the rights of Directors or officers of the Corporation for indemnification or other assistance from the Corporation. This provision shall not modify, restrict, or otherwise diminish the provisions of C.R.S. § 13-21-116(2)(b) (concerning elimination of liability of Directors, except for willful and wanton acts or omissions); any amendment or successor provision thereto; or any law limiting or eliminating liabilities.
- 3. Any repeal or modification of the foregoing provisions of this article the Corporation or any repeal or modification of the provisions of the Nonprofit Corporation Act which permits the elimination of liability of Directors by this article shall not affect adversely any elimination of liability, right, or protection of a Director or officer of the Corporation with respect to any breach, act, omission, or transaction of such Director or officer occurring prior to the time of such repeal or modification.

ARTICLE XII. INDEMNIFICATION

- 1. Indemnification Definitions. As used in this article:
- (a) "Director" means an individual who is or was a Director of the Corporation or an individual who, while a Director of the Corporation, is or was serving at the Corporation's request as a Director, officer, partner, Board of Directors, trustee, employee, fiduciary, or agent of another domestic or foreign corporation, nonprofit corporation, or other person or of an employee benefit plan. A Director is considered to be serving an employee benefit plan at the Corporation's request if the Director's duties to the Corporation also impose duties on, or otherwise involve services by, the Director to the plan or to the participants in or beneficiaries of the plan. "Director" includes, unless the context requires otherwise, the estate or personal representative of a Director.
 - (b) "Expenses" includes attorney fees.
- (c) "Liability" means the obligation incurred with respect to a proceeding to pay a judgment, settlement, penalty, fine (including an excise tax assessed with respect to an employee benefit plan), or reasonable expenses.

- (d) "Party" includes a person who was, is, or is threatened to be made a named defendant or respondent in a proceeding.
 - (e) "Proceeding" means any threatened, pending, or completed action, suit, or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative, or investigative, and whether formal or informal.

2. <u>Authority to Indemnify Directors</u>.

- (a) Except as provided in subsection (d) hereinafter, the Corporation shall indemnify a person made a party to a proceeding because the person is or was a Director against liability incurred in the proceeding if:
 - 1) The person's conduct was in good faith; and
 - 2) The person reasonably believed:
- (i) In the case of conduct in an official capacity with the Corporation, that the conduct was in the Corporation's best interests;
- (ii) In all other cases, that the conduct was at least not opposed to the Corporation's best interests; and
- (iii) In the case of any criminal proceeding, the person had no reasonable cause to believe the conduct was unlawful.
- (b) A Director's conduct with respect to an employee benefit plan for a purpose the Director reasonably believed to be in the interests of the participants in or beneficiaries of the plan is conduct that satisfies the requirement of subsection (2)(ii) hereinabove. A Director's conduct with respect to an employee benefit plan for a purpose that the Director did not reasonably believe to be in the interests of the participants in or beneficiaries of the plan shall be deemed not to satisfy the requirements of subsection (a)(1) hereinabove.
- (c) The termination of a proceeding by judgment, order, settlement, or conviction or upon a plea of *nolo contendre* or its equivalent is not, of itself, determinative that the Director did not meet the standard of conduct described in this section.
 - (d) The Corporation may not indemnify a Director under this section:
- 1) In connection with a proceeding by or in the right of the Corporation in which the Director was adjudged liable to the Corporation; or
- 2) In connection with any other proceeding charging that the Director derived an improper personal benefit, whether or not involving action in an official capacity, in which proceeding the Director was adjudged personally liable on the basis that the Director derived an improper personal benefit.

- (e) Indemnification permitted under this section in connection with a proceeding by or in the right of the Corporation is limited to reasonable expenses incurred in connection with the proceeding.
- 3. <u>Mandatory Indemnification of Directors</u>. The Corporation shall indemnify a person who was wholly successful, on the merits or otherwise, in the defense of any proceeding to which the person was a party because the person is or was a Director, against reasonable expenses incurred by the person in connection with the proceeding.

4. Advance of Expenses to Directors.

- (a) The Corporation shall pay for or reimburse the reasonable expenses incurred by a Director who is a party to a proceeding in advance of final disposition of the proceeding if:
- 1) The Director furnishes to the Corporation a written affirmation of the Director's good faith belief that the Director has met the standard of conduct described in these Bylaws;
- 2) The Director furnishes to the Corporation a written undertaking, executed personally or on the Director's behalf, to repay the advance if it is ultimately determined that the Director did not meet the standard of conduct; and
- 3) A determination is made that the facts then known to those making the determination would not preclude indemnification under this article.
- (b) The undertaking required by subsection (a)(2) hereinabove shall be a general obligation of the Director but need not be secured and may be accepted without reference to financial ability to make repayment.

5. Determination and Authorization of Indemnification of Directors.

- (a) The Corporation may not indemnify a Director under this article unless authorized in the specific case after a determination has been made that indemnification of the Director is permissible in the circumstances because the Director has met the standard of conduct set forth in these Bylaws. The Corporation shall not advance expenses to a Director under this article unless authorized in the specific case after the written affirmation and undertaking required by these Bylaws are received and the determination required by these Bylaws has been made.
 - (b) The determination required by subsection (a) hereinabove shall be made:
- 1) By the Board of Directors by a majority vote of those present at a meeting at which a quorum is present, and only those Directors not parties to the proceeding shall be counted in satisfying the quorum; or
- 2) If a quorum cannot be obtained, a majority vote of a committee of the Board of Directors designated by the Board of Directors, which committee shall consist of two

- (2) or more Directors not parties to the proceeding; except that Directors who are parties to the proceeding may participate in the designation of Directors for the committee.
- (c) If a quorum cannot be obtained as contemplated in subsection (b)(1) hereinabove, and a committee cannot be established under subsection (b)(2) hereinabove, or even if a quorum is obtained or a committee is designated, if a majority of the Directors constituting such quorum or such committee so directs, the determination required to be made by subsection (a) hereinabove shall be made by independent legal counsel selected by a vote of the Board of Directors or the committee in the manner specified in subsection (b)(1) or (b)(2) hereinabove, or if a quorum of the full Board cannot be obtained and a committee cannot be established, by independent legal counsel selected by a majority vote of the full Board of Directors.
- (d) Authorization of indemnification and advance of expenses shall be made in the same manner as the determination that indemnification or advance of expenses is permissible; except that if the determination that indemnification or advance of expenses is permissible is made by independent legal counsel, authorization of indemnification and advance of legal expenses shall be made by the body that selected such counsel.

6. <u>Indemnification of Officers, Employees, Fiduciaries, and Agents.</u>

- (a) An officer is entitled to mandatory indemnification under this article, in each case to the same extent as a Director.
- (b) The Corporation shall indemnify and advance expenses to an officer, employee, fiduciary, or agent of the Corporation to the same extent as to a Director.
- (c) The Corporation shall also indemnify and advance expenses to an officer, employee, fiduciary, or agent who is not a Director to a greater extent, if not inconsistent with public policy or these Bylaws, general or specific action of the Board of Directors or voting members, or contract.
- 7. <u>Insurance</u>. The Corporation shall purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of a person who is or was a Director, officer, employee, fiduciary, or agent of the Corporation or who, while a Director, officer, employee, fiduciary, or agent of the Corporation, is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a Director, officer, partner, member of the Board of Directors, trustee, employee, fiduciary, or agent of another domestic or foreign corporation, nonprofit corporation, or other person, or of an employee benefit plan, against liability asserted against or incurred by the person in that capacity or arising from the person's status as a Director, officer, employee, fiduciary, or agent, whether or not the Corporation would have power to indemnify the person against the same liability under this article. Any such insurance may be procured from any insurance company designated by the Board of Directors, whether such insurance company is formed under the laws of this state or any other jurisdiction of the United States or elsewhere, including any insurance company in which the Corporation has an equity or any other interest through stock ownership or otherwise.
- 8. <u>Limitation of Indemnification of Directors</u>. This article does not limit the Corporation's power to pay or reimburse expenses incurred by a Director in connection with an

appearance as a witness in a proceeding at a time when the Director has not been made a named defendant or respondent in the proceeding.

ARTICLE XIII. OFFICERS

- 1. Officers. The Corporation shall have a president, a secretary, a treasurer, and such other officers as may be designated by the Board of Directors. An officer shall be a natural person who is eighteen (18) years of age or older. An officer need not be a Director of the Corporation. Officers may be appointed by the Board of Directors. A duly appointed officer may appoint one or more officers or assistant officers if authorized by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall delegate to the secretary or to one or more other persons responsibility for the preparation and maintenance of minutes of the Directors' meetings and other records and information required to be kept by the Corporation and for authenticating records of the Corporation. The same individual may simultaneously hold more than one office in the Corporation.
- 2. <u>President</u>. The president shall be the chief executive officer of the Corporation. The president shall preside at all meetings the Board. The president shall have the general powers and duties that are usually vested in the office of president of a corporation, including, but not limited to, the power to appoint committees from time to time as the president may determine to be appropriate to assist in the conduct of the affairs of the Corporation or as may be established by the Board at any regular or special meetings.
- 3. <u>Vice President</u>. The vice president shall have all the powers and authority and perform all functions and duties of the president in the absence of the president or his or her inability for any reason to exercise such powers and functions or to perform such duties.
- 4. <u>Secretary</u>. The secretary shall keep all minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors and the minutes of all meetings of the Corporation. The secretary shall have charge of all books and papers that the Board may direct and shall, in general, perform all the duties incident to the office of the secretary.
- 5. <u>Treasurer</u>. The treasurer shall have the responsibility for the Corporation funds and shall be responsible for keeping a full and accurate account of all receipts and disbursements in the books belonging to the Corporation; provided, however, that when a Board of Directors has been delegated the responsibility of collecting and disbursing funds, the treasurer's responsibility shall be to review the accounts of the Board of Directors not less often than quarterly. The treasurer shall perform such other duties as from time to time may be assigned by the Board of Directors.
- 6. Resignation and Removal of Officers. An officer may resign at any time by giving written notice of resignation to the Corporation. A resignation of an officer is effective when the notice is received by the Corporation unless the notice specifies a later effective date. If a resignation is made effective at a later date, the Board of Directors may permit the officer to remain in office until the effective date and may fill the pending vacancy before the effective date with the provision that the successor does not take office until the effective date, or the Board may remove the officer at any time before the effective date and may fill the resulting vacancy. The Board of Directors may remove any officer at any time without cause. The Board of Directors

may make provisions for the removal of officers by other officers. An officer who resigns or is removed or whose appointment has expired may deliver to the Colorado Secretary of State for filing a statement to that effect.

7. <u>Contract Rights with Respect to Officers</u>. The appointment of an officer does not itself create contract rights. An officer's removal does not affect the officer's contract rights, if any, with the Corporation. An officer's resignation does not affect the Corporation's contract rights, if any, with the officer.

ARTICLE XIV. CORPORATION RECORDS

- 1. The Corporation shall keep as permanent records minutes of all meetings of its Board of Directors, a record of all actions taken by the Board of Directors without a meeting, a record of all actions taken by a committee of the Board of Directors in place of the Board of Directors on behalf of the Corporation, and a record of all waivers of notices of meetings of the Board of Directors or any committee of the Board of Directors.
 - 2. The Corporation shall maintain appropriate accounting records.
- 3. The Corporation shall maintain its records in written form or in another form capable of conversion into written form within a reasonable time.
- 4. The Corporation shall keep a copy of each of the following records at its principal office:
 - (a) Its Articles of Incorporation;
 - (b) Its Bylaws;
- (c) A list of the names and business or home addresses of its current Directors and officers;
- (d) A copy of its most recent corporate report delivered to the Colorado Secretary of State; and
- (e) All financial statements prepared for periods ending during the last three (3) years.

ARTICLE XV. AMENDMENT

These Bylaws may be amended by vote of a majority of the Directors voting in person or by proxy at a meeting at which a quorum of the Directors is present, if notice of the meeting indicated that amendment of the Bylaws would be considered at the meeting and the general substance of the amendment. Any amendment to these Bylaws shall be approved by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, Colorado.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

At the August 22, 2023 Board of Trustees meeting, the Board was presented with petitions requesting annexation of properties identified as Sage Farms Annexation and the Village at Sage Farms Annexation, together, 300.52 acres of land located between CO Highway 1 and BNSF Railroad, and G.W. Bush Ave. and CR 58 (vicinity map attached). The Board conducted a required public hearing to consider the annexations, the proposed zoning map for the property, and establishment of vested development rights requested by the Developer. Following testimony presented, the Board closed the public hearing and adopted Resolution No. 30-2023 finding that the requirements of the State Constitution and State Statutes have been met for annexation and finding that the properties are eligible for annexation.

The agenda item was subsequently continued to the regular meeting of September 26, 2023, and again to the regular meeting of December 12, 2023 to allow additional time for coordinating details for ownership, operation and maintenance of the wells to meet the irrigation needs of the development.

In the time since the last Board meeting, the Town has received a Letter of Intent from UC Health - Kevin Unger, President and CEO for Poudre Valley Hospital and Medical Center of the Rockies. The letter is attached and expresses intent to continue discussions of expanding medical services to Wellington and considering property locations for a medical facility in the planned County Road 58 commercial corridor.

Also since the last meeting, the Developer has included additional details to the conceptual master plan. The overall concept plan has not changed from what was presented previously. Additional detail has been added to illustrate the following:

- Possible lot arrangement to illustrate the proposed mix of residential development to meet diverse community housing needs including large lots, small lots, detached homes, attached homes, alley-loaded units and multi-family housing;
- Park and open space areas integrated throughout the development;
- Integrated network of roads and trails;
- Approximate locations of stormwater detention ponds within the Open Space area to illustrate available usable space for future park, trail and recreation amenities; and
- A conceptual park layout to illustrate possible ball field and park amenity arrangement (not intended to be a full design or proposal).



Discussions regarding the irrigation wells are ongoing. Discussions have included some different alternatives for how the irrigation wells and water rights can be owned and maintained by an entity that can meet the long-term irrigation needs of the entire development, knowing that the development will be constructed in phases and those phases will continue to be refined in the future. Other considerations include having a redundant water supply option as a back-up if pumps are down for maintenance or otherwise unavailable, and consideration of different options for ensuring the entity has long-term funding mechanisms for ensuring continued operations. The Developer and Town staff have agreed that additional time to continue discussions is needed to further define the terms that are needed in the annexation agreement.

The Developer and staff recommend continuing the agenda item to the January 23, 2024 Board Meeting. Because the ordinance, the annexation maps, the zoning map, and the annexation agreements are integrally tied for the same development request, the recommendation is to continue consideration of all items to the January 23, 2024 meeting.

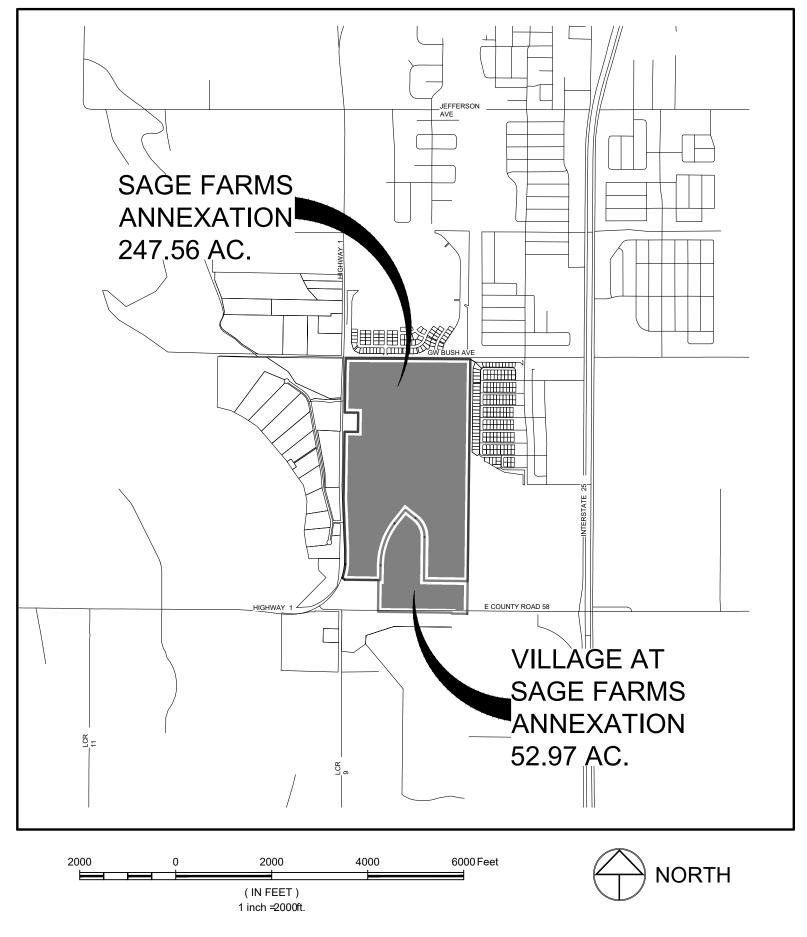
STAFF RECOMMENDATION

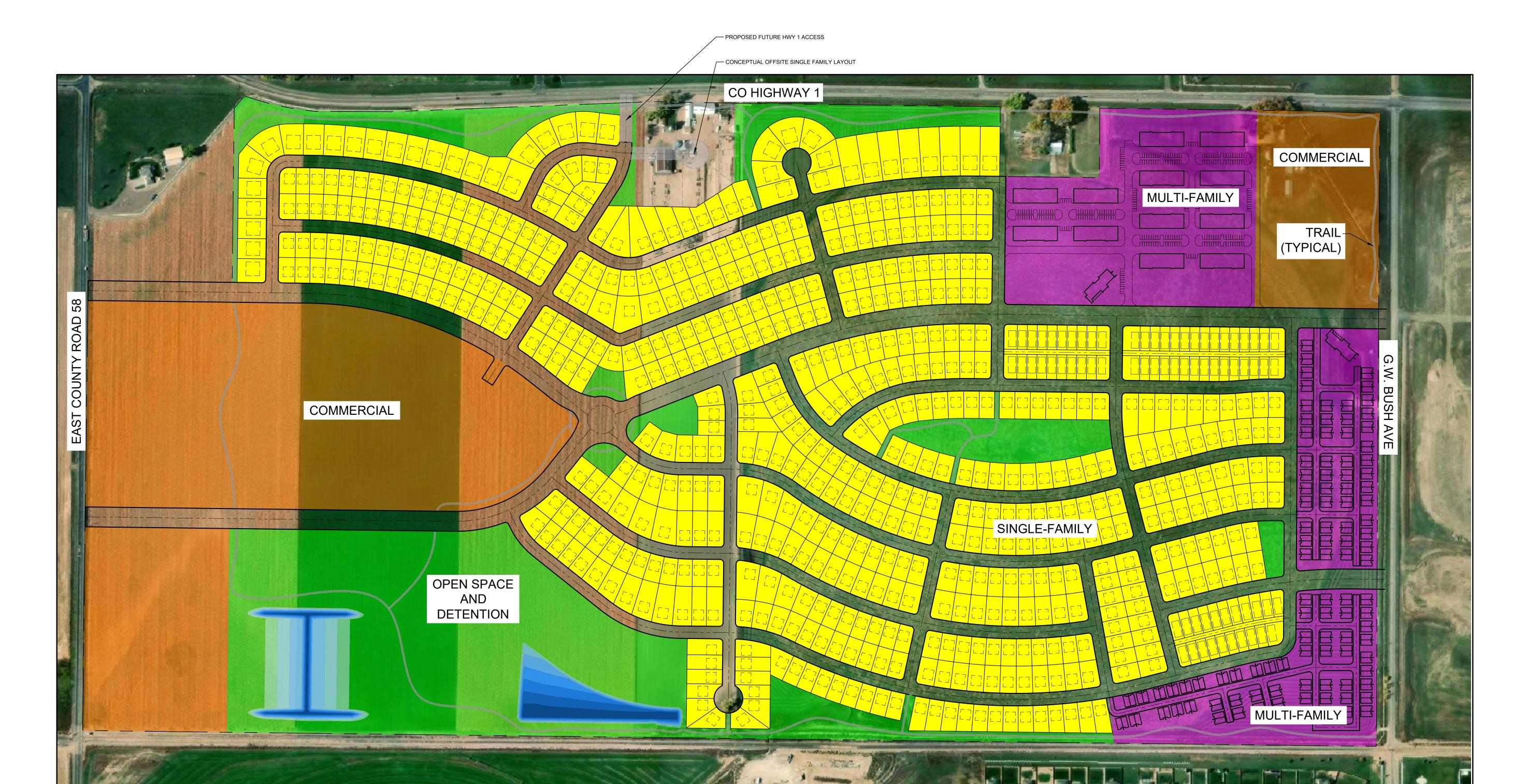

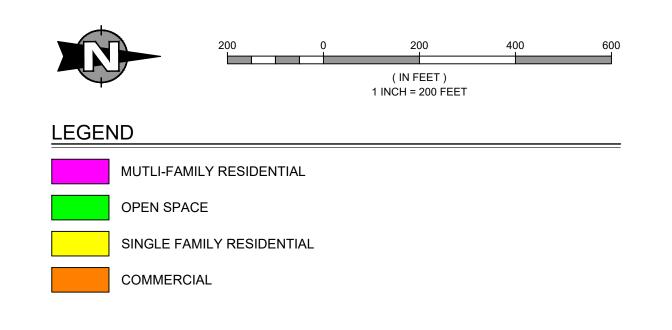

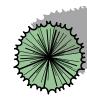

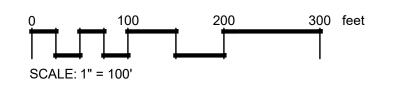

ORDINANCE NO. 13-2023

AN ORDINANCE CONDITIONALLY ANNEXING THE PROPERTIES KNOWN AS SAGE FARMS ANNEXATION AND THE VILLAGE AT SAGE FARMS ANNEXATION, COLLECTIVELY A SERIAL ANNEXATION, TO THE TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO AND ESTABLISHING ZONING OF THE PROPERTY AS PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT (PUD) IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE ZONING MAP FOR SAGE FARMS PUD.

WHEREAS, petitions for a serial annexation of two contiguous parcels have been filed by FC Farm Holding, LLC and Sipes Farm Holding, LLC, together 97% owners of the annexation land area, less 3% land area for public road right-of-way and railroad right-of-way, said lands being a portion of Section Nine (9) and a portion of the North Half of Section Sixteen (16), Township Eight North (T.8N.), Range Sixty-eight West (R.68W.), Sixth Principal Meridian (6th P.M.), County of Larimer, State of Colorado, and more particularly described on Exhibit "A" and Exhibit "B;"; and

WHEREAS, the Board adopted Resolution No. 20-2023 and Resolution No. 21-2023 and determined that requirements of C.R.S. §§ 31-12-104 and -105 had been met; and

WHEREAS, annexation maps with all required supporting materials have been submitted to the Town; and

WHEREAS, a community of interest exists between the Town and the property proposed to be annexed; and

WHEREAS, the area proposed to be annexed is or will soon be developed; and

WHEREAS, the petitioners for the annexation have demonstrated to the Town that the capacity of existing sewer and water utilities within the Town is or will be sufficient to serve development proposed in the conceptual plan for the property proposed to be annexed at rates which are the same as those rates applying within the existing Town, and that the annexation will result in no increase in rates for these services for other citizens of the Town as a result of the annexation; and

WHEREAS, the fiscal impacts upon the Town as a result of the annexation and development of the property will be sufficiently offset, including costs to the Town for police protection, parks and recreation, library services, streets, sidewalks, utilities and other public costs resulting from the annexation and development of the property; and

WHEREAS, the Town Planning Commission on August 7, 2023 voted unanimously to recommend to forward a recommendation of approval to the Board of Trustees to annex the property and zone the property Planned Unit Development (PUD) in accordance with the Zoning Map for Sage Farms; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on said petitions pursuant to C.R.S. §§ 31-12-108 and -109 on August 22, 2023 at 6:30pm; and

WHEREAS, no election is required pursuant to C.R.S. § 31-12-107(2); and

WHEREAS, notice of the hearing on the Annexation Petition was properly published at least 30 days prior to the date of the hearing pursuant to C.R.S. § 31-12-108(2), and a copy of the published notice, together with a copy of the notice of the hearing, was properly sent by registered mail to the clerk of the Board of County Commissioners and to the Larimer County Attorney and to Poudre School District R-1 and to special districts having territory within the area to be annexed at least 25 days prior to the date of such hearing, pursuant to C.R.S. § 31-12-108(2).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO, AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The properties described on Exhibit "A" and Exhibit "B," incorporated herein by reference, are hereby conditionally annexed and will be included within the Town of Wellington, Larimer County, Colorado so long as the Annexation Maps, the Annexation ordinance, the Zoning Map for Sage Farms PUD, and the Annexation Agreements all are recorded in the records of the Clerk and Recorder of Larimer County, Colorado no later than December 31, 2023. If the condition is not met as evidenced by the recordation, the property shall not be annexed and the annexation shall be void and of no impact on the property.
- 2. Pursuant to C.R.S. § 31-12-115, the annexed area is hereby zoned as Planned Unit Development (PUD) District in accordance with the Zoning Map for Sage Farms PUD, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
- 3. The official zoning map of the Town of Wellington, Colorado is hereby amended in accordance with Section 2 of this Ordinance.
- 4. Validity. The Board of Trustees hereby declares that should any section, paragraph, sentence, word or other portion of this ordinance or the rules and regulations adopted herein be declared invalid for any reason, such invalidity shall not affect any other portion of this ordinance or said rules and regulations, and the Board of Trustees hereby declares that it would have passed all other portions of this ordinance and adopted all other portions of said rules and regulations, independent of the elimination here from of any such portion which may be declared invalid.
- 5. Necessity. In the opinion of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, this ordinance is necessary for the preservation and protection of the health, safety, welfare and property of the inhabitants and owners of property in the Town of Wellington.

6. Certification. The Town Clerk shall certify to the passage of this ordinance and make not less than three (3) copies of the adopted ordinance available for inspection by the public during regular business hours and shall record at least one certified copy of the ordinance with the Clerk and Recorder of Larimer County.

PASSED AND ADOPTED by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, Colorado and ordered published this 22nd day of August, 2023 and ordered to become effective upon the later of 30 days from the date of publication, or the approval and recordation of the Annexation Agreements, together with the Zoning Map for Sage Farms PUD.

This Mixed-Use PUD is intended to create a compatible variety of land uses that provide for a homogeneous development of mixed uses that are in keeping with the property's unique physical aspects including two existing irrigation water wells which can be used for non-potable irrigation of the developed property. access from two existing public roads and unique topography allowing drainage flows along the southeast portion of the property. This zoning map is also in compliance with the Town's Comprehensive Plan. It creates a compatible variety of land uses that provide for a homogeneous neighborhood of mixed uses and affordable housing that are in keeping with the property's unique, site specific topography for stormwater systems and two independent nonpotable irrigation systems that will be utilized consistent with historical water well usage. The northern portion of the property is currently adjoining public infrastructure sufficient to facilitate anticipated, existing market demand for residential dwelling units and commercial uses. Accessory Dwelling Unit. An additional dwelling unit integrated within a single-family dwelling, or located in a detached accessory building, such as carriage houses or agricultural-type out buildings, located on the same lot as single-family dwellings. An Accessory Dwelling Unit is not counted as a dwelling unit in calculating the allowed density per acre in a zone district.

Accessory Use. A subordinate use, clearly incidental and related to the main structure, building or use of land and located on the same lot (or on a contiguous lot in the same ownership) as that of the main structure, building or use.

Alley. A paved constructed vehicular access way serving one (1) or more properties and abutting a public or private road. An Alley may be a public or private access way. An Alley may satisfy, but does not need to satisfy, emergency access requirements.

Agriculture. The use of land for accessory uses for treating or storing farm products and equipment.

Bed and Breakfast. An establishment operated in a private residence or portion thereof, which provides temporary accommodations to overnight guests for a fee, and which is occupied by the operator of such establishment.

Boarding and Rooming House. A building or portion of which is used to accommodate, for compensation, four (4) or more boarders or roomers, not including members of the occupant's immediate family who might be occupying such building.

Building means any permanent structure built for the shelter or enclosure of persons, animals, chattels or property of any kind, which is governed by the following characteristics

a) Is permanently affixed to the land b) Has one (1) or more floors and a roof.

Child Care Center. A facility, by whatever name known, which is maintained for the whole or part of a day for the care of seven (7) or more children under the age of sixteen (16) years who are not related to the owner, operator or manager, whether such facility is operated with or without compensation for such care and with or without stated educational purposes, except that a childcare center shall not include any family child care home as defined by the State. The term includes, but is not limited to, facilities commonly known as day care centers, day nurseries, nursery schools, preschools, play groups, day camps, summer camps, centers for developmentally disabled children and those facilities which give twenty-four-hour-per-day care for dependent and neglected children. Child care centers are also those facilities for children under the age of six (6) years with stated educational purposes which are operated in conjunction with a public, private, or parochial college or a private or parochial school, except that the term shall not apply to a kindergarten maintained in connection with a public, private, or parochial elementary school system of at least six (6) grades.

Civic Space. Public or quasi-public uses in residential or business areas that are accessible to the public and primarily serve as gathering or meeting areas for the immediate community, or reserved as open space that provides a community amenity or promotes environmenta or ecological functions. Civic spaces may be public buildings; defined space in residential, commercial, or mixed-use buildings; or outdoor space constructed to accommodate community gatherings. They can be the settings where celebrations are held, where social and economic exchanges take place, where friends run into each other, and where cultures mix. Civic spaces include active or passive recreational uses, nature and recreation trails, nature preserves (such as wildlife sanctuaries, conservation areas, and game preserves), cultural amenities (e.g. fountains, ice rinks, reflecting pools), open spaces, parks, squares, plazas, playgrounds, or memorial parks. This

- a) Active recreation: Recreational uses requiring constructed facilities for organized activities, such as playing fields, ball courts,
- b) Dog park: A park that provides a variety of recreational amenities for dogs and persons that may include benches, parking, restrooms, and water fountains. If dogs are to be unleashed, the area must be fenced.
- c) Community space: Buildings or facilities that provide gathering places, such as community centers, property owner association meeting spaces, or clubhouses
- d) Open space: Areas of trees, shrubs, lawns, grass, pathways and other natural and man-made amenities not within individual building lots, set aside for the use and enjoyment of residents, visitors and other persons, unoccupied by buildings or facilities unless related to recreational activities. Generally, open space is intended to provide light and air and is designed for either scenic or recreational purposes. For the purpose of this Code, open space includes active recreation space, common open space, and
- e) Park or plaza: An open space which may be improved and landscaped; usually surrounded by streets and buildings.
- f) Urban deck: A platform for landscaped greens or engineered to accommodate buildings, which spans over major roadways. The intent of an urban deck is to create and enable pedestrian movement across an otherwise, typically impenetrable barrier, and to provide space for activity that can link both sides of the roadway.
- g) Wetlands mitigation bank: A natural resource management technique authorized by Part 404 of the Federal Clean Water Act, or other state or federal law, as applicable, using wetland preservation, restoration, creation and/or enhancement to offset or replace wetland functions that are lost due to development. Wetland mitigation banks are typically large areas of wetlands operated by private or public entities, which may sell credits to other entities to compensate for wetland loss or impact at development sites or enter into other similar arrangements.

Code means the Municipal Code of the Town, including this Land Use Code.

Community Facility. A place, structure, area, or other facility used to provide fraternal, cultural, social, educational, or recreational programs or activities. This includes swimming pools, tennis courts, and similar facilities of a homeowners association, open to the public or a designated part of the public, and which may be publicly or privately owned.

Dwelling means a building used exclusively for residential occupancy, including single-family dwellings, two-family dwellings and

Dwelling unit means one (1) or more rooms and a single kitchen and at least one (1) bathroom, designed, occupied or intended for

occupancy as separate quarters for the exclusive use of a single family for living, cooking and sanitary purposes, located in a single-family, two-family or multi-family dwelling or mixed-use building.

Dwelling, two-family or duplex means a building occupied by two (2) families living independently of each other.

Golf Course. A tract of land laid out with a course having nine (9) or more holes for playing golf, including any accessory clubhouse, driving range, offices, restaurant, concession stand, picnic tables, pro shop, maintenance facilities, or similar accessory uses or structures. Grocery Store. A retail establishment primarily selling food, as well as other convenience and household goods, without a limitation on

Group Home state-licensed facilities for developmentally disabled, handicapped, seniors or children as defined by and meeting the

Home Occupation. An occupation or business activity which results in a product or service and is conducted in whole or in part in a dwelling unit and is subordinate to the residential use of the dwelling unit. Home Occupation shall not include home offices for telecommuting and similar uses with no customer, client, or coworker visits.

Industrial and Manufacturing, Heavy. Manufacturing of paper, chemicals, plastics, rubber, cosmetics, drugs, nonmetallic mineral products (such as concrete and concrete products, glass), primary metals, acetylene, cement, lime, gypsum or plaster-of-Paris, chlorine, corrosive acid or fertilizer, insecticides, disinfectants, poisons, explosives, paint, lacquer, varnish, petroleum products, coal products, plastic and synthetic resins, electrical equipment, appliances, batteries, and machinery. This group also includes asphalt mixing plants, concrete mixing plants, smelting, animal slaughtering, oil refining, and magazine contained explosives facilities.

Industrial and Manufacturing, Light. Manufacturing of products, from extracted, raw, recycled or secondary materials, including bulk storage and handling of those products and materials, or crushing, treating, washing, and/or processing of materials. This includes similar establishments, and businesses of a similar and no more objectionable character. It also includes incidental finishing and storage. Goods or products manufactured or processed on-site may be sold at retailor wholesale on or off the premises. This does not include any activity listed under Industrial and Manufacturing, Heavy. Examples of general manufacturing include the manufacture or production of the following goods or products: apparel (including clothing, shoes, dressmaking); boats and transportation equipment; brooms; caskets; communication or computation equipment; dairy products; die-cut paperboard and cardboard; drugs, medicines, pharmaceutical; electrical equipment or machinery; farm machinery; fasteners and buttons; feed and grain; food/baking(including coffee roasting, creameries, ice cream, ice, frozen food, confectionery, and beverage); fruit and vegetable processing, canning and storage; gaskets; glass products made of purchased glass; household appliances; industrial controls; leather and allied products; lithographic and printing processes (including printing plants as defined below); mattresses; medical equipment and supplies; medicines; mill work and similar woodwork; mobile homes; musical instruments; novelties; office supplies; optical goods; photographic equipment; prefabricated and modular housing and components; printing and print supplies (including printing plants); 3-D printing, radio and TV receiving sets; sanitary paper products; scientific and precision instruments; service industry machines; signs; textiles (including dyeing, laundry bags, canvas products, dry goods, hosiery, millinery); tobacco products; toys, sporting and athletic goods; and watches and clocks. A "printing plant" means a facility devoted to printing or bookbinding, including related large-scale storage and transshipment.

Land Use Code means Chapter 15 of the Town of Wellington Municipal Code.

Livestock includes horses, cattle, sheep and llamas, but does not include swine, chickens, goats, roosters, fowl, peacocks, guinea hens or other animals not allowed to be maintained within the Town by this Code (except that swine, chickens, goats, roosters, fowl, peacocks or guinea hens maybe permitted with the Board of Trustees' approval in isolated circumstances, including for 4-H-type projects that do not

Long-term care facility means any of the following:

- a) Convalescent center means a health institution that is planned, organized, operated and maintained to offer facilities and services to in-patients requiring restorative care and treatment and that is either an integral patient care unit of a general hospital or a facility physically separated from, but maintaining an affiliation with, all services in a general hospital.
- b) Nursing care facility means a health institution planned, organized, operated and maintained to provide facilities and health services with related social care to in-patients who require regular medical care and twenty-four-hour-per-day nursing services for illness, injury or disability. Each patient shall be under the care of a physician licensed to practice medicine in the State. The nursing services shall be organized and maintained to provide twenty-four-hour-per-day nursing services under the direction of a registered professional nurse employed full time.

Lot means a designated parcel, tract or area of land established by plat or subdivision.

Manufactured Home. A single-family dwelling which is partially or entirely manufactured in a factory; which is not less than twenty-four (24) feet in width and thirty-six (36) feet in length; which is installed on an engineered permanent foundation; which has brick, wood or cosmetically equivalent siding extending to the ground level; which has a pitched roof; which has the delivery system including wheels, tires, axles and tongue hitch removed; and which is certified pursuant to the National Manufactured Housing

Construction and Safety Standards Act of 1974, 42 U.S.C. 5401 et seq., as amended.

Medical Care Facility. An establishment, whether or not licensed or required to be licensed by the State Board of Health or the State Hospital Board, by or in which facilities are maintained, furnished, conducted, operated, or offered to prevent, diagnose, or treat human disease, pain, injury, deformity, or physical condition, whether medical or surgical, of two (2) or more non-related mentally or physically sick or injured persons; or for the care of two (2) or more non-related persons requiring or receiving medical, surgical, or nursing attention or service as acute, chronic, convalescent, aged, or physically disabled. This use includes an intermediate care facility, mental retardation facility, outpatient surgery center, birthing facility, diagnostic imaging facility, radiation therapy facility, dialysis facility, medical/physical rehabilitation and trauma unit, or related institution or facility that offers treatment on an outpatient basis. This use may be operated for profit or nonprofit, privately owned, or operated by a local government unit. This use includes any hospital, defined as any licensed and State of Colorado accredited health care institution with an organized medical and professional staff and with inpatient beds available around-the-clock, whose primary function is to provide inpatient medical, nursing, and other health-related services to patients for both surgical and nonsurgical conditions and that usually provides some outpatient services (such as emergency care).

Medical Office. A facility operated by one (1) or more duly licensed members of the human healthcare professions, including but not limited to physicians, dentists, chiropractors, psychiatrists and osteopaths, where patients are not lodged overnight but are admitted for examination and/or treatment.

Mixed-Use Dwelling. Multi-Family Dwelling units contained within a mixed-use building attached above the building's nonresidential

one (1) or more party walls and at either the floor or the ceiling. The number of dwelling units provided in a Multi-Family Dwelling is limited only by the density allowed in the applicable zone district. This includes apartments and manor style apartments. ANNEXATION AGREEMENT

SAGE FARMS ANNEXATION

THIS ANNEXATION AGREEMENT ("<u>Agreement</u>") is made and entered into this day of ______, 2023, between the TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO, a Colorado municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as the "<u>Town</u>", and Sipes Farm Holding, LLC, a Colorado limited liability company, and FC Farm Holding, LLC, a Colorado limited liability company, hereinafter referred to collectively as the "<u>Owner</u>" or "<u>Owners</u>."

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Owners are the owners of the Property more fully described in this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Owners have filed a petition to annex the Property to the Town; and

WHEREAS, the Town has passed a resolution pursuant to C.R.S. § 31-12-108(1) finding that the proposed annexation complies with C.R.S. § 31-12-104 and 31-12-105; and

WHEREAS, an annexation impact report has been prepared pursuant to §31-12-108.5, C.R.S., and copies have been distributed in accordance with the statutory requirements; and

WHEREAS, Colorado's Courts have recognized that the Municipal Annexation Act of 1965 contemplates annexation agreements as a routine step in the annexation process; and

WHEREAS, the parties recognize that this annexation agreement is the first parcel of real property annexed to the Town as a serial annexation of property all of which is within the boundaries of the Wellington Comprehensive Plan 2021; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to enter into an annexation agreement to set forth various obligations of the parties including obligations for development and use of the Property in the future; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms, conditions and covenants contained herein and other good and valuable consideration, the adequacy and receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

- 1. **Purpose**. The purpose of this Agreement is to further the planning and economic policies of the Town for the annexation of approximately 247.56 acres zoned for residential, commercial, and parks/open space purposes. This Agreement establishes the Zoning and Vested Property Rights upon annexation of the Property defined herein. The development, the construction, and uses of the Residential Neighborhoods, the Commercial Property, and the Parks/Open Space within the Property are expected to generate new employment opportunities in the Town and other public benefits for the Town. The Town approves the Zoning and finds that the terms of this site-specific development plan set forth in this Agreement are reasonably necessary to protect the public health, safety, and welfare. The "Property" means the Property defined on Exhibit A which Owners have filed a petition for annexation with the Town for the Sage Farm Annexation.
- 2. **Definitions**. When used in the Agreement, the following terms and references shall have the meanings indicated:
 - 2.1. "Commercial Property" means that portion of the Property consisting of approximately 9.5 acres adjoining G.W. Bush Avenue which is zoned Commercial C-3 Zoning.
 - 2.2. "<u>Comprehensive Plan</u>" means the Wellington Comprehensive Plan 2021 adopted by the Town of Wellington Planning Commission under Resolution No. PC-01-2021 and ratified by the Board of Trustees by Resolution No. 26-2021.
 - 2.3. "G.W. Bush Ave. Railroad Improvements" means the railroad improvements at G.W. Bush Ave. and the BNSF crossing which are subject to and governed by the Memorandum of Agreements for Public Improvements (Sage Meadows Subdivision) dated February 15, 2018, recorded with the Larimer County Clerk and Recorder on February 16, 2018, at Reception Number 20180009848.
 - 2.4. "Non-potable Irrigation System" means the non-potable water delivery systems providing exterior irrigation water for landscaping within the Property. Nonpotable water is provided by two water wells known as the Kershner Well and the Sipes Farm Well. The use of water provided from each water well is limited to the area historically irrigated by each such well and the Non-potable Irrigation System will be designed and constructed in a manner to preserve historical water use of each independent water well.
 - 2.5. "<u>Large Planned Community</u>" means a planned community that meets the criteria set forth in Section 38-33.3-116.3 of the Colorado Common Interest Ownership Act ("<u>CCIOA</u>"). The Town acknowledges that the Owner intends to qualify the Property, together with the Village at Sage Farms Annexation property, as a Large Planned Community under CCIOA.
 - 2.6. "Master Association" means an organization that is authorized to exercise some or all of the powers of one or more associations on behalf of one or more common interest

- communities or for the unit owners of one or more common interest communities under CCIOA.
- 2.8. "Parks/Open Space" means all portions of the Property as set forth on the Zoning Map zoned for parks and open space, recreation areas and facilities, whether public or private.
- 2.9. "Residential Neighborhoods" means all portions of the Property zoned for residential purposes as set forth on the Zoning Map including Single Family Residential (A) R–3 zoning, Single Family Residential (B) R–2 zoning, Single Family Residential (C) R-2 zoning, and Multifamily Residential R–3 zoning.
- 2.10. "<u>Town Standards</u>" means the Standard Design Criteria and Standard Construction Requirements adopted by the Town and in effect at the time construction commences for any approved phase of development.
- 2.11. "<u>Villages at Sage Farms</u>" means that certain property immediately to the south and west of the Property which the Town and the Owner anticipate will be annexed to the Town under a separate annexation petition and agreement ("<u>Villages at Sage Farms Annexation</u>").
- 2.12. "<u>Vested Property Rights</u>" means those rights granted pursuant to Colorado Revised Statutes 24–68–101, *et seq*.
- 2.13. "Wastewater Reclamation Facility" means [define project] with an anticipated completion and operating date of November 30, 2024.
- 2.14. "Water Treatment Plant" means [define project] with an anticipated completion and operating date of September 30, 2024.
- 2.15. "Zoning Map" means the map attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as **Exhibit** C adopted as a Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District the approval of which is a condition to the Annexation of the Property.
- 3. Adequate Public Facilities. At the time of this Agreement, the Town is in the process of constructing capital expansion projects of the Water Treatment Plant and Wastewater Reclamation Facility. The Owner understands and agrees that limited building permits for new construction on the Property are available until completion and operation commences for the Wastewater Reclamation Facility and the Water Treatment Plant.

The Town and the Owner recognize that, except as specifically set forth herein or in a subsequently mutually agreed-upon Development Agreement (defined below), the Town does not provide public improvements to serve the Property. The Owner will be responsible for extending all utilities, streets and other public infrastructure to serve the Property. However, the failure of Owner to obtain Town-provided utilities to serve the Property, for reasons that are solely caused by the Town, by the dates identified in Sections 2.13 and 2.14, including but not limited to water service and sanitary sewer

- service, shall be grounds for disconnection pursuant to the Colorado Revised Statutes Section 31-21-101, et. seq. as amended (the "Annexation Act").
- 4. **Zoning**. Annexation of the Property to the Town is expressly conditioned upon the Town's contemporaneous approval in a single Ordinance both approving the annexation and granting the requested Zoning pursuant to the Zoning Map for Sage Farm P.U.D. The Zoning is approved simultaneous with the Annexation of the Property. If the Town does not approve the Zoning for the Property as specified herein, this Agreement shall automatically terminate, the Owner's Annexation Petition shall automatically be deemed withdrawn, the Town shall have no right or ability to complete the annexation of the Property under the current Annexation Petition. Further, Owner shall the unrestricted and uncontested right, as necessary, to complete a disconnection of the Property pursuant to the Annexation Act.
- 5. **Vested Property Rights**. The Owner and the Town agree that the Town's Zoning of the Property as provided pursuant to this Agreement shall constitute an "approved site-specific development plan" as defined in Colorado Revised Statutes Section 24–68–101, *et. seq.*, and as provided in Section 7.02.2 of the Town's Land Use Code. The Owner, its successors and assigns, shall have Vested Property Rights to undertake and complete the development and use of the Property as provided in this Agreement for a period of twenty (20) years from the effective date of the Town's annexation of the Property, subject to extension as agreed to by the parties and approved by the Town.
- 6. **Existing Legal Uses**. Any uses on the Property that are legally existing at the time of annexation are allowed to continue provided that such uses are not otherwise in conflict with rules and regulations of the Town. Such existing uses will become nonconforming uses and subject to the nonconforming use standards of the Town.
- 7. **Development Agreement**. The Property, and the Village at Sage Farm Annexation property, shall be developed in multiple phases under the Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District which reflects a unified plan of development. Prior to the commencement of construction of any phase or portion of the Property, a memorandum of agreement for public improvements or similar development agreement ("Development Agreement") shall be in place which shall further address public improvements including installation of streets, sidewalks, signage and traffic control, landscaping, the installation and maintenance of water delivery systems, wastewater collection systems, and stormwater drainage systems, the design and installation of which shall be in accordance with the Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District and applicable adopted Town Infrastructure Master Plans and applicable Town standards. In the event of a conflict between the Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District, Town Infrastructure Master Plans and applicable Town standards, the Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District shall control. The Development Agreement shall also include provisions for the installation and private maintenance of Landscaping, private stormwater drainage systems, and the Non-Potable Irrigation System. Further, the Development Agreement may include reimbursements to the Owners for the oversizing of certain improvements and construction of certain public improvements as agreed to by the parties in subsequent Development Agreements for development phases. To facilitate construction of public improvements, the Town may consider the creation or authorization of one or more public districts including a variety of quasi-municipal or improvement districts (e.g. including

but not limited to, special districts, general improvement districts, and metropolitan districts (collectively, "Public Districts") formed to advance the capital improvements as may be set forth in Infrastructure Master Plans and related engineering studies. The Town agrees not to condition building permits for the Property on completion of the G.W. Bush Railroad Improvements. The Property, or any portion thereof, may be the subject of site-specific development plans with the mutual consent of the Town and the Owner, but without amending or modifying this Agreement. The Development Agreement for the initial phase of the Property shall comply with the CCIOA requirement to establish the Property, and the Village at Sage Farms Annexation property as a Large Planned Community.

- 8. **Dedications**. The Owners agree to dedicate or have dedicated property necessary to install public improvements as defined in this Agreement and any subsequent subdivisions or other plat approved by the Town and Owner shall warrant title to the same subject only to those exceptions reasonably accepted by the Town.
- 9. Schools, Parks and Open Space. Neither the Owner nor its successors or assigns shall be required by the Town to dedicate land for public school purposes. The Developer and School District may enter into agreements for the payment of fees-in-lieu of a land dedication within the Property. The Zoning provides for approximately 39.6 acres of the Property zoned Private Parks & Open Space, R-2 Zoning District for use as a private park/open space ("Parks/Open Space"). The Parks/Open Space uses shall satisfy all parks and open space requirements for the Commercial Property and the Residential Neighborhoods. The Owner agrees to convey ownership of that portion of the Property zoned for Parks/Open Space uses to a common interest community association to be maintained and managed for private parks and open spaces uses. That portion of the Property maintained and managed for private parks and open space purposes may also include public easements and public infrastructure such as stormwater systems or public sidewalk/trail crossings for the development of the Property.

The Town and the Owners acknowledge and recognize that the cost, scope, and timing for construction of a larger, regional park is currently unknown. If the Town subsequently pursues the establishment of a larger, regional park which is determined to adequately serve the residents of the Property, the Town agrees that approximately fifteen (15) acres of the property zoned C-1 Commercial, and approved for Public/Private Parks & Open Space, may be used for alternative permitted or conditional uses including Multi-Family Dwellings or Mixed Use Dwellings subject to mutual agreement of a development agreement, plat and compliance with the Town's Land Use Code.

10. **Development Impact Fees**. Except as specifically modified in this Agreement, the Owners agrees to pay all development impact fees imposed by the Town including but not limited to building inspection, parks, trails, water, sanitary sewer, stormwater drainage, road impact, library, and similar fees. The Owners understand that these fees are (A) normally payable at the time of building permit request and (B) that the timing and amounts of these fees may be modified by the Town. The Owners acknowledge the obligation to pay all review fees and other expenses as may be required by the Land Use Code or other applicable Town ordinance or resolution pertaining to the Annexed Property.

- 11. **Water Contributions**. In consideration for the annexation of the Property, the Owners shall contribute raw water rights, or may pay cash-in-lieu of payments according to the Town's then current rate schedule, to satisfy the raw water requirement. The Town has sole discretion to accept water rights or payment of cash-in-lieu. The Town's Land Use Code requires developers to satisfy the water requirement at the time of issuance of a building permit.
- 12. Road Construction and Dedication. No Owner shall be entitled to develop any portion of the Property without first entering into agreements including a memorandum of agreement for public improvements, or similar agreement, with the Town providing for the construction and ongoing maintenance of any necessary roads and road improvements (including sidewalks), whether public or private, to serve the Property. Unless it otherwise consents, the Town shall have no obligation at any time to construct roads serving the Property, including off-site improvements as needed. All roads and road improvements for the development of the Property shall be constructed by the Owners in accordance with all applicable Town ordinances, rules, regulations, and engineering specifications in effect at the time that the Owners' property is developed. Owners shall be solely responsible for the cost to install any roads or road improvements subject to any repayments that may be agreed upon between the Town and Owner in subsequent Development Agreements for development phases. The Owners are required to adhere to the Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District, Town's Standards, Street Master Plan, or other transportation master plans in the design and construction of roads and road improvements. In the event of a conflict between the Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District, Town's Standards, Street Master Plan, or other transportation master plans, the Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District shall control. The Town and Owners may enter into agreements for repayment of oversizing of arterial and other non-local streets in accordance with the Town's policies for oversizing public improvements.
- 13. Water/Sewer Improvements. As a condition of any development, Owners shall install water and sewer improvements to serve the Property. All water and sewer service shall be constructed in accordance with applicable Town ordinances, rules, regulations, standards and engineering specifications as may be in effect at the time of development. Owners shall be solely responsible for the cost to install such water and sewer improvements subject to any mutually agreed-upon right to repayments based upon oversizing such systems to accommodate future development. The Town and Owners may enter into agreements for repayment of oversizing of such water and sewer improvements in accordance with the Town's policies for oversizing public improvements in effect at the time of construction approval by the Town, or the creation of Public Districts to advance the capital improvements as may be set forth in Infrastructure Master Plans and related engineering studies. The Owners shall pay all costs associated with obtaining water and sewer service for its portion of the Property and will obtain all necessary easements for construction and maintenance of any sewer or water improvements.

NOTWITHSTANDING ANY PROVISIONS TO THE CONTRARY, THE OWNERS ACKNOWLEDGE THAT THEY HAVE BEEN ADVISED THAT AS A RESULT OF SETTLEMENT STIPULATION ENTERED INTO BETWEEN THE TOWN AND THE NORTHERN COLORADO WATER ASSOCIATION

THE TOWN IS PRECLUDED FROM PROVIDING DOMESTIC WATER SERVICE TO CERTAIN AREAS IN AND SURROUNDING THE TOWN.

In those areas that the Town is unable to serve, Owners must receive service from the Water Association or must obtain the Water Association's consent for the Town to provide service.

- A. There are two (2) existing homes commonly known as 5950 North County Road 9 and 6136 North County Road 9, Wellington, Colorado on the Property that are currently supplied water by Northern Colorado Water Association (collectively, the "Existing Agriculture Residences"). Town agrees that the existing water service may remain for one or both of the Existing Agricultural Residences until such time as the Owner requests water service from the Town, or until such time as either residence is connected to the Town water system, whichever occurs first.
- B. The Existing Agricultural Residences on the Property are on private septic systems. Town agrees that the existing septic systems may remain for one or both of the Existing Agricultural Residences until such time as the Owner requests wastewater service from the Town, or until such time as either residence is connected to the Town water system, whichever occurs first.
- 14. Non-potable Irrigation System. [SUBJECT TO FURTHER NEGOTIATION].
- 15. **Non-Municipal Dedications**. Owners agree to provide appropriate easements or rights-of-way for non-municipal utilities as recommended by the Town Engineer including but not limited to easements for gas, electric, cable TV and irrigation water service.
- 16. **Storm Drainage Improvements**. Owners shall construct and maintain such storm drainage improvements as are required by any applicable Town ordinances, rules, regulations and engineering specifications in effect at the time the development occurs and shall further dedicate all necessary easements for storm sewers to serve Property being developed and to serve impacted surrounding properties. Unless it otherwise consents, the Town shall not be obligated to provide storm drainage improvements for any portion of the Property; provided, however, the Town agrees that the property platted and developed for Parks/Open Space uses may also include all necessary improvements to construct, operate and maintain the privately maintained stormwater systems for the development of the Property.
- 17. **Landscaping**. Owner shall install street trees and landscaping which complies with a landscaping plan to be submitted and approved by the Town at the time of subdivision plat or development plan. The Owner, or an association shall maintain street trees and landscaping in good and live condition, including proper watering, fertilization, pest control, pruning and mowing necessary for the health and structural integrity of trees and vegetation, and shall replace any dead trees or vegetation no later than the following planting season.

18. Agricultural Use; Phased Development.

- 18.1. As of the date of this Agreement, portions of the Property are being used for agricultural purposes. The Property may continue to be used for agricultural uses as existing and as consistent with the historic uses of such property at the time of annexation until a development plan or subdivision plat has been approved, a construction permit obtained, and construction commences on a specific portion of such property. The phased development of the Property shall consider and accommodate the existing agricultural uses of the specific portions of the Property not yet under construction.
- 18.2. The Town and other governmental authorities have adopted certain weed control, dust control, and other nuisance standards applicable to urban environments; the parties acknowledge that such standards are often inconsistent with agricultural uses. The Town agrees that urban standards shall not be unreasonably enforced or applicable in a manner that materially interferes with existing agricultural use on the Property. If any portion of the Property is not being used for agricultural purposes, and Owner does not otherwise ensure the sources of weed, dust, and nuisance violations are addressed, the Town shall have the right to address the sources of such violations, after reasonable notice and an opportunity for the Owner to address such concerns, and Owner shall reimburse any costs the Town reasonably incurs in addressing such violations.
- 19. **Initiative/Referendum**. If the annexation of the Property, or any portion thereof, is challenged by a referendum, all provisions of this Agreement, together with the duties and obligation of each party (including payment of all taxes imposed by the Town and enforcement of any Town ordinances on the Property), shall be suspended pending the outcome of the referendum election. If the referendum challenge results in disconnection of the Property from the Town, then this Annexation Agreement and all provisions contained herein shall be null and void and have no further effect. If the referendum challenge fails, then Owners and the Town shall continue to be bound by all terms and conditions of this Annexation Agreement. Upon such disconnection, the Town shall have no further obligations or responsibilities as to such disconnected property, and Owners shall have no further obligation to the Town, other than such obligations that may exist by statute or this agreement. The duration of the Vested Property Rights shall toll during the pendency of any initiative or referendum.
 - If any citizen-initiated ordinance becomes effective in the Town within eleven (11) months after the effective date of the annexation ordinance, which substantially alters or limits Owners' right to use its portion of the Property as contemplated by this Agreement, then the Town, upon the written request of Owners, will proceed to take all necessary action to disconnect the Owners' Property from the Town.
- 20. **Disconnection**. Except as specifically set forth herein, the Owners may not petition the Town to disconnect any portion of the Property if the effect of that disconnection would be that any other property in the Town would no longer have the contiguity to the Town. If Owners properly disconnect any portion of the Property as provided for herein, this Agreement shall continue to bind the Owners and Property to the extent that the Town has incurred obligations in reliance on this Agreement and the annexation petition.

- 21. **Court Action**. If the annexation of all or any portion of the Property is voided by action of any court (excluding any action arising as a result of an initiative or referendum) the Town and Owners shall cooperate to cure any legal defect which resulted in disconnection and upon cure this Agreement shall be deemed an agreement to annex such property to the Town as provided for by C.R.S. §31-12-121. Owners shall reapply for annexation when the Property becomes eligible for annexation as determined by the Town.
- 22. **Town's Ordinances**. Development of the Property shall be governed by the Town's ordinances, resolutions, standards, fees and policies currently in effect and as may be adopted or amended in the future. Except as set forth in this Agreement, land use issues remain subject to the police power and legislative authority of the Town.
- 23. **Enforcement**. This Agreement shall be specifically enforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction. In the event of a material breach of any material provision of this Agreement, the nonbreaching party may ask a court of competent jurisdiction to enter a writ of mandamus, temporary or permanent restraining orders, temporary or permanent injunctions, or orders of specific performance to compel the breaching part to perform its duties under this Agreement and to grant such other relief as may be afforded by law, it being the intent of this provision to supplement the law of remedies.
- 24. **Review and Processing**. The Owner and Town desire to timely review all development applications submitted in fulfilment of the Town development regulatory processes including, without limitation, use permits, variances, design review and building permit processes to the extent necessary for the development and construction of the improvements on the Property.
- 25. **Coordination/Cooperation**. Except where any matter is expressly stated to be in the sole discretion of a party hereto, the parties agree that in the performance of this Agreement, each will act in good faith and coordinate and cooperate with each other to the extent necessary to fulfil the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 26. **Further agreements**. The parties agree to sign any further documents reasonably required by Owners or the Town to carry out the terms of this Agreement.
- 27. **Recordation**. This Agreement and any amendments to this Agreement may be recorded with the Larimer County Clerk and Recorder and shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the heirs, transferees, successors, and assigns of the Owners. Upon conveyance of any interest in the Property, the previous Owners shall be released of any future obligation hereunder as to the portion of the Property conveyed. This Agreement shall constitute a covenant running with the Property.
- 28. **Approval**. This Agreement shall be null and void if the Town Board fails to approve the annexation of the Property. The Annexation is conditioned upon the simultaneous approval of this Agreement and the Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District.
- 29. **Amendment**. This Agreement may be amended only by written agreement between the Owner and the Town.
- 30. **Entire agreement**. Subject to the Town code and other properly adopted authority, this Agreement represents the entire agreement between the parties. Any amendments to this Agreement to be affective shall be in writing.

- 31. **Indemnification**. Owners, jointly and severally, agree to indemnify and hold the Town and its officers, employees, agents, and contractors harmless from and against all liability, claims, and demands, including petitions for judicial review, pursuant to §31-12-116, C.R.S., made by any person or entity other than the Town, its elected, appointed or employed representatives which arise of or are in any manner connected with the annexation of the property, including court costs and reasonable attorney fees.
- 32. **Counterparts**. This Agreement may be executed by any number of counterparts and by any number of counterpart signature pages, each of which shall be an original with the same effect as if each of the signatures were affixed to the same instrument.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties hereto have executed this annexation agreement the day and year first written above.

ANNEXATION AGREEMENT

VILLAGE AT SAGE FARMS ANNEXATION

THIS ANNEXATION AGREEMENT ("<u>Agreement</u>") is made and entered into this day of ______, 2023, between the TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO, a Colorado municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as the "<u>Town</u>", and Sipes Farm Holding, LLC, a Colorado limited liability company, hereinafter referred to collectively as the "Owner."

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Owner is the owner of the Property more fully described in this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Owner has filed a petition to annex the Property to the Town; and

WHEREAS, the Town has passed a resolution pursuant to C.R.S. § 31-12-108(1) finding that the proposed annexation complies with C.R.S. § 31-12-104 and 31-12-105; and

WHEREAS, an annexation impact report has been prepared pursuant to §31-12-108.5, C.R.S., and copies have been distributed in accordance with the statutory requirements; and

WHEREAS, Colorado's Courts have recognized that the Municipal Annexation Act of 1965 contemplates annexation agreements as a routine step in the annexation process; and

WHEREAS, the parties recognize that this annexation agreement is the second parcel of real property annexed to the Town as a serial annexation of property all of which is within the boundaries of the Wellington Comprehensive Plan 2021; and

WHERES, the parties desire to enter into an annexation agreement to set forth various obligations of the parties including obligations for development and use of the Property in the future; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms, conditions and covenants contained herein and other good and valuable consideration, the adequacy and receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

- 1. **Purpose**. The purpose of this Agreement is to further the planning and economic policies of the Town for the annexation of approximately 52.97 acres zoned for residential, commercial, and parks/open space purposes. This Agreement establishes the Zoning and Vested Property Rights upon annexation of the Property defined herein. The development, the construction, and uses of the Residential Neighborhoods, the Commercial Property, and the Parks/Open Space within the Property are expected to generate new employment opportunities in the Town and other public benefits for the Town. The Town approves the Zoning and finds that the terms of this site-specific development plan set forth in this Agreement are reasonably necessary to protect the public health, safety, and welfare. The "Property" means the Property defined on **Exhibit A** which Owner has filed a petition for annexation with the Town for the Village at Sage Farms Annexation.
- 2. Comprehensive Plan. This Agreement also establishes a framework for the Owner and the Town to cooperate and work toward the anticipated entitlement and development of approximately 52.97 acres of real property as a mixed-use commercial corridor the completion of which the parties acknowledge is contingent on securing funding and establishing a schedule for the construction of regional transportation and public improvements of community wide impact. The Property is within the area defined as the Commercial Node in the Wellington Comprehensive Plan 2021 and is directly related to the potential completion of regional public improvements as established in the Town's Comprehensive Plan and other related town Infrastructure Master Plans or available planning information. The Owner and the Town agree to work cooperatively to secure the funding and establish a schedule for the completion of the Regional Improvements.
- 3. **Zoning and Development of Property**. Annexation of the Property to the Town is expressly conditioned upon the Town's agreement to pursue in good faith the Town's objectives set forth in the Comprehensive Plan. Owner acknowledges that upon annexation the Property is subject to the Comprehensive Plan and that the parties anticipate commercial development within the Town's municipal boundaries.
- 4. **Definitions**. The following terms are applicable primarily to the Property and Regional Improvements with reference to the policies and objectives of the Comprehensive Plan:
 - 4.1.1. "<u>Activity Center</u>" means that general area located along East County Road 58 and in the vicinity of the intersection of East County Road 58 and State Highway 1 as defined in the Comprehensive Plan.
 - 4.1.2. "Comprehensive Plan" means the Wellington Comprehensive Plan 2021 adopted by the Town of Wellington Planning Commission under Resolution No. PC-01-2021 and ratified by the Board of Trustees by Resolution No. 26-2021, and any subsequent Comprehensive Plan or amendments to a Comprehensive Plan adopted pursuant to law by the Town of Wellington.
 - 4.1.3. "County Road 58 Railroad Improvements" means the railroad improvements at County Road 58 and the BNSF crossing, the construction of future roadway,

- signalization and crossing improvements at the Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) railroad crossing at County Road 58, including widening of County Road 58, median, and sidewalks according to Town regulations, the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) and BNSF.
- 4.1.4. "Commercial Corridor" means East County Road 58 which is identified as a Key Corridor in the Comprehensive Plan. The Comprehensive Plan identifies that the Commercial Corridor is a priority area for the efficient and logical extension of infrastructure services within the Town's GMA boundary (Comprehensive Plan, F&P. 1.6.). East County Road 58 intersects with another Key Corridor in the Comprehensive Plan that also includes consideration for transportation improvements; Identify strategies for improved traffic flow and safety along SH-1/CR 9 from CR 64 to CR 58 (Comprehensive Plan, T. 1.14.)).
- 4.1.5. "Gateway Entrance" means the intersection of State Highway 1 and East County Road 58 as defined in the Comprehensive Plan.
- 4.1.6. "Infrastructure Master Plans" means customary municipal plans commissioned by municipalities in the Northern Colorado region to determine capital facility improvements to achieve the objectives set forth in adopted policies statements such as the Comprehensive Plan. Infrastructure Master Plans include transportation master plans and impact fee studies to determine the Regional Improvements required to advance the policies set forth in the Comprehensive Plan such as the Commercial Corridor and Gateway Entrance.
- 4.1.7. "Large Planned Community" means a planned community that meets the criteria set forth in Section 38-33.3-116.3 of the Colorado Common Interest Ownership Act ("CCIOA"). The Town acknowledges that the Owner intends to qualify the Property, together with the Sage Farms Annexation property, as a Large Planned Community under CCIOA.
- 4.1.8. "<u>Master Association</u>" means an organization that is authorized to exercise some or all of the powers of one or more associations on behalf of one or more common interest communities or for the unit owners of one or more common interest communities under CCIOA.
- 4.1.9. "Off-site Improvements" means those improvements that are not on-site improvements but may be desired or required by the Town or Owner.
- 4.1.10. "On-site Improvements" means those improvements needed for the project to meet development requirements at the time of development, which may include, but not be limited to, adjacent transportation improvements, water and wastewater utility improvements, stormwater management and drainage improvements, and other improvements consistent with the Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District and as informed by the Town's Infrastructure Master Plans and other relevant engineering studies.

- 4.1.11. "Regional Commercial" means that portion of the Property consisting of approximately 52.97 acres adjoining East County Road 58 within an area defined as a Commercial Node in the Comprehensive Plan.
- 4.1.12. "Regional Improvements" may mean and include, the Gateway Entrance, and the intersection of County Road 58 and County Road 9 (also known as Giddings Road), and possibly a portion of the County Road 58 Railroad Improvements. The Town and the Owner acknowledge and recognize that the cost, scope, and timing of the Regional Improvements is unknown, and that subsequent Infrastructure Master Plans or engineering and planning efforts may evaluate the then current progress toward completion of the Regional Improvements on the projected traffic service levels attributed to the Property. The Town and the Owner acknowledge their mutual objectives to entitle and develop the Property in phases to the fullest extent reasonable with recognition of the then current progress toward the completion of any Regional Improvements set forth in the Comprehensive Plan.
- 4.1.13. "Sage Farms" means that certain property immediately to the north of the Property which the Town and the Owner anticipate will be annexed to the Town under a separate annexation petition and agreement ("Sage Farms Annexation").
- 4.1.14. "<u>Town Standards</u>" means the Standard Design Criteria and Standard Construction Requirements adopted by the Town and in effect at the time construction commences for any approved phase of development.
- 4.1.15. "Vested Property Rights" means those rights granted pursuant to Colorado Revised Statutes 24–68–101, *et seq*.
- 4.1.16. "Wastewater Reclamation Facility" means the capital improvement project including construction, reconstruction and expansion of the Town's facility used for the collection and treatment of wastewater with an anticipated completion and operating date of November 30, 2024.
- 4.1.17. "Water Treatment Plant" means the capital improvement project including construction, reconstruction and expansion of the Town's facility used for the treatment and distribution of potable water with an anticipated completion and operating date of September 30, 2024.
- 5. Cooperation. The Town and the Owner acknowledge and recognize that the cost, scope, and timing for construction of the Regional Improvements is currently unknown. The unknown factors include the nature of desired infrastructure, project and/or regional engineering studies, plans and specifications, location of improvements, construction costs, management costs, general usability, funding needs, funding mechanisms, and the sphere of benefitted properties that may assist in the funding and construction of the Regional Improvements. The Parties establish the term of the Vested Property Rights as material consideration for the annexation of the Property plus in consideration of the uncertainty of the cost, scope, and timing for construction of the Regional Improvements adjacent to the Property pursuant to the Comprehensive Plan.

In consideration of the uncertainty of the cost, scope, and timing for construction of the Regional Improvements, and also in consideration of the mutual benefits to the Town and the Owner for pursuing the Regional Improvements, the Town agrees to appropriate One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) in its Town budget toward completion of a Transportation Master Plan and Transportation Impact Fee Study, which appropriation is conditioned upon a matching contribution of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) from the Owner, or a subsequent developer, under the anticipated memorandum agreement for public improvements for the first development phase of the property annexed under the Sage Farms Annexation. If the matching contributions from the Owner or subsequent developer is accomplished by July 31, 2024, the Town's appropriation shall be for the 2024 budget year. If the matching contributions from the Owner or subsequent developer is accomplished by July 31, 2025, the Town's appropriation shall be for the 2025 Town budget year.

- 6. **Public Financing**. The Town and the Owner recognize that the cost and extent of the infrastructure required to serve the Property and the Regional Improvements, including for the benefit of adjacent properties, are currently unknown including but not limited to the following: scope and service level of such infrastructure; engineering studies, plans and specifications; location; construction costs; maintenance costs; management costs; funding needs; funding mechanisms; and, sphere of benefitted properties that should contribute toward such costs. To facilitate construction of the Regional Improvements, the Town will pursue the policy objectives set forth in the Comprehensive Plan as further informed by Infrastructure Master Plans and related engineering studies, plans and specifications and consider options for public financing, partnerships and public-private partnerships identified in the Comprehensive Plan or Infrastructure Master Plans including:
 - 6.1.1. **Impact Fees**. Review and update impact fees for all development on an asneeded basis, so that community wide developer paid fees may contribute to the Regional Improvements identified in this Agreement (Comprehensive Plan, F&P. 2.6) or other Town priorities.
 - 6.1.2. **Public Districts**. The creation or authorization of one or more public districts including a variety of quasi-municipal or improvement districts (e.g. including but not limited to, special districts, general improvement districts, and metropolitan districts (collectively, "<u>Public Districts</u>") formed for completion of infrastructure improvements on-site, off-site or adjacent to the Commercial Node including, but not limited to, the Gateway Entrance, State Highway 1 and East County Road 58 intersection improvements (See Comprehensive Plan, T.1.16). No district so established shall apply for Colorado Conservation Trust Funds and supplemented by the Colorado State Lottery without the Town's consent.
 - 6.1.3. **Improvement Fees**. The creation or authorization of one or more fees including the use of a Tax Increment Financing (TIF as defined in the Comprehensive Plan), public improvement fee (PIF), retail sales fee (RSF), adoption of a reimbursement

- ordinance and other similar financing techniques utilized from time to time in Northern Colorado communities (collectively, "Improvement Fees").
- 6.1.4. **Grants and Intergovernmental Agreements**. Pursue federal, state, regional grant funding opportunities as well as public—private partnerships as an implementation priority for the construction of the transportation Regional Improvements consistent with the Comprehensive Plan (Comprehensive Plan, T. 1.15 High, Short Term priority; Comprehensive Plan, F&P 3.6 to capitalize on funding opportunities for community-wide projects).
- 6.1.5. Capital Improvement Plans. Periodically evaluate the need for Infrastructure Master Plans or other reports and studies consistent with the policies expressed in the Comprehensive Plan for the expansion and upgrade of utilities, infrastructure and amenities, and consider for inclusion in the five-year Capital Improvement Plan.
- 7. **Regional Improvements Development**. The Town and Owner may enter into agreements to participate in the funding, design, and construction of the Regional Improvements. The Town and the Owner further acknowledge that the Infrastructure Master Plans may assist in determining a reasonable mix of impact fees applicable to all new Town development and development conditions or exaction fees specifically related to a particular phase of the Property development. For example, a portion of the anticipated County Road 58 Railroad Improvements may be determined a Regional Improvement directly related to the development of the Commercial Corridor contemplated in the Comprehensive Plan and may be partially funded by Town wide impact fees, or more reasonably determined as a condition related to the Property development and funded by Owner or their successors or assigns.
- 8. Adequate Public Facilities. At the time of this Agreement, the Town is in the process of constructing capital expansion projects of the Water Treatment Plant and Wastewater Reclamation Facility. The Owner understands and agrees that limited building permits for new construction on the Property are available until completion and operation commences for the Wastewater Reclamation Facility and the Water Treatment Plant.
 - The Town and the Owner recognize that, except as specifically set forth herein or in a subsequently mutually agreed Development Agreement (defined below), the Town does not provide public improvements to serve the Property. The Owner will be responsible for extending all utilities, streets and other public infrastructure to serve the Property. However, the failure of Owner to obtain Town-provided utilities to serve the Property, for reasons that are solely caused by the Town, by the dates identified in Sections 4.1.16 and 4.1.17, including but not limited to water service and sanitary sewer service, shall be grounds for disconnection pursuant to the Colorado Revised Statutes Section 31-21-101, et. seq. as amended (the "Annexation Act").
- 9. **Zoning**. Annexation of the Property to the Town is expressly conditioned upon the Town's contemporaneous approval in a single Ordinance both approving the annexation and granting the requested Zoning pursuant to the Zoning Map for Villages at Sage Farm P.U.D. The Zoning is approved simultaneous with the Annexation of the Property. If the Town does not approve the Zoning for the Property as specified herein, this Agreement shall automatically

terminate, the Owner's Annexation Petition shall automatically be deemed withdrawn, the Town shall have no right or ability to complete the annexation of the Property under the current Annexation Petition. Further, Owner shall have the unrestricted and uncontested right, as necessary, to complete a disconnection of the Property pursuant to the Annexation Act.

- 10. **Vested Property Rights**. The Owner and the Town agree that the Town's Zoning of the Property as provided pursuant to this Agreement shall constitute an "approved site-specific development plan" as defined in Colorado Revised Statutes Section 24–68–101, *et. seq.*, and as provided in Section 7.02.2 of the Town's Land Use Code. The Owner, its successors and assigns, shall have Vested Property Rights to undertake and complete the development and use of the Property as provided in this Agreement for a period of twenty-five (25) years from the effective date of the Town's annexation of the Property.
- 11. **Existing Legal Uses**. Any uses on the Property that are legally existing at the time of annexation are allowed to continue provided that such uses are not otherwise in conflict with rules and regulations of the Town. Such existing uses will become nonconforming uses and subject to the nonconforming use standards of the Town.
- 12. **Development Agreement**. The Property, and the Sage Farm Annexation property, shall be developed in multiple phases under the Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District which reflects a unified plan of development. Prior to the commencement of construction of any phase or portion of the Property, a memorandum of agreement for public improvements or similar development agreement ("Development Agreement") shall be in place which shall further address public improvements including streets, sidewalks, signage and traffic control, landscaping, the installation and maintenance of water delivery systems, wastewater collection systems, and stormwater drainage systems, and the County Road 58 Railroad Improvements. The Development Agreement shall also include provisions for the installation and private maintenance of Landscaping, private stormwater drainage systems, and the Non-Potable Irrigation System. The Property, or any portion thereof, may be the subject of site-specific development plans with the mutual consent of the Town and the Owner, but without amending or modifying this Agreement.
- 13. **Dedications**. The Owner agrees to dedicate or have dedicated property necessary to install public improvements as defined in this Agreement and any subsequent subdivisions or other plat approved by the Town and Owner shall warrant title to the same subject only to those exceptions reasonably accepted by the Town.
- 14. **Schools, Parks and Open Space**. Neither the Owner nor its successors or assigns shall be required by the Town to dedicate land for public school purposes. The Developer and School District may enter into agreements for the payment of fees-in-lieu of a land dedication within the Property. Neither the Owner nor its successors or assigns shall be required to dedicate land for a public park or open space. The Town and the Owner acknowledge and recognize that land for public park or open space is accommodated under the terms of the Sage Farms Annexation agreement approved as the first property in this serial annexation.

- 15. **Development Impact Fees**. Except as specifically modified in this Agreement, the Owner agrees to pay all development impact fees imposed by the Town including but not limited to building inspection, parks, trails, water, sanitary sewer, stormwater drainage, road impact, library, and similar fees. The Owners understands that these fees are (A) normally payable at the time of building permit request and (B) that the timing and amounts of these fees may be modified by the Town over the course of time. The Owner acknowledges the obligation to pay all review fees and other expenses as may be required by the Land Use Code or other applicable Town ordinance or resolution pertaining to the Annexed Property.
- 16. **Water Contributions**. In consideration for the annexation of the Property, the Owners shall contribute raw water rights, or may pay cash-in-lieu of payments according to the Town's then current rate schedule, to satisfy the raw water requirement. The Town has sole discretion to accept water rights or payment of cash-in-lieu. The Town's Land Use Code requires developers to satisfy the water requirement at the time of issuance of a building permit.
- 17. Road Construction and Dedication. No Owner shall be entitled to develop any portion of the Property without first entering into agreements including a memorandum of agreement for public improvements, or similar agreement, with the Town providing for the construction and ongoing maintenance of any necessary roads and road improvements (including sidewalks), whether public or private, to serve the Property. Unless it otherwise consents, the Town shall have no obligation at any time to construct roads serving the Property, including off-site improvements as needed. All roads and road improvements for the development of the Property shall be constructed by the Owner in accordance with all applicable Town ordinances, rules, regulations, and engineering specifications in effect at the time that the Owner's property is developed. Owner shall be solely responsible for the cost to install any roads or road improvements subject to any repayments that may be agreed upon between the Town and Owner in subsequent Development Agreements for development phases. The Owner is required to adhere to the Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District, Town's Standards, Street Master Plan, or other transportation master plans in the design and construction of roads and road improvements. In the event of a conflict between the Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District, Town's Standards, Street Master Plan, or other transportation master plans, the Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District shall control. The Town and the Owner may enter into agreements for repayment of oversizing of arterial and other non-local streets in accordance with the Town's policies for oversizing public improvements.
- 18. Water/Sewer Improvements. As a condition of any development, the Owner shall install water and sewer improvements to serve the Property. All water and sewer service shall be constructed in accordance with applicable Town ordinances, rules, regulations, standards and engineering specifications as may be in effect at the time of development. Owner shall be solely responsible for the cost to install such water and sewer improvements subject to any mutually agreed-upon repayments based upon oversizing such systems in accordance with Town policy and standards. The Town and Owner may enter into agreements for repayment of oversizing of such water and sewer improvements in accordance with the Town's policies for oversizing public improvements in effect at the time of construction approval by the

Town. The Owner shall pay all costs associated with obtaining water and sewer service for its portion of the Property and will obtain all necessary easements for construction and maintenance of any sewer or water improvements.

NOTWITHSTANDING ANY PROVISIONS TO THE CONTRARY, THE OWNER ACKNOWLEDGES THAT IT HAS BEEN ADVISED THAT AS A RESULT OF SETTLEMENT STIPULATION ENTERED INTO BETWEEN THE TOWN AND THE NORTHERN COLORADO WATER ASSOCIATION THE TOWN IS PRECLUDED FROM PROVIDING DOMESTIC WATER SERVICE TO CERTAIN AREAS IN AND SURROUNDING THE TOWN.

In those areas that the Town is unable to serve, the Owner must receive service from the Water Association or must obtain the Water Association's consent for the Town to provide service.

- 19. Non-potable Irrigation System. [SUBJECT TO FURTHER NEGOTIATION].
- 20. **Non-Municipal Dedications**. The Owner agrees to provide appropriate easements or rights-of-way for non-municipal utilities as recommended by the Town Engineer including but not limited to easements for gas, electric, cable TV and irrigation water service.
- 21. **Storm Drainage Improvements**. The Owner shall construct and maintain such storm drainage improvements as are required by any applicable Town ordinances, rules, regulations, standards and engineering requirements in effect at the time the development occurs and shall further dedicate all necessary easements for storm sewers to serve Property being developed and to serve impacted surrounding properties. Unless it otherwise consents, the Town shall not be obligated to provide storm drainage improvements for any portion of the Property.
- 22. **Landscaping**. Owner shall install street trees and landscaping which complies with a landscaping plan to be submitted and approved by the Town at the time of subdivision plat or development plan. The Owner, or an association shall maintain street trees and landscaping in good and live condition, including proper watering, fertilization, pest control, pruning and mowing necessary for the health and structural integrity of trees and vegetation, and shall replace any dead trees or vegetation no later than the following planting season.

23. Agricultural Use; Phased Development.

- 23.1. As of the date of this Agreement, portions of the Property are being used for agricultural purposes. The Property may continue to be used for agricultural uses as existing and as consistent with the historic uses of such property at the time of annexation until a development plan or subdivision plat has been approved, a construction permit obtained, and construction commences on a specific portion of such property. The phased development of the Property shall consider and accommodate the existing agricultural uses of the specific portions of the Property not yet under construction.
- 23.2. The Town and other governmental authorities have adopted certain weed control, dust control, and other nuisance standards applicable to urban environments; the

parties acknowledge that such standards are often inconsistent with agricultural uses. The Town agrees that urban standards shall not be unreasonably enforced or applicable in a manner that materially interferes with existing agricultural use on the Property. If any portion of the Property is not being used for agricultural purposes, and Owner does not otherwise ensure the sources of weed, dust, and nuisance violations are addressed, the Town shall have the right to address the sources of such violations, after reasonable notice and an opportunity for the Owner to address such concerns, and Owner shall reimburse any costs the Town reasonably incurs in addressing such violations.

24. **Initiative/Referendum**. If the annexation of the Property, or any portion thereof, is challenged by a referendum, all provisions of this Agreement, together with the duties and obligation of each party (including payment of all taxes imposed by the Town and enforcement of any Town ordinances on the Property), shall be suspended pending the outcome of the referendum election. If the referendum challenge results in disconnection of the Property from the Town, then this Annexation Agreement and all provisions contained herein shall be null and void and have no further effect. If the referendum challenge fails, then the Owner and the Town shall continue to be bound by all terms and conditions of this Annexation Agreement. Upon such disconnection, the Town shall have no further obligations or responsibilities as to such disconnected property, and Owner shall have no further obligation to the Town, other than such obligations that may exist by statute or this agreement. The duration of the Vested Property Rights shall toll during the pendency of any initiative or referendum.

If any citizen-initiated ordinance becomes effective in the Town within eleven (11) months after the effective date of the annexation ordinance, which substantially alters or limits Owner's right to use its portion of the Property as contemplated by this Agreement, then the Town, upon the written request of the Owner, will proceed to take all necessary action to disconnect the Owner's Property from the Town.

- 25. **Disconnection**. Except as specifically set forth herein, the Owner may not petition the Town to disconnect any portion of the Property if the effect of that disconnection would be that any other property in the Town would no longer have the contiguity to the Town. If the Owner properly disconnect any portion of the Property as provided for herein, this Agreement shall continue to bind the Owner and Property to the extent that the Town has incurred obligations in reliance on this Agreement and the annexation petition.
- 26. **Court Action**. If the annexation of all or any portion of the Property is voided by action of any court (excluding any action arising as a result of an initiative or referendum) the Town and the Owner shall cooperate to cure any legal defect which resulted in disconnection and upon cure this Agreement shall be deemed an agreement to annex such property to the Town as provided for by C.R.S. §31-12-121. Owner shall reapply for annexation when the Property becomes eligible for annexation as determined by the Town.
- 27. **Town's Ordinances**. Development of the Property shall be governed by the Town's ordinances, resolutions, standards, fees and policies currently in effect and as may be adopted

- or amended in the future. Except as set forth in this Agreement, land use issues remain subject to the police power and legislative authority of the Town.
- 28. **Enforcement**. This Agreement shall be specifically enforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction. In the event of a material breach of any material provision of this Agreement, the nonbreaching party may ask a court of competent jurisdiction to enter a writ of mandamus, temporary or permanent restraining orders, temporary or permanent injunctions, or orders of specific performance to compel the breaching part to perform its duties under this Agreement and to grant such other relief as may be afforded by law, it being the intent of this provision to supplement the law of remedies.
- 29. **Review and Processing**. The Owner and Town desire to timely review all development applications submitted in fulfilment of the Town development regulatory processes including, without limitation, use permits, variances, design review and building permit processes to the extent necessary for the development and construction of the improvements on the Property.
- 30. **Coordination/Cooperation**. Except where any matter is expressly stated to be in the sole discretion of a party hereto, the parties agree that in the performance of this Agreement, each will act in good faith and coordinate and cooperate with each other to the extent necessary to fulfil the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 31. **Further agreements**. The parties agree to sign any further documents reasonably required by the Owner or the Town to carry out the terms of this Agreement.
- 32. **Recordation**. This Agreement and any amendments to this Agreement may be recorded with the Larimer County Clerk and Recorder and shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the heirs, transferees, successors, and assigns of the Owner. Upon conveyance of any interest in the Property, the previous Owner shall be released of any future obligation hereunder as to the portion of the Property conveyed. This Agreement shall constitute a covenant running with the Property.
- 33. **Approval**. This Agreement shall be null and void if the Town Board fails to approve the annexation of the Property. The Annexation is conditioned upon the simultaneous approval of this Agreement and the Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District.
- 34. **Amendment**. This Agreement may be amended only by written agreement between the Owner and the Town.
- 35. **Entire agreement**. Subject to the Town code and other properly adopted authority, this Agreement represents the entire agreement between the parties. Any amendments to this Agreement to be affective shall be in writing.
- 36. **Indemnification**. The Owner agrees to indemnify and hold the Town and its officers, employees, agents, and contractors harmless from and against all liability, claims, and demands, including petitions for judicial review, pursuant to §31-12-116, C.R.S., made by any person or entity other than the Town, its elected, appointed or employed representatives

- which arise of or are in any manner connected with the annexation of the property, including court costs and reasonable attorney fees.
- 37. **Counterparts**. This Agreement may be executed by any number of counterparts and by any number of counterpart signature pages, each of which shall be an original with the same effect as if each of the signatures were affixed to the same instrument.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

The packet items for Board of Trustee consideration for the 2024 budget include:

- Resolution No. 51-2023 A Resolution Adopting the Budget for the Town of Wellington, Colorado for the Calendar Year Beginning the 1st Day of January 2024 and Ending the Last Day of December, 2024, Estimating the Amount of Money Necessary to be Raised by the Tax Levy Based on the Said Budget so Adopted, Estimating the Amount of Money to be Derived From Other Revenue Sources, Setting Forth Estimated Expenditures for Each
- Resolution No. 52-2023 A Resolution Levying General Property Taxes for the Taxable Year 2023 to Defray Costs of Government for the Town of Wellington, Colorado, for the Calendar Year Beginning January 1, 2024, and Ending December 31, 2024
- Ordinance No. 12-2023 An Emergency Ordinance Appropriating Sums of Money to Defray Expenses and Liabilities of the Town of Wellington, Colorado for the Fiscal Year Beginning January 1, 2024 and Ending December 31, 2024

The budget staff memo is included with the budget document for your review. The Wellington Municipal Code at Sec. 4-3-20 states that the rate of tax levy shall be adopted by resolution and at Sec 4-3-30 states that the annual appropriation be passed by ordinance; the code and statutes are silent as to the requirement of a resolution or ordinance adopting the annual budget. As an ordinance is not in effect until 30 days after publication, staff has submitted an emergency ordinance for Ordinance No. 12-2023 which would allow for all budget related documents to be in effect concurrently.

Staff has worked diligently to reduce costs and understands the need to continue to provide the services required and expected of the residents. The General Fund projects to transfer \$1,049,000 to the water and sewer funds and we anticipate providing additional grants in 2025. Staff has made a request for the addition of 3.75 employees in 2024; these positions will be on hold until after the first quarter when revenues and expenditures can be presented to the Board of Trustees and determinations can be made related to the addition of staff.

The statutory requirement for publication of a legal notice of the budget was published in the Coloradoan on December 7, 2023.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has considered all relevant factors concerning the budget and made all adjustments to the budget deemed appropriate and proper; and

FISCAL YEAR 2024 DRAFT BUDGET



2024 Town Administrator's Budget Message

December 12, 2023

Mayor and Board of Trustees,

Staff is pleased to present the Board of Trustees a 2024 Proposed Budget of \$68,600,522 including operating expenditures, debt service, and transfers, totaling \$24,087,929, and a capital improvement program for 2024 of \$44,512,593. These totals include General Fund capital projects costing \$250,000 and an operating budget for 2024 of \$8,984,405, which provides funding for Town services such as the contract with the Larimer County Sheriff's Office, planning services, public works administration, and all Town administrative services. Funding this 2024 General Fund Budget are estimated revenues and transfers totaling \$8,366,091. The General Fund is, therefore, projected to end 2024 with an \$868,314 operating deficit due to the inclusion of \$1,049,000 in grants from the General Fund to the Water and Sewer Funds to minimize the need for rate increases in those funds.

Total requested appropriations in the 2024 Budget equal \$68.6 million and total available resources, including available fund balances and estimated revenues, equal \$89.2 million. This is a balanced budget where total appropriations do not exceed total available resources.

The proposed 2024 Budget for the Town of Wellington was presented to the Trustees, the Finance Committee, and the public in a variety of meetings and forums held on September 19, 2023, October 3, 2023, October 10, 2023, October 17, 2023, November 14, 2023, and November 20, 2023. The original proposed 2024 Budget presented in September has been amended several times to reflect Trustee suggestions, updates to revenue projections as well as other changes that better reflect the current and expected future financial position of the Town. The updated budget documents have been made available on the Town's website through the Board of Trustee packets.

Significant changes made to the 2024 budget since the November 14, 2023 Board presentation include:

- Reduction of \$137,000 in estimated property taxes due to recent State legislation
- Additional \$132,000 reduction in General Fund operating budget expenditures
- Additional \$15,000 reduction in Park Fund operating budget expenditures
- Changes in Capital Improvement Program
 - o Water Fund: \$178,600 reduction due to delay of Automated Metering project
 - o Sewer Fund: \$107,500 reduction due to delay of Viewpoint Lift Station project
 - Street Fund: net \$414,000 increase due to moving up Cleveland Ave
 Improvements project and delaying Street/Sidewalk Safety improvements project



- Drainage Fund: \$416,000 increase due to moving up Outfall for Cleveland Ave Improvements project
- Parks Fund: \$125,000 reduction due to expected completion of Splashpad Chemical Room project under budget in 2023.

The overall size of the budget has increased in recent years as the Town adjusts its services to meet the expectation of a growing population, fund civic and infrastructure projects and keep pace with inflation. The 2024 Budget focuses on the continuation of high-quality customer service and core services such as infrastructure maintenance, public facilities, planning and development, parks, water, sewer and stormwater utility services as well as continuing to build community partnerships to improve the quality of life for Wellington residents, businesses and visitors.

This 2024 Budget estimates that all Town funds will meet Board adopted fund balance reserve requirements at year-end. There are, however, challenges facing the Town's Water and Wastewater Funds in that these two enterprise funds do not currently generate enough operating revenue to adequately cover debt service covenants. This is the case despite the fact that these projections include the recommended 5% increase in utility user fees and 5% increase in impact fees.

To further address the shortfall in the Water and Sewer Funds, the Board of Trustees directed staff to include the maximum grant allowed from the General Fund to these enterprise funds to help stabilize the funds financially and keep rate adjustments to a minimum. These grants total \$1,049,000 in 2024 with similar grants budgeted and 2023 and expected in 2025. Staff will continue to investigate options for the water fund deficit expected in years 2026-2028 and wastewater fund shortfall expected in years 2025-2026 which will be brought to the Board of Trustees next year as the financial picture for 2025 becomes clearer.

Budget Highlights

In the 2024 Budget, we have highlighted three major themes that are aligned with the objectives in the 2022-2024 Strategic Plan. In accordance with the Town's Mission Statement, our team is committed to delivering outstanding municipal services that cater to the needs of our community. While we have emphasized the overarching themes within the budget, it's essential to recognize the ongoing day-to-day operations that keep our Town running. While these daily operations may not always take the spotlight, they are fundamental in our commitment to serving our community. Below are the three major budget themes.

#1 Fiscal Responsibility & Transparency

Transparently Reflecting Costs in Operations Budget

In prior year budgets, employee wages were dispersed across multiple departments based on overhead calculations (indirect cost). In the 2024 budget, the actual proposed salaries by department will be represented without the indirect (overhead calculations) applied. We want to



ensure pay transparency to show the true cost for each department. This will look like large increases in each department, but the actual change in wages and salaries will be primarily through merit and cost of living (COLA) adjustments. Overhead calculations will be displayed through transfers in the 2024 department budgets. For example: In the 2023 IT budget, there was \$33,000 budgeted for salary. This did not cover the full salary of the IT position (1 FTE), but this was spread out against multiple departments it serves.

Grant Funding

The Town of Wellington continues to pursue grants to support priorities identified by the Board of Trustees. Since 2020, the Town has applied for and been awarded \$7.3 million to support various projects, including the Comprehensive Plan, water infrastructure, downtown facade improvements, and more. Town staff will continue to seek grant funding in alignment with the board's direction to offset costs and reduce debts as part of the overall commitment to fiscal responsibility. After adoption of the 2024 budget and corresponding Capital Improvement Project list, staff will pursue additional grant funding to assist in the completion of projects aligning with the Board of Trustee's goal to seek funding sources for the positive direction of the community. The Board of Trustees can expect updates on potential grants and will approve the decision to move forward with a grant application through resolution at a public meeting.

Personnel

Employees are the backbone of the Town providing essential services necessary for the community. A well-trained and qualified workforce is critical to developing and maintaining a high quality of life for our residents.

- The proposed budget recommends 3% cost of living (COLA) adjustments and a 3% merit pool for staff. The percentage of compensation for Town employees is 35% of the total operating budget, which is far below the average compensation of state and local government employees of 58.25% of the operations budget. Providing merit and cost of living adjustments to employees is crucial for recognizing and rewarding performance, maintaining fairness and equity, attracting and retaining talent, and ensuring compliance with labor laws. It contributes to a positive work environment, employee motivation, and the overall success of the organization.
- Employer-provided employee health insurance premiums are increasing by 5% for a total cost of health insurance of \$911,471.53.
- 4.25 Full-time employees (FTE) are proposed in the budget with only the .5 Detective position being fully funded as of January 1, 2024. The balance of the positions requested will be evaluated after first quarter 2024 to assure revenue projections support the additional staff. Those positions include Planning I-II (1 FTE), Engineer I-II (1 FTE), Parks & Recreation Operations Supervisor (1 FTE) and Library Clerk I (.75 FTE).



#2 Infrastructure & Safety

Complete the Water Treatment and Water Reclamation Facility expansion projects under budget and on time.

In the autumn of 2024, the Town of Wellington is poised to mark a significant achievement with the completion of the Water Treatment Plant and Water Reclamation Facility. This milestone represents a pivotal moment for our community, as it encompasses a range of advantages, including the promotion of public health, the stimulation of economic growth, and an enhancement of our overall quality of life. Equally important, it guarantees our community's readiness to meet evolving needs and challenges while adhering to regulatory standards.

As the new treatment plants prepare to come online, it's crucial to recognize that our budget will now encompass a transitional period. This transitional phase accounts for half the year with the old plants and the other half with the new plants. Moreover, this transition allows staff to adapt to new testing requirements, accounts for additional permitting, chemicals, tools, and processes for supporting the new facilities.

Commitment to Safety

In 2023, CIRSA conducted a Loss Control Property Survey to examine facilities, equipment, and machinery. The report provided recommendations on how to take corrective action to reduce risk and improve safety for our staff and community. Within the proposed budget, we have thoughtfully allocated resources to begin the process of addressing these crucial safety concerns and undertake the necessary improvements, affirming our commitment to the well-being of all stakeholders. In 2024, our Town's Safety Committee composed of staff representatives from each department will continue to enhance workplace safety and promote a culture of safety within an organization.

#3 Investment in Technology

In 2020, the Town was able to purchase new laptops, docking stations, and monitors with CARES Act funding. Staff purchased computers, which was a mismatch of what was available due to nationwide supply chain issues. Unfortunately, many of these laptops have reached their end-of-life cycle and need to be replaced. Town staff received quotes and negotiated a government rate for replacement. Having a functional computer is a fundamental tool for modern businesses. It enhances productivity, communication, data management, and overall Town operations.

In addition to computers, staff would like to make an increased investment in new software. Below are the additional investments to improve Town services.

• Staff is exploring options for maintenance software that will track assets and maintenance needed for buildings.



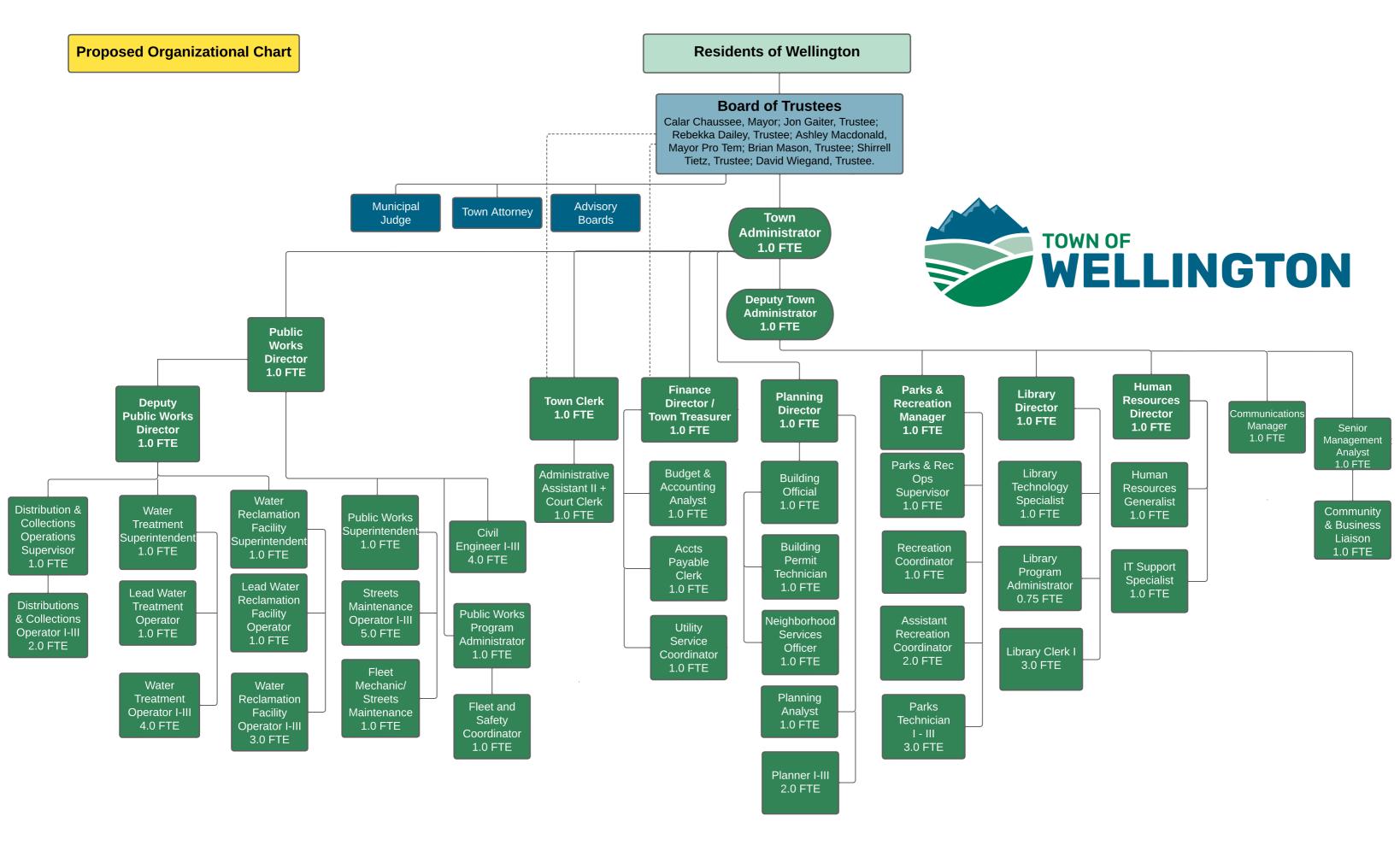
- Human Resources is requesting to add a 'Human Resources Information System' software which is a tool designed to streamline and automate various HR tasks and processes within an organization. These systems are used to manage and organize employee data and information efficiently. This assists with recruitment/applicant tracking, benefits administration, payroll, compliance/ reporting, and much more. This system would be added mid-year to save on 2024 expenses.
- Caselle Court Management keeps track of information associated with violations and court proceedings. This software tracks individual fees for all offenses and sets up individual pay schedules.

Finally, the Town needs reliable internet access at the Water and Wastewater Reclamation Plants. This is required in order to receive and provide constant and accurate data. Equipment redundancy is required for all steps within the treatment process.

Conclusion

This budget serves as the operational blueprint for the upcoming calendar year. It functions as the comprehensive financial roadmap for Town activities and is strategically designed to align with and support the Board of Trustees' Strategic Plan. As with any well-considered plan, we anticipate that this budget may require adjustments throughout the year to accommodate changing circumstances and seize new opportunities. Thank you to the Board of Trustees for consideration of the budget. We extend our gratitude to the Board of Trustees for their thoughtful consideration.

Community Survey

The Town of Wellington partnered with the National Research Center at Polco to conduct a Community Survey. This effort aims to establish a performance baseline and highlight areas of opportunity for overall community improvement.

The statistically valid survey gathered opinions from residents on ten key aspects, including economy, mobility, safety, and inclusivity. The survey response rate for the 2023 survey was 18%. Results are weighted from a representative sample of 502 residents so that the demographic profile of respondents reflects the demographic profile of adults in Wellington. The report highlights comparisons to benchmarks from over 500+ communities, indicating Wellington's performance as "higher," "lower," or "similar" to the average. The survey spanned from April 12 to May 24, 2023.

Polco noted the pandemic's influence may affect the comparisons to past years' data. The Community Survey is a tool used to help the Town monitor trends in resident opinions, measure government performance, inform budget and strategic planning decision, and is a benchmark to other communities.



Key Findings

- Wellington Residents generally feel safe and experience a high quality of life.
- The economy and general affordability are priorities for residents
- Residents value Wellington's natural environment and parks system but support additional investment in recreational opportunities.

Balancing Performance and Importance

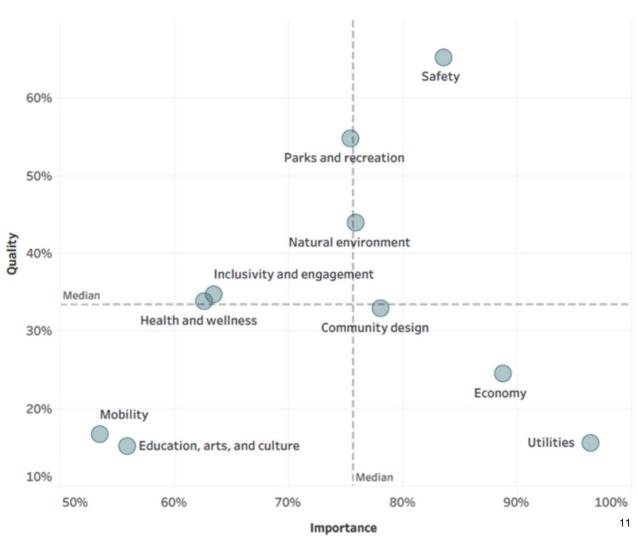
The quadrants in the figure below show which community facets were given higher or lower importance ratings (right-left) and which had higher or lower quality ratings (up-down).

Facets of livability falling closer to a diagonal line from the lower left to the upper right are those where performance ratings are more commensurate with resident priorities.

Facets scoring closest to the lower right hand corner of the matrix (higher in importance and lower in quality) are those that may warrant further investigation to see if changes to their delivery are necessary to improve their performance.

This is the key part of this chart on which to focus. Facets falling in the top left hand corner of the chart (lower in importance but higher in quality) are areas where performance may outscore resident priorities, and may be a consideration for lower resource allocation.

Wellington at a Glance

Wellington is a charming town nestled in the northern part of Colorado, with a rich historical background that spans over a century. From its early days as a small agricultural community to its growth as a thriving town, Wellington has experienced significant milestones and transformations that have shaped its identity.

Acknowledging this land is the traditional and ancestral homelands of the Arapaho, Cheyenne, and Ute Nations and peoples. Wellington was also a site of trade, gathering, and healing for numerous other Native tribes.

The tale of Wellington as a town finds its roots in the 1870s after settlers arrived in the area attracted to the vast open prairies and fertile lands of northern Colorado. They established small homesteads and began farming the land, cultivating crops such as wheat, corn, and sugar beets. The agricultural industry quickly flourished, laving foundation for the Wellington's early prosperity.

The advent of the Colorado Central Railroad in 1877 played a crucial role in the development of Wellington. The railroad brought increased connectivity and facilitated the transportation of goods, transforming the local economy. As a result, the settlement expanded, and in 1905, the Town of Wellington was formally incorporated and named after C.L. Wellington, an employee of the Colorado and Southern Railroad.

Throughout the early 20th century, Wellington experienced steady growth. The town's economy diversified with the establishment of various industries and services. The sugar beet industry played a significant role as Wellington became home to sugar beet farming.

Other businesses, including general stores, blacksmith shops, and schools, emerged to support the growing community.

Like many towns, Wellington faced challenges over the years. The Great Depression of the 1930s brought economic hardships, but the town remained resilient.

The community banded together, supporting one another through difficult times. After World War II, Wellington experienced renewed growth and prosperity as returning soldiers sought opportunities and a peaceful life in the town.

In the latter half of the 20th century, Wellington embraced modernization while preserving its small-town charm. Improved transportation infrastructure, including the constructing Interstate 25, further enhanced the town's connectivity with neighboring cities and fueled economic growth. Wellington continued to evolve with the addition of new residential neighborhoods, schools, parks, and community facilities.

As of 2020, approximately 11,000 residents call Wellington home. The town retains its agricultural heritage, with many residents still engaged in farming activities. Wellington offers a range of amenities, including shopping, recreational areas, and cultural events, making it an attractive place to live and visit.

Wellington's history is a testament to the resilience and spirit of the community. From humble agricultural beginnings to a vibrant town, it has transformed while preserving its unique character.



Budget Procedure

The budget procedure begins with the finance department distributing budget packets to the Department Directors. The budget packets include instructions for the upcoming budget, personnel schedules, previous 3 years actual expenditures, and current year's operating expenditures for the year elapsed to date. The Department Directors, with guidance from finance, prepare and submit their operating and capital requests.

In September, the preliminary budget for the fiscal year commencing the following January 1st is submitted by the Town Administrator to the Town Board. The preliminary budget must be balanced: the means of financing expenditures must be equal to or greater than expenditures. Surplus fund and fund balance are considered a financing source.

During October and November, the Town holds public budget meetings with the Board of Trustees and the Finance Committee to discuss budget recommendations. A public hearing is held to allow for input from the residents. Prior to December 15, Finance staff finalizes a balanced budget pursuant to Board direction. The budget is adopted, funding is appropriated, and the mill levies are certified.

Finance staff prepares the published budget document. The budget document comprehensively covers the financial plan for the year and serves as an operations guide and communications tool. The budget document provides fiscal information for the past two years, as well as a description of each department. It contains summaries and detailed fund budgets including a schedule of the approved staffing levels and the capital expenditure plan. The five-year capital expenditure budget and plan is presented with the amounts for the 2024 budget legally appropriated funds. The years 2025-2028 are presented as a plan and represent no legal spending authority of any Town office or department.

Once the budget is adopted, a copy of the budget must be filed with the Division of Local Government by January 31.

It can be anticipated that budget amendments may occur in the year ahead. A budget amendment which will increase a fund's adopted budget, such as to expend unanticipated revenues or to transfer appropriated monies to another fund, requires Board approval at a duly noticed public meeting.

Basis of Budgeting

Basis of Presentation – Fund Accounting

The activities of the Town are organized into separate funds including the General Fund and other funds that are designated for a specific purpose. Each fund is considered a separate accounting entity with a set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its revenues, expenses, assets, liabilities, and fund equity as appropriate.

The number and variety of funds used by the Town promotes transparency and accountability but can also make municipal budgeting and finance complex. Therefore, understanding the fund structure is an important part of understanding the Town's finances. The following is a description of the fund types that contain the Town's various funds.

Fund Structure

The Town of Wellington has (8) eight funds, each serving a unique purpose as described below.

General Fund

Purpose of Fund

The General Fund is the main operating fund for the town. It accounts for sources and uses of resources that (primarily) are discretionary to the Board of Trustees in the provision of activities, programs, and services deemed necessary and desirable by the community. It accounts for all general revenues of the town not specifically levied or collected for other town funds, and the related expenditures. The major revenue sources for this fund are sales taxes, property taxes, use tax, investment earnings, building inspection, and franchise fees.

Services Provided

The General Fund provides the following direct services to the community:

- Information Technology

- Building & Planning

Enterprise Funds

Purpose of Funds

The Town operates (3) three Enterprise funds for operations that are self-supporting and financed and operated in a manner similar to private business. This requires that the expense of providing goods and services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed and recovered primarily through user charges.

Services Provided

The Enterprise Funds provides the following direct services to the community:

- Water
- Sewer
- Storm Drainage

Special Revenue Funds

Purpose of Funds

Special Revenue funds account for activities supported primarily by taxes or other revenues that are required to be spent on specific programs. These funds sometimes also collect fees related to their programs that are included in the revenues of the fund but are not the primary funding source.

Services Provided

The Special Revenue Funds provides the following direct services to the community:

- Streets
- Parks
- Conservation Trust
- Library Trust

Basis of Budgeting

Basis of budgeting refers to the methodology used to include revenues and expenditures in the budget. The Town of Wellington primarily budgets on a cash basis. Using this assumption, the current year revenues are compared to expenditures to ensure that each fund has sufficient revenues to cover expenditures during the budget year, or that there are sufficient cash reserves in the fund to cover any anticipated revenue shortfall.

Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to the point at which revenues or expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. The government-wide and enterprise fund financial statements are reported using the economic resource measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of when the cash is received.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized as soon as they become both measurable and available, and expenditures are recorded in the periods that the expenditure occurs and becomes a liability.

Basis of Budgeting vs. Basis of Accounting

The basis of budgeting differs from the basis of accounting only by the assumptions that are made in regard to the timing of the recognition of revenues and expenditures. The budget assumes that all revenues and expenditures, as well as the associated cash, will be expended or received during the budget period. Conversely, the basis of accounting only recognizes revenues when they become both measurable and available, and expenditures incurred. Cash is not necessarily received or expended at the same time.

Financial Policies

Town Code Sec. 4-3-10. - Annual budget.

Not later than the first regular meeting of the Board of Trustees in October of each year, the Budget Committee or other duly authorized person designated by the Board of Trustees shall submit to the Board the itemized annual budget for the ensuing fiscal year. The budget as approved by the Board of Trustees shall be adopted and administered in accordance with the provisions of Section 29-1-103 et seq., C.R.S. (Prior code 3.01.02; Ord. 11-2007 §1)

Adopted Fund Balance Policy: December 13, 2022

Purpose

The Town of Wellington hereby establishes and will maintain reservations of fund balance as defined herein in accordance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 54 Fund Balance Reporting.

The Board recognizes that the maintenance of a fund balance is essential to the preservation of the financial integrity of the Town and is fiscally advantageous for both the Town and the taxpayer. This policy establishes goals and provides guidance concerning the desired level of fund balance maintained by the Town to mitigate financial risk that can occur from unforeseen revenue fluctuations, unanticipated expenditures, and similar circumstances.

Minimum Level of Unassigned Fund Balance

Unassigned fund balance will be maintained at a level sufficient to provide for the required resources to meet operating cost needs, to allow for unforeseen needs of an emergency nature, and to permit orderly adjustment to changes resulting from fluctuations of revenue sources.

General Fund and Special Revenue Funds (Streets, Parks, and Conservation Trust funds) The Town of Wellington, at a minimum, will maintain unrestricted budgetary fund balance of no less than four month (33%) of regular operating expenditures or 110% of debt service whichever is greater.

Enterprise Funds (Water, Wastewater, and Stormwater) The Town of Wellington, at a minimum, will maintain unrestricted budgetary fund balance of no less than 90 days of regular operating expenditures. In addition, all enterprise funds will build up a capital reserve equal to 1-years' depreciation expense by the end of 2027.

Library Trust Fund The Library Trust fund, a private purpose trust fund, will have no minimum fund balance requirement other than the 3% TABOR reserve.

Adopted Fund Balance Policy Continued

Replenishment Strategy If the unassigned fund balance at fiscal year-end falls below the goal, the Town shall develop a replenishment strategy to achieve and maintain the minimum fund balance within one to three years. Specifically, factors influencing the replenishment time horizon include: the budgetary reasons behind the fund balance targets; recovering from an extreme event; political continuity; financial planning time horizons; long-term forecasts and economic conditions; and external financing expectations. Page 66 of 109 Revenue sources that would typically be looked to for replenishment of fund balance include nonrecurring revenues, budget surplus, excess resources in other funds (if legally permissible and there is a defensible rationale).

Order of Expenditure of Funds When multiple categories of fund balance are available for expenditure (e.g., a project is being funded partly by a grant, funds set aside by the Board, and unassigned fund balance), the Town will start with the most restricted category and spend those funds first before moving down to the next category with available funds.

In accordance with governmental accounting standards the Town's total fund balance is comprised of five components:

- 1. Non-spendable Fund Balance represents resources that are physically or legally in a non-spendable form such as inventory,
- 2. Restricted Fund Balance represents resources limited by state law or the provider such as grants or resources reported as "Stabilization by State Statute",
- 3. Committed Fund Balance represents resources previously committed by the Trustees for a particular purpose such as a project partially funded by grants,
- 4. Assigned Fund Balance represents resources assigned less formally for a particular purpose such as insurance reserves or subsequent year spending, and
- 5. Unassigned Fund Balance represents all remaining resources. Annual Review and Determination of Fund Balance Reserve Amounts Compliance with the provisions of this policy shall be reviewed as a part of the annual budget adoption process and amounts of the minimum level of unassigned fund balance shall be determined during this process.

Staffing History: Navigating Wellington's Growth and Organizational Development

Recognizing the history of an organization is crucial in understanding its evolution and growth. Wellington, like numerous communities in Colorado, has undergone remarkable growth over the past two decades. According to data from the U.S. Census Bureau, the town's population surged from 2,672 in 2000 to 11,047 in 2020, representing a staggering 313% increase within a span of 20 years.

This population growth has created an evolution of various departments within the town. Notably, several key departments were only recently established. For instance, in November 2017, the organization marked a significant milestone by appointing its first Town Planner, marking a transition from a prior absence of a dedicated professional in this role. The outsourcing of engineering services to an external firm persisted until May 2018, when the Town achieved another milestone of hiring its first Public Works Director/Town Engineer.

In the Spring of 2020, the Town Board separated the Town Administration/Town Clerk joint positions and created a professional Town Clerk position. In September 2020, recognizing the growing need of transparent communication, the town brought on board its first in-house Communications position. Further strides were made in May 2021, when the Town took an important step by consolidating the Parks & Recreation Department and appointing its first Parks & Recreation Manager. In 2021, we expanded support for Public Works by hiring a Deputy Public Works Director to oversee water and wastewater utilities and prioritize source water diversification. The year 2021 also witnessed the recruitment of the first Human Resources professional, while the position of Human Resources Director was solidified in 2023.

This historical awareness forms the foundation for supporting and guiding the community toward a future aligned with its evolving needs and aspirations.

Larimer County Sheriff's Office

The Town of Wellington contracts with the Larimer County Sheriff's Office for law enforcement services. The contract provides for a sergeant, a corporal and 8 deputies to provide patrol services for the town. A desk officer is assigned to provide walk-in services Monday through Friday between 8 am and 5 pm. Additional services are provided to the Town from all other divisions of the Sheriff's Office. One deputy is assigned as the School Resource Officer at Wellington Middle School. When deputies assigned to the town are not on duty or need additional deputies to respond to calls for

service, deputies respond from other districts in the county.

Deputies assigned to Wellington focus on establishing a community-oriented police presence within the town.
Deputies are responsible for traffic enforcement, criminal law enforcement, and providing limited animal control duties when the Town's Neighborhood Services Officer is unavailable. They enforce Wellington's



Municipal Ordinances in addition to applicable county, state and federal laws.

Deputies in Wellington conduct their patrol duties using marked patrol cars, bicycles and foot patrols. The School Resource Officer instructs safety programs at the 3 schools located in Wellington, investigates criminal activity on school grounds and attends school activities.

Capital Improvement Projects

The five-year Capital Improvement Project budget is used to account for financial resources that are used to construct/acquire major, long-lived general capital assets. These projects have been identified in the Capital Improvement Plan and are consistent with the Town's long-term goals.

Funding in 2024 is budgeted and adopted by the Board of Trustees. Funding in 2025-2028 is earmarked for project completion. This ensures the Town does not over allocate funds on multi-year projects. However, due to the Town's code requirements, the budget can only be officially appropriated on a year-to-year basis.

Process to Identify Project Funding

Priority I: IMPERATIVE

Projects that cannot reasonably be postponed in order to avoid harmful or otherwise undesirable consequences.

- Corrects a condition dangerous to public health or safety
- Satisfies a legal obligation
- o Alleviates an emergency service disruption or deficiency
- Prevents irreparable damage to a valuable public facility

Priority II: ESSENTIAL

Projects that address clearly demonstrated needs or objectives.

- o Rehabilitates or replaces an obsolete public facility or attachment thereto
- Stimulates economic growth and private capital investment
- Reduces future operating and maintenance costs
- Leverages available state or federal funding

Priority III: IMPORTANT

Projects that benefit the community but may be delayed without detrimental effects to basic services.

- Provides a new or expanded level of service
- o Promotes intergovernmental cooperation
- Reduces energy consumption
- Enhances cultural or natural resources

Priority IV: DESIRABLE

 Desirable projects that are not included within five-year program because of funding limitations.

Glossary

ANNUAL BUDGET: A budget applicable to a single fiscal year.

APPROPRIATION: A legal authorization made by the Board of Trustees to make expenditures for a specific purpose.

ASSESSED VALUATION: The estimated value placed on real and personal property by the appraiser for the county as the basis for levying property taxes.

ASSETS: Property owned that is regarded as having value.

AUDIT: An official systemic inspection of an organization's accounts and of resource utilization.

BALANCED BUDGET: A balance between total estimated expenditures and total anticipated revenues, including surpluses.

BENEFITS: The Town offers various insurance and retirement benefit plans to eligible employees.

BOND: A debt instrument that is generally used to borrow money for major capital projects, such as the construction of a building.

BUDGET: A financial plan of estimated expenditures for a given period of time and the estimated revenues that will fund them.

CAPITAL PROJECTS: Expenditures for the acquisition of capital assets. Capital items must cost more than \$10,000 and have an expected life of greater than one year.

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES: Services that are handled through a contract-type arrangement. This includes legal fees, engineering design services, architectural services, infrastructure maintenance services, etc.

CPI: Consumer price index.

DEBT: A financial obligation resulting from borrowed money.

DEBT SERVICE: Payment of interest and principal due on long-term debt.

DEPARTMENT: Major unit of organization in the town.

DEPRECIATION: The decrease in value of physical assets due to wear and tear, deterioration, action of physical elements or obsolescence.

DIVISION: Sub-unit of a department.

DOLA: Department of Local Affairs.

DUES & SUBSCRIPTION: Fees paid in exchange for membership to a professional organization or access to a subscription.

EOY: End-of-Year

ENTERPRISE FUNDS: Funds that are self-supporting with the major revenue coming from user's fees.

EXPENDITURES: Payment for goods or services, including operational expenses that require the current or future use of net current assets, debt and capital projects.

FISCAL YEAR: The 12-month period to which the budget applies. The Town of Wellington's fiscal year begins January 1 and ends December 31.

FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT: Commonly referred to as FTE, an agency generally considers a full-time equivalent employee to be valued at 2,080 annual working hours.

FUND: An independent fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts recording cash and/or other resources together with all related liabilities, obligations, reserves and equities which are segregated for the purpose of carrying on specific activities or attaining certain objections.

FUND BALANCE: On-hand available cash balances which are realized in prior fiscal years less current liabilities and are available for designation as a funding source for future budget years.

GENERAL FUND: Accounts for resources not accounted for in another fund.

GIS: Geographic information system.

GOVERNMENTAL FINANCE OFFICERS ASSOCIATIONS (GFOA): A professional association of approximately 17,500 state, provincial and local government finance officers in the United States and Canada.

GRANT: Money given by an organization, often a government, to be used for a specific purpose.

IT: Information technology.

LCSO: Larimer County Sheriff's Office.

LEVY: To impose taxes, special assessments, or service charges for the support of town activities.

ON-CALL STIPEND: On-call is defined as time spent by a designated position(s)/employee(s) who is required to carry the assigned on-call device (phone, iPad, SCADA alert device or any necessary equipment as defined by department) and who must be available to monitor the status of facilities, correct any issues remotely, or report to work to handle issues and emergencies that occur during off-hours. On-call pay for on-call time is a flat rate stipend of \$200 for 1 week of on-call duty.

MILL: A property tax rate which is based on the valuation of property. A tax rate of one mill produces one dollar of taxes on each \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

WAGES & SALARIES: Salaries, wages for staff.

WTP: Water Treatment Plant

PROJECTION: Estimation of future revenues and/or expenditures.

PROPERTY TAX: Property taxes are levied on both real and personal property according to the property's assessed valuation and the tax rate applied.

REVENUE: Monies that the town receives as income such as tax payments, fines, grants and interest income.

ROLLOVER: Annual rollover process for capital improvement projects that were budgeted in the prior year budget.

R&M: Repairs and maintenance.

SEASONAL: An employee hired into a work assignment, which has a specified time period, normally less than six (6) months. A seasonal employee will not be eligible for any employee benefits provided by the Town, except as otherwise provided by applicable law or regulation.

SPECIAL REVENUE FUNDS: A fund that is used to account for resources which are restricted for a specific purpose.

SRF: State Revolving Fund Loan

TABOR: The Taxpayers' Bill of Rights is an amendment to the Colorado Constitution enacted by voters in 1992 that limits the amount of revenue that governments in Colorado can retain and spend.

TRANSFERS: Amounts transferred from one fund to another.

The Board of Trustees has made the proper tax levy upon each dollar of the total assessed 2023 valuation of all taxable property within the limits of the town by resolution, representing the amount of taxes for the Town's purposes necessary to provide for payments during the 2024 calendar year of all property authorized demands upon the Treasury. The Town now desires to make appropriations for calendar year 2024 and is required, by state law, to adopt the annual appropriations for the Town prior to January 10, 2024.

This Ordinance authorizes a loan in the amount of \$6,000,000 from the Raw Water Reserve in the Water Fund to the Impact Fee Reserve in the same fund. The structure of loan and repayment schedule is further specified in this Ordinance over a period of 10 years beginning in 2025.

This Ordinance is proposed as an emergency ordinance in order to preserve the integrity of the Town's Water Fund, and by extension, the public peace, health, and safety of the Town.

2024 STATEMENT OF WORK AND BUDGET AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN COUNTY OF LARIMER AND TOWN OF WELLINGTON

This 2024 Statement of Work and Budget Agreement, Pursuant to the Municipal Law Enforcement Services Agreement between the Town of Wellington and Larimer County (currently in effect through 2025), will be in effect from January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2024, unless superseded by a new agreement.

1.0 SCOPE OF WORK

The County, through the Sheriff's Office, will provide the services of one (1) full-time sworn sergeant, one (1) full-time sworn corporal, six (6) full-time sworn deputies, one (1) full-time sworn investigator, one (1) full-time sworn desk deputy and one (1) full-time sworn School Resource Officer to assist the Town with law enforcement activities as more specifically described below.

2.0 SUPERVISORS

The Sergeant will be responsible for the supervision of law enforcement and public safety operations for the Town. The Sergeant will work closely with the Town Administrator to exchange information, ensure the Sheriff is meeting expectations and is in compliance with this agreement, and to determine the needs of the Town and define priorities and goals for the Town's law enforcement activities. The Sergeant will also ensure the Town receives timely monthly reports as required under Section 1.8 of the Municipal Law Enforcement Services Agreement.

The Corporal will assist the Sergeant with the supervision of the deputies working in Wellington and will assume the duties of the Sergeant when the Sergeant is unavailable.

Further, the supervisors will supplement Town patrol coverage by performing general law enforcement duties and will cover for vacancies when practical and appropriate.

3.0 PATROL DEPUTIES

Six (6) sworn deputies will work a combined average of thirty hours per day, which will provide 24-hour coverage for the town. The actual time periods during each day spent in providing patrol services shall be dependent upon several factors including, but not limited to, the day of the week, the time of the month, school day versus non-school day, holiday, etc. These times will not include travel time to and from Wellington. The County is allowed to use flexible scheduling to prevent the development of patrol hour patterns. The supervisors will supplement this coverage and will fill in for vacancies, when practical. When vacancies are not able to be covered with contract deputies or a supervisor, and during the hours outside of this agreement, calls for service will be handled by regular on-duty Sheriff's deputies in the same manner and level as they cover unincorporated areas of the County.

Contracted patrol services shall include, but not be limited to, the following: enforcement of Colorado state statutes and county and municipal ordinances; general traffic enforcement; business checks by foot patrol or by vehicle; vacation checks of private residences (as requested); development and maintenance of crime prevention programs for commercial and residential use; investigation of traffic accidents; and investigation of criminal offenses.

4.0 DESK DEPUTY

The Desk Deputy is expected to work normal business hours and be in the office most of the time. Duties include being available in the office to answer citizen and town employee questions, take walk-in and phone reports, VIN checks, and other duties as appropriate for the position. The Desk Deputy may be required to work outside normal business hours and days in order to meet the needs of the Town and the Sheriff's Office.

5.0 INVESTIGATOR

The Sheriff's office will assign Investigators out of the Investigations Unit to work on town specific cases (averaging 160 hours per month). The Investigator will be expected to spend time in the town and assist with crime prevention efforts as needed.

6.0 SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

The School Resource Officer's primary function, during the school year, will be working in the Wellington Schools to provide law enforcement services and security within the schools. During the summer and non-school days, the School Resource Officer(s) will supplement Town patrol coverage by performing general law enforcement duties and will cover for vacancies when practical and appropriate.

7.0 CONTRACT WORK HOURS

In general, full-time sworn positions provide 171 hours of service. Patrol training, court, and benefit time are included in the monthly hours.

From January 1, 2024, through December 31, 2024, the Larimer County Sheriff's Office will provide 342 hours of supervisor time, 1026 hours of general patrol service, 160 hours of investigative services, 171 hours of Desk Deputy time, and 171 hours of School Resource services per month within the corporate limits of the Town.

Extra hours worked in any month will be applied to any month where the number of hours worked does not total the contract requirement.

8.0 CHANGES TO LEVEL OF SERVICE

Changes to the level of services requested, including temporary or emergency staffing needs will be provided as set force in Section 2 of the Municipal Law Enforcement Services Agreement.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

The Town currently contracts with the audit firm of Mayberry & Company, LLC for the audit of the Town's financial records for the years 2021 and 2022. While the 2021 audit is nearly complete, due recent staffing changes within Mayberry and their small size (there are two licensed accountants in the firm) it has become necessary to retain a different firm for the completion of the 2022 audit and to perform the upcoming audits for 2023 and 2024.

Town staff issued a Request for Proposals on October 27 with a due date of November 17. Three proposals were received from the following firms:

Hinkle & Company, PC Atlas CPAs & Advisors, PLLC DMC Auditing & Consulting, LLC

Town Treasurer, Don Rhoads, performed an initial analysis and scoring of these firms to determine their qualifications and establish a ranking. Mr. Rhoads is a CPA and audited municipalities with two different CPA firms earlier in his career. This analysis was reviewed by Town Administrator Patti Garcia and Deputy Town Administrator Kelly Houghteling and the decision was made to exclude one of the three firms (DMC Auditing & Consulting) due to insufficient experience with municipal auditing relative to the other firms. The remaining two remaining firms were presented to the Finance Committee at their regular meeting on November 20 with a recommendation to award the contract to Hinkle & Company.

The scoring matrix for the top two firms is shown below and highlights follow.

Comments

Seven criteria were reviewed above with a possible score of 35 points overall. As seen in the matrix above, Hinkle scored the most points (33) and Atlas scored 29 points. Both firms had solid audit approach proposals, adequate professional staff size, and experience with other similar clients. However, Hinkle noted more relevant experience with similar towns in Colorado and their audit plan included 236 hours of audit work compared to 120 total hours in the audit plan Atlas proposed. Given the many and complex steps in an audit, including internal control assessment, interim field work for testing of transactions, confirmation of asset balances, final field work, financial statement preparation, reporting to the Board, etc., the proposal of 120 hours did not seem adequate.

The other primary difference between the two finalists was cost per hour for audit work performed. Whereas Hinkle had a higher total cost than did Atlas, when the total hours proposed for the audit are factored in Hinkle had a far lower cost per hour:

Hinkle average cost per hour = \$142 Atlas average cost per hour = \$200

This factor, along with the other areas noted above resulted in a recommendation to the Finance Committee to award the contract to Hinkle & Company. The Committee approved this recommendation unanimously.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff has identified the following options for Trustee consideration:

- 1. Approve Resolution No. 54-2023 Contract Award for Auditor
- 2. Approve Resolution No. 54-2023 with amendments as the Board of Trustees deems appropriate

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board of Trustees for the Town of Wellington, Colorado, as follows:

Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (if required)

<u>Data Collection Form</u> (if required)

Prior to the completion of our engagement, we will complete the sections of the Data Collection Form that are our responsibility. The form will summarize our audit findings, amounts and conclusions. It is management's responsibility to submit a reporting package including financial statements, schedule of expenditure of federal awards, summary schedule of prior audit findings and corrective action plan along with the Data Collection Form to the federal audit clearinghouse. The financial reporting package must be text searchable, unencrypted, and unlocked. Otherwise, the reporting package will not be accepted by the federal audit clearinghouse. We will assist you in the electronic submission and certification. You may request from us copies of our report for you to include with the reporting package submitted to pass-through entities.

The Data Collection Form is required to be submitted within the earlier of 30 days after receipt of our auditors' reports or nine months after the end of the audit period, unless specifically waived by a federal cognizant or oversight agency for audits. Data Collection Forms submitted untimely are one of the factors in assessing programs at a higher risk.



Audit of the Financial Statements

We will conduct our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAS), the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States of America; the audit requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance) and, if applicable, in accordance with any state or regulatory audit requirements. Those standards and the Uniform Guidance require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the basic financial statements are free from material misstatement. An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to error, fraudulent financial reporting, misappropriation of assets, or violations of laws, governmental regulations, grant agreements, or contractual agreements.

An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements. If appropriate, our procedures will therefore include tests of documentary evidence that support the transactions recorded in the accounts, tests of the physical existence of inventories, and direct confirmation of cash, investments, and certain other assets and liabilities by correspondence with creditors and financial institutions. As part of our audit process, we will request written representations from your attorneys, and they may bill you for responding. At the conclusion of our audit, we will also request certain written representations from you about the financial statements and related matters.

Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, together with the inherent limitations of internal control, an unavoidable risk that some material misstatements or noncompliance (whether caused by errors, fraudulent financial reporting, misappropriation of assets, detected abuse, or violations of laws or governmental regulations) may not be detected exists, even though the audit is properly planned and performed in accordance with U.S. GAAS and Government Auditing Standards of the Comptroller General of the United States of America and, if applicable, in accordance with any state or regulatory audit requirements. Please note that the determination of abuse is subjective, and Government Auditing Standards does not require auditors to detect abuse.

In making our risk assessments, we consider internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. However, we will communicate to you in writing concerning any significant deficiencies or material weaknesses in internal control relevant to the audit of the financial statements that we have identified during the audit. Our responsibility as auditors is, of course, limited to the period covered by our audit and does not extend to any other periods.



We will issue a written report upon completion of our audit of the Town's basic financial statements. Our report will be addressed to the governing body of the Town. We cannot provide assurance that unmodified opinions will be expressed. Circumstances may arise in which it is necessary for us to modify our opinions, add an emphasis-of-matter or other-matter paragraph(s), or withdraw from the engagement.

In accordance with the requirements of Government Auditing Standards, we will also issue a written report describing the scope of our testing over internal control over financial reporting and over compliance with laws, regulations, and provisions of grants and contracts, including the results of that testing. However, providing an opinion on internal control and compliance over financial reporting will not be an objective of the audit and, therefore, no such opinion will be expressed.

Audit of Major Program Compliance

If a Single Audit is required, our audit of the Town's major federal award program(s) compliance will be conducted in accordance with the requirements of the Single Audit Act, as amended; and the Uniform Guidance, and will include tests of accounting records, a determination of major programs in accordance with the Uniform Guidance and other procedures we consider necessary to enable us to express such an opinion on major federal award program compliance and to render the required reports. We cannot provide assurance that an unmodified opinion on compliance will be expressed. Circumstances may arise in which it is necessary for us to modify our opinion or withdraw from the engagement.

The Uniform Guidance requires that we also plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the entity has complied with applicable laws and regulations and the provisions of contracts and grant agreements applicable to major federal award programs. Our procedures will consist of determining major federal programs and performing the applicable procedures described in the U.S. Office of Management and Budget OMB Compliance Supplement for the types of compliance requirements that could have a direct and material effect on each of the entity's major programs. The purpose of those procedures will be to express an opinion on the entity's compliance with requirements applicable to each of its major programs in our report on compliance issued pursuant to the Uniform Guidance.

Also, as required by the Uniform Guidance, we will perform tests of controls to evaluate the effectiveness of the design and operation of controls that we consider relevant to preventing or detecting material noncompliance with compliance requirements applicable to each of the entity's major federal award programs. BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

The Town of Wellington has received a letter of resignation from March, Olive and Sapienza, LLC effective December 31, 2023. The Board of Trustees approved the attached Agreement for Legal Services with March & Olive, LLC on April 26, 2022. The Wellington Municipal Code at Sec. 2-3-40(a) states that the Board of Trustees at its first regular meeting after each biennial election shall appoint a qualified attorney of law as the Town Attorney and shall fix the Town Attorney's compensation. In case a vacancy should occur in the office of the Town Attorney, the Board of Trustees shall appoint a Town Attorney for the unexpired term.

Mr. Dan Sapienza has established Poudre Legal Advisors, LLC and has offered to serve the Town of Wellington as Town Attorney effective January 1, 2024 to fill the unexpired term of March, Olive & Sapienza, LLC ending the first regular meeting in April 2024. The cost for service would remain the same as it was with March, Olive and Sapienza, LLC as noted in the attached contract.

At the direction of the Board of Trustees, staff can facilitate the request for proposals from qualified firms, establish the criteria for qualified applicants, create the interview timeline and set appointment of a Town Attorney for the first regular meeting in April 2024. Interviews would be held by the Board of Trustees.

WHEREAS, the Board wishes to accept the offer for interim appointment of a Town Attorney with Mr. Dan Sapienza and Poudre Legal Advisors, LLC and memorialize it through a contract with Poudre Legal Advisors, LLC.

- 1. The contract with Poudre Legal Advisors, LLC is hereby approved.

RECITALS

- 1. Town Attorney employs attorneys, authorized to practice law in the state of Colorado, and employs support staff.
- 2. Pursuant to C.R.S. § 31-4-304 the Town of Wellington (Town), by its Board of Trustees (the "Board of Trustees") is required to appoint a Town Attorney.
- 3. The Wellington Town Code (the "Code") at Sec. 2-3-10 provides that the Town Attorney is an appointed officer of the Town and at Section 2-3-40 provides that the Board shall appoint a Town Attorney and shall fix the attorney's compensation.
- 4. The Code at Sec. 2-3-40(d) sets forth the duties of the Town Attorney.
- 5. The Code at Sec. 2-3-50 and state law at C.R.S. § 31-4-307 define the manner in which the Town attorney may be removed.

1. SCOPE OF LEGAL SERVICES

- **A.** This Agreement shall be effective beginning January 1, 2024.
- **B.** The Town Attorney shall provide to and coordinate for the Town all usual and customary legal services authorized by statute and the Code to be provided by the town attorney. The legal services shall include, but not be limited to:
 - a. Provide legal advice to the Town, Board of Trustees and staff of the Town, and various boards and commissions as may be created by Board of Trustees;
 - b. Provide legal advice and services associated with land use, subdivision, and other planning applications;
 - c. Prepare or review all resolutions, ordinances, contracts, bonds, and review other written instruments as requested by the Town;
 - d. Represent the Town in judicial and appropriate administrative proceedings;
 - e. Advise the Town on current federal, state, and local laws affecting the Town and changes or developments therein; and
 - f. Provide advice and topical seminars to the Board of Trustees and Town staff as requested on a periodic basis.
- **C.** The Town Attorney shall provide support and para-professional personnel in its representation of the Town as deemed necessary and cost effective by the Town Attorney.
- **D.** The Board of Trustees reserves the right to engage special legal counsel on any matter deemed appropriate by the Board of Trustees, following consultation with the Town Attorney, to advise the Town or to assist the Town Attorney.
- **E.** The Town Attorney may, including on direction of the Board of Trustees, maintain working relationships with attorneys specializing in fields of interest to municipalities, including but not limited to condemnation, litigation, and water law. The Town Attorney may recommend that the Board of Trustees retain special legal counsel with special knowledge and expertise to represent the Town or assist the Town Attorney when it deems reasonable and in the best interest of the Town and in cases of conflict of interest. The Town Attorney

- may also recommend hiring special legal counsel to advise the Town or provide second opinions on matters of extraordinary importance to the Town, including matters involving complex litigation or a substantial financial or other impact on the Town or its residents, considering the Town's budget as a whole and considering Town functions or programs, when such matters of extraordinary importance also involve legal uncertainties or complexities.
- **F.** Any attorneys who are not employed by the Town Attorney, but who are employed by or retained by the Board of Trustees to perform legal representation or to assist Town, shall be under the general supervision and coordination of the Board of Trustees. Such non-Town attorneys shall contract directly with the Town and not the Town Attorney. The Town Attorney shall not warrant the quality of the work of such non-Town attorney.
- **G.** Although the Town Attorney shall actively seek to avoid potential for conflicts, the Town understands and recognizes that unanticipated conflicts may arise that could impair the ability of the Town Attorney to represent the Town on specific legal matters. In such event, the Town Attorney shall comply with the requirements of the Colorado Rules of Professional Conduct in addressing such conflict with the Town. The parties understand that the Town is not obligated to waive any conflict to permit the Town Attorney to represent the Town.

2. COMPENSATION

- **A.** The Town shall compensate the Town Attorney at the rates set forth in **Exhibit A** to this Agreement.
- **B.** The Town shall not be required to compensate the Town Attorney for:
 - Electronic and hardcopy library and research materials and research librarian services except database access charges (e.g., Lexis/Nexis or Westlaw) for legal research which shall be billed at the Town Attorney's cost without administrative markup;
 - b. Employee benefits;
 - c. Employee insurance, including malpractice insurance;
 - d. Training and continuing legal education;
 - e. Bar and professional licensing expenses and registrations;
 - f. Local professional memberships;
 - g. Town Attorney owned electronic, computer and computer/network related communications equipment, hardware, software and information technology support services, systems training of Town Attorney personnel, including personal computers, laptops, computer printers, or mobile telephones;
 - h. Routine copying customarily performed in the day-to-day performance of legal services except those projects requiring outside copying and specialized printing services may be charged at cost. Large project copying (typically more than 100 pages/project) may be charged to the Town in accordance with the Town Attorney's standard policies;
 - i. Newspapers and professional periodicals;
 - j. Office supplies used by the Town Attorney (to include items customarily associated with standard office operations and management such as paper, pens, notebooks, paper files, file folders, tape, paperclips, labels, etc.); and
 - k. Archival storage and retrieval of outdated client files performed in accordance with the Town Attorney's standard client file storage policies; provided, however, that the Town Attorney may relinquish possession of outdated files to the Town for storage.

- C. The Town shall compensate the Town Attorney for out-of-pocket fees and costs incurred on the Town's behalf, including but not limited to filing fees, service of process, expert witness fees (only as pre-authorized by the Town), court reporter fees, transcript fees, recording fees, title company's fees for reports of title, and publication fees. Such fees will be billed to the Town at the Town Attorney's cost without mark-up.
- **D.** The Town shall compensate the Town Attorney for mileage expenses for personal use of private vehicles used by the Town Attorney, other Town Attorney attorneys, and paralegals for travel within the Larimer County area incurred in the direct and exclusive performance of services for the Town. Mileage shall be charged at the Town Attorney's standard mileage rate (not to exceed U.S. Internal Revenue Service published business travel mileage allowance).
- **E.** The Town Attorney shall provide to the Town a detailed invoice for all legal services on a regular basis. Such billings shall separate work and fees, including allocations associated with specific projects for which the Town accounts separately. The Town shall pay all undisputed billings from the Town Attorney within thirty (30) days of receipt of invoice. The Town's obligation to make prompt payment of all fees and charges does not depend upon achievement of any specific results.

3. AVAILABILITY

- **A.** The Town Attorney shall attend Board of Trustees regular and special meetings, study sessions, Board retreats, and other Town business meetings unless requested not to attend by the Mayor, Town Administrator or the Board of Trustees and be available to provide legal services for the Board of Trustees.
- **B.** The Town Attorney shall strive to be available to render the services required hereunder on an "on call" basis.
- **C.** The Town Attorney will employ or retain on contract at its discretion and own cost, at its office and during regular business hours, such administrative personnel as are necessary to support the Town Attorney.

4. TOWN-DESIGNATED REPRESENTATIVE

In the interest of budget management, the Board of Trustees hereby designates the Mayor and Town Administrator to serve as the primary contacts to the Town Attorney outside of the regular Board of Trustees meetings.

5. NON-DISCRIMINATION

During the performance of this Agreement, the Town Attorney shall:

- a. Not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, creed, religion, sex, sexual orientation, age, military service, veteran status, marital status, national origin, or disability.
- b. Comply with all state and federal laws, regulations, and executive orders regarding non-discrimination applicable to the Town and its programs.

6. ASSIGNMENT

This Agreement for services is personal to the parties hereto and shall not be assigned by either party.

7. TERM AND TERMINATION

This Agreement shall be effective as provided above and may be terminated by the Town as allowed by the Code at Sec. 2-3-50 and state law at C.R.S. § 31-4-307.

8. CONFLICTS

Unless otherwise agreed by the Town, the Town Attorney shall not accept work on behalf of any client that the Town Attorney believes will create a conflict or the potential for a conflict with the Town. This requirement shall specifically preclude the Town Attorney from undertaking work on behalf of Larimer/Weld Counties, any special district whose jurisdiction or area of service lies within all or any portion of the Town, any special district or municipality that shares a common boundary with the Town or which may potentially provide services within the Town, and any landowners, businesses, and developers residing or working within the Town.

9. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- a. <u>Disputes</u>. Mandatory Arbitration for Claims under \$25,000. Although the Parties do not expect that any dispute will arise between the Parties, in the unlikely event of any dispute under this Agreement, including a dispute regarding the amount of legal fees or costs owed to the Town Attorney or the quality of the Town Attorney's services, including any claim of malpractice, such dispute shall be subject to binding arbitration if the damages, liability or claim(s) asserted total less than Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) in the aggregate. In such event, the Town and the Town Attorney acknowledge that they are waiving their right to seek remedies in court, including the right to a jury trial. This clause does not prevent the Town and the Town Attorney from trying to resolve any dispute through voluntary mediation, but there is no requirement to do so. The Town agrees that the Town shall have no right to dispute fees within 90 days after payment by the Town.
- b. <u>Arbitrations</u>. All arbitrations shall be held in Larimer County, Colorado, unless the Parties mutually agree on some other location. As set forth above arbitration shall not be required for any dispute between the Parties in which the aggregate dollar amount of alleged damages, liability, or claim(s) total Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) or more. Such disputes may be resolved by the District Court, County of Larimer, State of Colorado.
- c. <u>Document Ownership</u>. The Town Attorney shall maintain all files currently in the Town Attorney's possession titled in the name of the Town in accordance with Colo Rule of Professional Conduct 1.16A. The Town may at any time request a list of Town files maintained by the Town Attorney and complete or partial copies from files, at the Town's expense. Files maintained in the name of the Town, by the Town Attorney, including currently existing files shall be the property of the Town. Upon termination of this Agreement, or on the failure to renew the Town Attorney's appointment, the Town Attorney shall, with a representative of the Town, review files maintained by the Town Attorney and deliver to the Town such files or copies of such files as requested by the Town. The Town Attorney and Town Clerk may, from time to time review files maintained by the Town Attorney and may define files that may be destroyed or turned over to the Town.
- d. <u>Professional Liability Insurance.</u> The Town Attorney shall maintain professional liability insurance in an amount no less than one million (\$1,000,000.00) dollars and shall provide copies of the Town Attorney's insurance to the Town on request.

e. <u>Enforcement.</u> This agreement shall be enforceable and shall run to the benefit of the Town Board and the Town Attorney and no third party shall have any rights hereunder.

Dear Ms. Garcia, Mayor Chaussee and Members of the Wellington Town Board,

As you may be aware, Dan Sapienza has elected to leave the firm of March, Olive and Sapienza, LLC, effective December 31, 2023. My office has had the privilege to represent the Town for thirty years, since 1993. Changes in the Town have been significant over those years, and I have considered it a pleasure to be acquainted with the Wellington community, elected and appointed officials, staff, and residents during our time in service. At our recommendation, for many years, when the board appointed a town attorney it has appointed our firm, March Olive and Sapienza to the role rather than appointing an individual. This recommendation to appoint the firm was based on a number of considerations. Our office's representation of the Town has been a defining part of my legal career and I have always appreciated the opportunity afforded to our firm by being appointed to represent the Town. As my tenure extended, in 2020 and 2021 there were discussions surrounding succession planning. It was proposed that Dan Sapienza, who had joined our office take the lead representative role in our office's representation of the Town. Dan had previously assisted me in providing representation. Similar to what I found when I was more regularly involved in Town activities; Dan, on taking over primary responsibilities, likewise has developed a love of the Town its history and has regularly shown a genuine regard for the staff, elected and appointed representatives and the community. I have continued to be involved, but on a more and more limited role as Dan increased his time in grade with the Town.

With Dan's decision to leave March, Olive and Sapienza it would be my recommendation to the board that he, or his new firm, would, hands down, be the better board appointee to serve as the Wellington Town attorney. He has developed an intimate familiarity with the intricacies of issues that confront the Town and replacing that knowledge would be difficult. To this end, our firm would tender, and ask the Town Board to accept, our resignation as Town Attorney, effective as of close of business, December 31, 2023. Colorado Revised Statute §31-4-304 and the Town Code requires that the board appoint a town attorney. Based on his experience I would urge the Town Board, if our resignation is accepted, to consider appointing Mr. Sapienza or his new firm as our successor. If the Town is unable appoint a successor by January 1, 2024, our firm will be happy to continue to represent the Town until the board is able to fulfil the board's appointment obligation.

Subject: October 2023 Treasurer's Report

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

This Treasurer's Report has been prepared to provide important information to the Board and the community regarding the Town's financial activities and the balance of its investments for the ten-month period ending October 31, 2023. The attached report shows revenues and expenditures for all Town funds for both the month of October as well as year-to-date amounts. Budgeted revenues and expenditures for 2023 are also reported and give the reader a sense of how actual financial activity compares with what was originally budgeted.

Revenues for all funds through October totaled \$42.9 million, or 75% of the original budget estimate. General Fund revenues to date are exceeding estimates with 104% of the original estimate collected through October. As you will see in the detailed Treasurer's Report attached, this is primarily due to receipts exceeding the cautious revenue estimates of the last budget cycle for key sources such as property tax, use tax, and investment earnings.

Operating expenditures for all funds totaled \$15 million through October and had expended 80% of the original budget year-to-date. Approximately 83% of the budget would be the expected target for October so overall the Town is under budget. Capital projects expenditures have totaled \$24.9 million through September, which is 50% of the capital improvement budget.
